SUBJECT: British Trade Union Delegation - Visit to Northern Italy from 9 December to 18 December 1945.

TO : Acting Vice President
Economic Section

1. Attached is a brief report of the visit of the British Trade Union delegation to Northern Italy in December 1945. I met the delegation on their arrival in Italy and accompanied them throughout the tour. As I state in the report, every care was taken to recognize that the British delegates were present at the invitation of the CGIL and to avoid detracting from the latter's position as official hosts. Accordingly, military officers in uniform were not in evidence at any of the general meetings, although they were present by invitation at the lunches and functions. I should, however, like to pay a tribute to the assistance rendered by the Military Authorities and the Regional Commissioners in each Region without whose aid the tour could not have been completed so successfully.

2. The invitation to visit Italy was extended by the CGIL to the British Trade Union delegation at the World Trade Union Conference held in Paris in September 1945 when the American and Soviet Trade Union representatives were also invited to visit Italy. Some American trade unionists are at present in Rome, but it is understood that they are not an official delegation from the American Trade Union movements.

SUBJECT: BRITISH TRADE UNION DELEGATION - Visit to Northern Italy from 9 December to 18 December 1945.

1. At the invitation of the Italian General Confederation of Labour five representatives of British Trade Unions visited the North of Italy from 9 December to 18 December 1945. The delegates were Mr. Will Lawther, Mr. Jack Tanner, Mr. R. L. Bullock, Mr. E. P. Harries, and Mr. A. E. Carthy. They arrived in Italy on Sunday, 9 December, from Austria, having visited Germany, Czechoslovakia and Austria to examine the development of the trade union movement in those countries. An Anglo-American delegation, of which Mr. Will Lawther had formed part, had also visited liberated Italy south of Florence in September 1944.

2. APHC arranged transport, accommodation and other facilities for the delegation, but the programme was arranged by the Italian General Confederation of Labour as hosts of the delegation. The delegation was received at Udine and visited Padova, Milan, Genova, and Turin. In each city the Italian General Confederation of Labour had arranged a meeting with the local trade union executives and a public meeting, together with a reception by the local civic head, and official luncheons and dinners. On these occasions the British delegates addressed the gatherings, and speeches were also made by the representatives of the Italian General Confederation of Labour who accompanied the party as well as by local representatives.

3. The British delegates emphasized on all occasions the necessity of avoiding party politics in trade union organization. They recognized the progress that had been made in the past twelve months in rebuilding the democratic trade union movement in Italy and referred to the general influence which the trade union movement could bring to bear on national policy, as in the case of the establishment of a labor government in Great Britain. They drew attention to the destruction of material assets resulting from six years of world warfare, and reminded their Italian listeners of the difficulties confronting the population of Great Britain and other countries who suffer, like the Italians, from lack of coal and raw materials. They offered comradeship and moral support to the Italian trade unionists who they hoped would take their place with trade unionists of other nations in the labour movement.

and in this connection they referred to the readmission of Italy to membership of the ILO and to the part taken by Italian trade unionists in the newly formed World Federation of Trade Unions. They brought home to the Italians the fact that their country was a member of the Axis in the early part of the war, and that the Fascist movement, which had been allowed to develop in Italy bore its share of responsibility for the war. They referred also to Italian activity in Abyssinia and in Spain and suggested that the memory of these activities had still to be expunged.

4. In each centre visited the Italians took the opportunity of recounting their need for material assistance, viz., coal and raw materials, and drew attention to the miserable condition of the workers which threatened to worsen during the winter with lack of employment, and shortage of fuel and food. These representations did not over-impress the British delegates who in Germany and Austria had seen devastation and misery, and in Czechoslovakia had seen evidence of vigorous approach to national problems. In Turin particularly the Italian speakers admitted the fault of the Italian people in allowing Fascism to develop and of the workers in not opposing its growth from the earliest days; they recognized their moral debt towards the countries which had suffered from Italian Fascist aggression; but they invited attention to the support which Fascism had received from other countries and to the fact that Italians such as Turati, who had spoken in foreign countries against Fascism, had been informed that it was a phenomenon of internal interest only. The Communist Secretary, Di Vittorio, took the opportunity of attacking land owners in general, and industrialists whom he accused of opposing workers' just demands for political and not economic reasons, as well as elements in the Liberal Party whom he accused of causing the recent political crisis in the interests of reactionary Neo-Fascists. His speech was repeated in each centre, but in Turin the response was mixed.

