Subject: Unfinished Business of the Regional Archivist.

To: Director, Monuments, Fine Arts and Archives Division, Liguria Region.

1. The Regional Archivist previously arranged to have Dr. Maria Galliherid Busnago, Direttrice della N. Biblioteca Nazionale Brindisese, Milan, appointed custodian of a large collection of books stored in the Albergo Principe e Savoia and owned by the German government. In this collection were supposed to be 63 volumes belonging to the Archaeological Society of Cuneo and which had been given to the Germans for transportation to subscribers in Switzerland. Today the Biblioteca Nazionale Brindisese stated that only 45 of these volumes had been found in the part of the collection that has been examined. These volumes and any additional ones found should be turned over to Prof. Calderini of the Catholic University of Milan and president of the Archaeological Society of Cuneo. If Prof. Calderini should so direct in writing, the volumes may be turned over to the Swiss consul in Milan for transmission to subscribers in Switzerland. All matters pertaining to this business have been agreed upon between the Regional archivist and the Regional Property Control Officer whose files contain the necessary information. You will probably not need to take any action on the matter until approached by the interested parties.

2. It will be appreciated if you will render any possible aid to Dr. Galliherid and the Biblioteca Nazionale Brindisese. She is a fine woman

and is doing an excellent job in trying circumstances. Her predecessor, one Mario Maliti, has been trying to cast her in order to regain his former position. The case has been investigated carefully, and Maliti's position is wholly unethical and unprofessional. No attention should be given to any statements or complaints made by him. The matter of his future employment should be settled by the Ministry of Education after this territory reverts to the Italian government.

3. It will further be appreciated if aid and assistance can be given to Dr. Guido Manganielli, Soprintendent del R. Archivio di Stato, Milan. The six buildings formerly occupied by the Archivio di Stato have been badly damaged or destroyed by bombing. Most of the records in his custody are still evacuated in neighboring villages. The problem of housing is very acute in his case. There was previous difficulty in his case when Conte Amari, who has a position under Colonel Pintelli's successor for the Ministero dell'Interno, appointed one Alessandro Cutolo as Dr. Manganielli's successor. The Regional Archivist permitted the said Cutolo to remain in office one hour before firing him and returning Dr. Manganielli to his position. No further trouble is expected from this quarter, but please see that Dr. Manganielli remains in his position. The Consigliario agli Archivi del Segno, Mr. Rutilio So, Ministero dell'Interno, Rome, is in full accord with this request. Dr. Manganielli has been employed in archives work some 37 years, has always done excellent work, and is a gentleman of the highest type. He has been given a clean political bill of health by the local Executive Commission. 2637

While no particular information as to the administration of such a program is available, it is reasonably safe to assume that the members of the Council of the Americas would oppose it.

The collection of 250 signatures which constitute evidence of a majority between Wisconsin citizens and the American, is now given to you for your signature as evidence against.

The signatures are arranged in alphabetical order according to page 8 to 177, but in this section the following 26 names are placed in the 178, 179, 180, 181, 182-183, 184. The last section is generally attributed to the signatures of the African Americans.

The Archivio di Stato was located in the Palazzo del Senato at Via del Senato 10. The Archives Officer first visited this location on May 14 and was informed by the custodian of the ruins, Angelo Fabri, that the building was hit by at least four high explosive bombs and numerous incendiaries during the night raids of 13 and 15 August 1943. The building and contents, including unmounted archives, burned for two days.

Before the bombings, the more valuable archives had been removed to the following places:

- (a). A church in Novazzano.
- (b). Various attics in turba and outbuildings of the Palazzo Brivio Belgiojoso in Marate.
- (c). Villa Gruppi in Montecatini.
- (d). Teatro Comunale in Binasco.

The Archives Officer was assured on May 14 by the custodian that all of the evacuated archives were safe and undamaged. On May 15 he was given this same information by Com. Art. Guido Manganello, Superintendent del R. Archivio di Stato. Only a few hundred bundles of the more recent records that were not removed from the Palazzo del Senato were saved from the fire. These are now stored in an unburned portion of the building.

Off. Manganello wishes to visit the Archivio di Stato in the Lombardia Region as soon as possible, and the Archives Officer will attempt to arrange transportation and will accompany him. Off. Manganello is eager to assist in the search for any of the papers of Mussolini or any other Fascist leaders.

2. Archivio Notarile.

This collection was in the Archivio di Stato and is now safely stored in Villa Gruppi at Montecatini.

3. Archivio Notarile.

The Archivio Notarile located at Vianca del Marzocchi 19, in Binasco. Approximately 100,000 packages or bundles of its records were evacuated to the Teatro Comunale in Binasco and are safe.

4. Muzio Marzotto Collection.

This collection was housed in the Castello Sforzesco, which was hit, by bombs and partly burned. The archivist, Mr. Leopoldo Marchetti, stated that practically the entire collection had been evacuated to a basement in nearby and was safe. Practically no loss was suffered in the fire. Mr. Marchetti would like to visit his deposit as soon as possible and would like to return it to Milan at the earliest opportunity. The Archives Officer will arrange for the visit and will make an effort to secure trucks for the return of the collection.

5. Archivio Storico and Biblioteca Tridentina.

These two collections, under the supervision of Dr. Caterina Santoro, were housed in the Castello Sforzesco. She stated that practically all of both were evacuated to the basement in nearby and are safe. Practically no loss was suffered in the fire. She would like to visit the deposits and return them to Milan as soon as possible.
