In Turin it is estimated that 20,000 workers are employed for less than 40 hours per week with 6,000 having pay increased to 107 less than 40 hours per week they are an obstacle to long as these persons remain on payroll economy, cost-industrial reactivation and to a planned production system, industries, prices, etc., are all affected by this burden.

The unemployed are of all types and categories, the physical prisoners-of-war and private labor returning from Germany, the condition of the unemployed has been effected by shortages of food and necessities.

SCENE FOR EMPLOYMENT -

Industrial plants in the North suffered little from destruction by the enemy or from sabotage. In the South they are unable offering large scale employment opportunities since lack of capital, there is some difficulty in getting industrial tools -- approximately 6,000 or those are believed to be in storage at Bolzano (following seizure by the Germans).

THE DILEMMA -

Private associations of workers and employers were dissolved and a new structure was developed. Workers' organizations, employers' organizations, and independent organizations have been consolidated into Industrial Combinations.

It is contemplated that at such meeting a definite course of action will be outlined and the extent to which the Italian Government will be brought into the picture will then be decided.

SUBJECT: Special Committee on Postwar Economic Policy and Planning.

TO : Headquarters, Allied Commission, APO 394.

1. A cable has been received from the War Department advising of a proposed visit to the theater of the Special Committee on Post-war Economic Policy and Planning of the House of Representatives.

2. The Committee, with the approval of the Secretary of War, will make a study of economic conditions as they relate to post-war problems. The committee is composed of Mr. Collier, Chairman; Francis E. Walter; Orville Zimmerman; Charles A. Silverton; Clifford R. Hope; Jesse P. Walcott; Jay Le Fevre; and Ted Simpson. The members will be accompanied by William V. Elliott, Committee Consultant; Marion R. Falson, Committee Director; and James J. Farvane, State Department Representative.

3. According to the present planned itinerary the committee will be in Rome for a period of two days in the latter part of September or early October. Should their proposed visit to Russia not materialize, they will be in Rome approximately the same time, but for a period of five days.

4. It is requested that Allied Commission make necessary arrangements for any conference that may be required.