5. The British Trade Union delegation received a hearty welcome throughout the North. Posters were displayed expressing, both in English and Italian, greetings to the delegates; the attendance at the meetings of local trade union leaders varied from 200 to 600, and at the public meetings the accommodation was packed, except at the final meeting in Milan where a raid on the SEPRAL organization by the bakers proved, for some time, a rival attraction. The Prefects and Mayors of the respective cities received the delegation with appropriate expressions of welcome, and the Camere del Lavoro arranged lunches, dinners and entertainment, including places at the opera or special

concerts, with the obvious desire of discharging to the best of their ability their liabilities as hosts of the delegation. AMG Officers, and particularly the Regional Commissioners and their Officers, gave every assistance without, however, detracting from the position of the Italian General Confederation of Labour as the official hosts in their own country. It is considered that the delegation made, in this brief and hurried visit, ample contacts with organized labour in Northern Italy and obtained an adequate idea of the desire of the Italian workers in the North of Italy to organize themselves efficiently and to cooperate for the furtherance of the ideals of the trade union movement. Delegates were able to compare the Italian trade union movement and its members with the German and Austrian workers, and although they may have been inclined to class them together at the beginning of their tour, it is probable that they eventually appreciated the sincerity and self-reliance in the North of Italy, which had maintained a resistance movement and collaborated with the Allies. Despite the plain speaking of the British delegates on several occasions, the visit served to bring closer together the workers of the two countries and there is a strong desire on the part of Italian trade unionists that they, in turn, may be allowed in due course to visit Great Britain.

Dear Dunlop:

With the support of H. M. Government a delegation of British Trade Unionists is visiting Germany, Poland, Czechoslovakia and Austria to consider the development of the trade union movement in those countries. The respective Allied Commissions are granting them facilities during their tour.

The delegation has also accepted an invitation from the General Confederation of Italian Labor to visit Northern Italy. It may be recalled that last year a similar delegation came to this country but was only able to visit the then liberated territory south of Florence. AFHQ has given the necessary entry permits and is authorizing transport, accommodations, etc. I should be glad if you will also grant them every facility during the tour of the delegation through your Region.

The members of the delegation are: Messrs. Will Leaffer, B. Bullock, A. E. Conley, F. P. Harries and Jack Tscher, and they will be accompanied on the tour by the Director and/or other members of Labor Sub-Commission. They are due to arrive at Udine mid-day 7 December, Milan mid-day 8 December, Genova mid-day 9 December, and Turin mid-day 10 December. These dates will be confirmed and particulars of the itinerary will be sent to you as soon as definite information is available.

ITALIAN TRADE UNION ORGANIZATION

There is no Italian law or Decree which recognizes, regulates, or gives legal status to trade unions. Fascist legislation on the subject was annulled on liberation of territory and the nearest approach to legal regulation is ANO General Order No. 88 which declares the right of free association. Successive Italian Ministers of Labor have drafted Decrees but without reaching the stage of presentation to the Council of Ministers.

Italian trade unions have, however, been formed on a non-party, non-religious basis and membership was claimed of 1,800,000 in January 1945, i.e., before the liberation of the North of Italy, while in October 1945 membership of 5,000,000 was claimed. The largest body of membership is agricultural workers.

The unity of the workers agreed in the pact of Rome of 4 June 1944, depends upon collaboration of the three left-wing political parties; namely, Socialist, Communist, and Christian-Democrats. The Secretariat and Executive Committee of the CUIL and of the respective Camere del Lavoro throughout the country are shared equally between these three parties, there being, for example, three Joint Secretaries of each organization. Therefore, although ostensibly on a non-party basis, consideration of party enters into the various forms of activity.

In the Autumn of 1945 the Christian-Democrats began to complain that their whole-hearted collaboration had not been met by similar readiness of concession and compromise on the part of the elements of the other two parties, and that instead of the Socialists maintaining a middle and balancing position between the extremes represented by Communists and Christian-Democrats, there had been virtually an alliance between Communists and Socialists which inevitably operated against the Christian-Democrats. There is a possibility of withdrawal of Christian-Democrats from the tripartite workers' organization and the formation of separate Christian trade unions. The adverse effect of such a step upon the organization of the workers is recognized on all sides, and it is generally desired that this should be avoided. Imperfect though it may have been, the collaboration between the three main political parties in the labor field in Italy for a continuous period of eighteen months is the most striking, if not the only, example of continuous collaboration of parties in Italy where the multiplication of political parties has led to an unsettled state in the political field, punctuated with crises which have paralyzed

administration and recovery for various periods.

An example of disagreement within the CGIL is in respect of the establishment and functions of Government Labor Offices (Uffici del Lavoro). These were established by ANI to succeed the Fascist system of labor regulation and are on the model of Employment Exchanges in the United Kingdom. Their scope and functions have been agreed in general terms with the Italian Government and a recent inspection by an Italian Ministry of Labor official produced a general commendation of their activities. While the Christian-Democrats favor the establishment of these offices, and in particular the voluntary registration of workers seeking employment and notification of vacancies by employers with a view to the development of placement in employment, the Socialists and Communists seek the cessation of placement activities and the compulsory filling of all vacancies through the local Camera del Lavoro. In Government and industrial circles this is regarded as an attempt to seize placement and to use it as a political weapon. It is probably this issue, as much as any other, which delays the promulgation of trade union legislation.

