Dear John

I wonder if 2 semi-official reports of mine reached you, one relating to the archives of Udine and the other to the missing archivio storico of Gorizia; probably it was a flagrant breach of military etiquette to take cognizance of anything not within this beautiful Gau?

Ever since I first wrote to you on May 13. I have been doing everything possible to obtain permission to cover such archives in the N.E. corner of Italy as are within easy range of Mil. Govt. Staff HQ., but Godison, who approves of the idea, now writes to say that it has been turned down on the grounds that I have too much to do here (he does not say by whom).

As I explained to Lt Col Campbell of A.C.A., who was here the other day, one work here has now reached the routine stage, bringing back deposits etc.; and so far as archives are concerned I am just marking time until we move into Steiermark. It would therefore be an excellent moment to make a tour of Venezia Giulia.

I would be very glad to know your views on this matter, without which I naturally cannot move. Bell wrote to me sometime ago welcoming the idea, but of course since then either he or McCain may have covered the ground or be about to do so, and I do not want either to duplicate their work or butt in on any future plans of theirs.

It would be important for someone to visit Trieste before long as my information here is that there were considerable removals from the Archivio di Stato there to Vienna. The same sort of thing may have taken place elsewhere. As I may be the person eventually responsible for tracing and restoring such material there is a case for my being after to get the story first hand while there is the present opportunity.

Transport may be a snag as usual. Tomorrow we lose our cars in favour of one of those bloody pool systems. 3 miles from Klagenfurt several thousand civilian cars are literally rotting away in an Army Disposal Unit; but that's the way we won the war!

Dear Humphrey,

I understand your disappointment that I have ~~not~~ yet further north, and I don't want you to think I'm unmindful of the urgent problem of your ministerial archives in Venezia.

Only I don't see how it was possible to cover the four important centres - Bologna, Modena, Reggio and Parma, each with an Archivio di Stato and a Library with important mss. collections - in less than the week that I took over them. Particularly since I had to take an over-all M F A A view with regard to the jeep - without which Teddy would have been unable to make his urgent preliminary inspections.

Then came the disaster to the jeep, which suddenly developed serious engine trouble, and the 5th. Army Garage said that, short of a new engine being fitted, there was nothing to be done. So I have divided the last few days between the Garage, spurring them on to greater efforts, and hitch-hiking on the road.