The first National Congress of the CGIL was held in Naples at the end of January 1946. Delegates from the then liberated parts of Italy attended with a few representatives from the North. A constitution of the Confederation was agreed and an Executive Committee, with Joint Secretaries, was elected. The Executive Committee comprises equal representation of the three political parties.

It was agreed that as soon as possible after the liberation of the North a special Congress should be held to confirm the constitution and to arrange adequate representations of Northern labor.

REPRESENTATION OF WORKERS IN THE CONSULTA

Prior to the holding of general elections for the establishment of a Constituent Assembly, a Consulta has been set up in Italy. It is noteworthy that the CIL, as representing organized labor, has been given 14 seats in the Consulta and that a corresponding number of seats has been given to the various representatives of employers.

WAGE NEGOTIATION - NORTHERN ITALY

The so-called Gothic Line, or military front, divided North and South Italy into two economic zones prior to the liberation. Living conditions were different and prices and wages in the North were markedly lower than liberated Italy. The economic policy was to allow North and South to become uniform in this respect without encouraging profiteering in goods or starting an inflationary spiral by the immediate introduction of southern rates of wages. There was no freezing of wages and AMG General Order No. 41 referred to the freedom of negotiations for revision of wage agreements. It required new wage agreements to be referred to AMG before operation. AMG referred to the KIJACs for advice and invariably accepted their recommendations. The Italians were encouraged to work out their own agreements, and the recently concluded Rome Agreement of November 1945, establishing minimum basic rates for the whole of the North of Italy by agreement between employers, workers and the Italian Government, is evidence of the development of industrial negotiations under the encouragement of AMG. There is practically uniformity between North of Italy and Center and South, except that in some respects the North is now more favored than the other areas.

EMPLOYERS' ORGANIZATIONS

The employers' organizations in existence at the time of liberation were naturally suspect of collaboration with the Fascist regime. The Confederation of Industry was revived in Rome and in the Northern Regions individual Industrial employers federations were started for each Region (Unione Industriale). For the first six months they acted independently and only recently are they linking up with the National Confederation of Industry. There are separate employers' organizations for commerce, agriculture, and banking and insurance.

REGIONAL ITALIAN JOINT ADVISORY COMMITTEES

To avoid many of the mistakes committed in the Center and South of Italy, Allied Commission, Labor Sub-Commission arranged in advance to have Regional Italian Joint Advisory Committees established for each Region of the North after liberation. The Italian Government, Italian labor and Italian industry agreed to cooperate, and the Committees included representatives of these three groups. The functions were to advise ANG on labor questions generally, including the operations of the Uffici del Lavoro, wage agreements, trade disputes, etc. They have operated for the past six months and have provided a meeting place for the various interests. The ANG Regional Commissioners have invariably followed their advice on questions referred to them. It will be open to the Italians to maintain and develop this form of cooperation on labor issues, or to allow it to fade out. Impartial observers have reported appreciatively on the MIJaCs activities.

COUNCILS OF WORKERS AND WORKSHOPS COMMISSIONS.

There are two forms of factory committees (not to be confused with Consiglio di Gestione or Works Management Committees referred to below). The standard form is the Internal Commission composed of representatives of workers in industrial establishments who safeguard the interests of the workers much on the lines of the English Works Committee. They should not deal with general wage questions or other matters within the scope of the trade unions, nor have they any direct connection with management functions. They were revived immediately after the downfall of Mussolini by agreement between workers' and employers' representatives in Rome and their establishment has been encouraged by the allied Commission, Labor Sub-Commission in establishments conducted by the Allies or in which the Allies have a large interest. The election of members of Internal Commissions is arranged to give equal representation to the three political parties of the Left.

The CLN Aziendale or Workshop Committees of National Liberation were clandestine committees formed before liberation to oppose the interests of the Nazi and Fascist authorities. They thus had a more political basis and their general scope was different from Works Committees. They still survive and are active in various respects although it might be said that their primary function has been fulfilled.

Workers' Participation in Management -- Works Management Committees (Consiglio di Gestione). Various Mussolini Decrees provided for the socialization of various types of industrial establishments, including the representation of workers in management. These Decrees were not generally put into effect. Fascist Decrees automatically fell on liberation and the question of the socialization of industry in Italy is still open. One school of thought demands that legal backing should not be given to socialization of industry until the general elections are held and there is an elected body to debate the issue. Others demand immediate representation of workers in management, and in the North of Italy the Socialists and Communists have produced a joint scheme. The Council of Ministers has not yet received for consideration a draft Decree from any of the interested Ministers.

In some particular establishments, notably those under the control of IRI, a semi-state corporation, workers have been given representation on management boards.

WAGES IN ITALY

In November 1948 there appeared the first result of attempts to clean up the confused wage structure in Italy. The earlier collective contracts under the Fascist regime established basic rates and allowances but from September 1948 changes in the economic field had been reflected by increases disguised as bonuses for particular purposes instead of regulation of the basic wage contracts. Bonuses for bombardment, for conditions of hardship, missing allowances, emergency indemnities, were added in block sums to a basic structure which, owing to the devaluation of the lira, ceased to differentiate between skill and proficiency. The Rome Agreement of November 1948 now provides for the North of Italy for a basic hourly rate graduated according to industry, category of worker, with provisional differentiation; plus a cost-of-living bonus designed on a sliding scale according to the cost-of-living which will be averaged out from statistics applying to four selected cities of the North of Italy. The principles of this Agreement may be extended to the remainder of Italy.

WORKING WEEK

In industry in Northern Italy the normal working week was reduced from 48 hours to 40 hours per week with a view to spreading out available work over as large a number of workers as possible; and also to provide opportunities for engagement of returned prisoners and demobilized soldiers under their accrued rights.

SURPLUS WORKERS IN INDUSTRY IN NORTHERN ITALY

Surplus workers in industry were a problem for which stop-gap measures have been evolved. From February to mid-October (but for the North of Italy only) there was a general ban on dismissals without agreement, coupled with a payment of three-fourths of normal wages for idle time from 0 to 40 hours a week. From 15 October onwards there was agreement, in principle, for the discharge of certain categories of workers not normally in industry in the North and a reduction of make-up pay to an equivalent of two-thirds normal pay for idle time from 0 to 40 hours per week. For the first period the employers were required to contribute one-third of the make-up pay directly, but for the succeeding period they were relieved of this direct payment. However, the remaining payments of make-up pay come from Cassa Integrazione to which employers in industry contribute 5% of their payroll. It should be noted that contributions are due from employers in Center and South Italy, as well as North Italy, although the system of make-up pay for idle time is operative mainly in the North. Criticisms and complaints from the Center and South are not lacking. The Cassa Integrazione is, however, in deficit and the Italian Government has from time to time authorized substantial subsidies.

Thank you so much for your letter of 20th November. The original intention was for the delegation to come by air from Vienna to Udine, but I understand that air travel is so uncertain these days that it is proposed that they shall travel by road, reaching Udine via Klagenfurt about mid-day on Friday, 7th December. It will be very much appreciated if you could receive them on arrival there, but if first air is available. I think it will be most appropriate that the first Military Governor they meet should be one who, like yourself, has played a part in the Allied administration of so many zones of liberated Italy; especially since throughout this period your attitude towards labour has been most sympathetic.

I was proposing to stay at Udine the previous night, Thursday, 6th December, if the provincial Commissioner will be so good as to reserve accommodation for me, so that I shall be on the spot, although I do not think that they can arrive much before mid-day on Friday.

The suggestion is that they should lunch at Udine and that after reception by yourself they should next visit Molfetta and a few local industrial leaders, but without too much ceremony, otherwise they will be late getting on to Fasano, where they will have to meet a large collection of Italian Trade Unionists from Veneto and Venezia areas.

A.P.M.C. is, I hope, providing two cars and these should be at Udine in time, so I do not think we need trespass on your kindness in this respect, although of course a reserve is always useful.

1. There are no general rules for contributions to be paid by the workers to their Trade-Unions.

As these contributions are not legally compulsory as it happened during the fascist period, there is also some difficulty in collecting them.

2. For the time being the workers members of C.G.I.L. and of the Unions which have joined it, must pay:

a) A yearly contribution for the card (tessera) of 8 lire, of which 5 lire go to C.G.I.L. and 3 lire to the National Federation concerned. The card is the same for all the workers, railways men excepted.

An additional yearly contribution for the card is paid in favour of the local Camera del Lavoro. The amount of this additional contribution varies from a province to another and it brings the total contribution for the card to from 25 up to 40 lire.

b) A monthly contribution paid by means of stamps to be affixed on the reverse side of the card, and the average amount of which is 10 lire. The funds derived from this contribution are distributed among the National Federation, the Camera del Lavoro and the local Union concerned.

3. The collection of contributions is free and in several cases it happens that they are paid only for the first months of the year.

Only metallurgical Union have adopted a special system of collection, i.e. contributions are paid by means of deduction from wages, under the supervision of the internal Commission concerned.

4. No special rates are established for women.

Unemployed and underemployed workers must, theoretically, continue to pay their contributions.
