On the joint recommendation of the Allied Commission and of the chief military employers of civilian labor in liberated Italy, the Allied Forces Local Expenses Fund has authorized a general wage increase for all employees of the Armed Forces in Italian Government territory, effective 1 November 1944, in order to meet the increased cost of living, it was announced today.

The increase ranges from 40 to 60 lire a day, the larger amount applying to employees in the lower pay categories. These increases constitute a temporary cost of living bonus which is added to the workers' present pay paid on the basic rate of October 1, 1944.

Examples of how the new increases will affect present pay scales follow:

- A worker now receiving 85 lire a day will get a total increase of 30 lire, making his new wage 115 lire.
- A worker receiving 140 lire a day will receive an increase of 50 lire, making his new wage 190 lire.
- A worker earning as much as 185 will have an extra 40 lire, bringing his wage up to 225 lire.

In granting the increases, the Allied Forces recognized the necessity of an upward adjustment in wages to meet higher prices, so that there should be no resultant to the constant and uninterrupted flow of supplies, which is so needed in support of military operations.

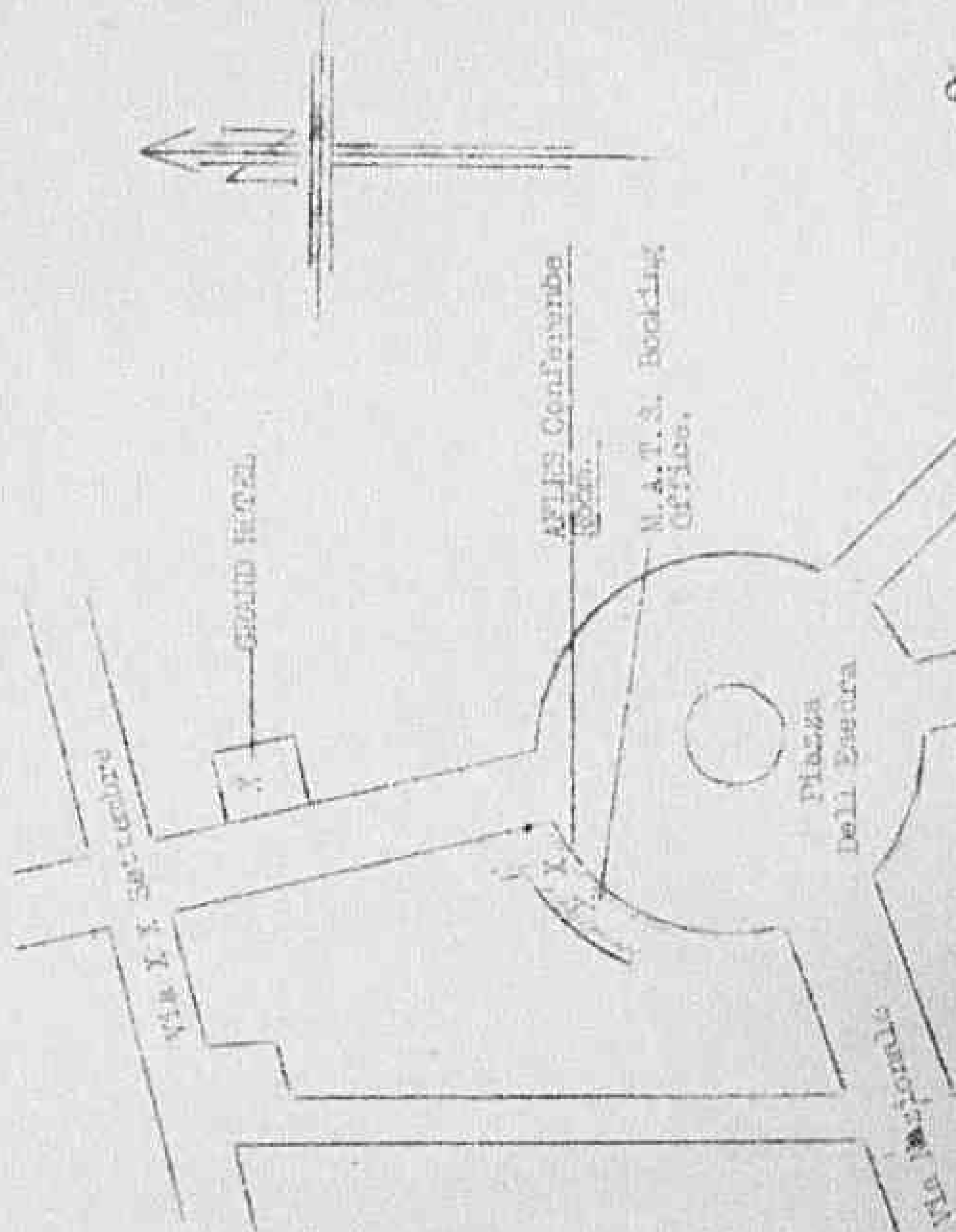

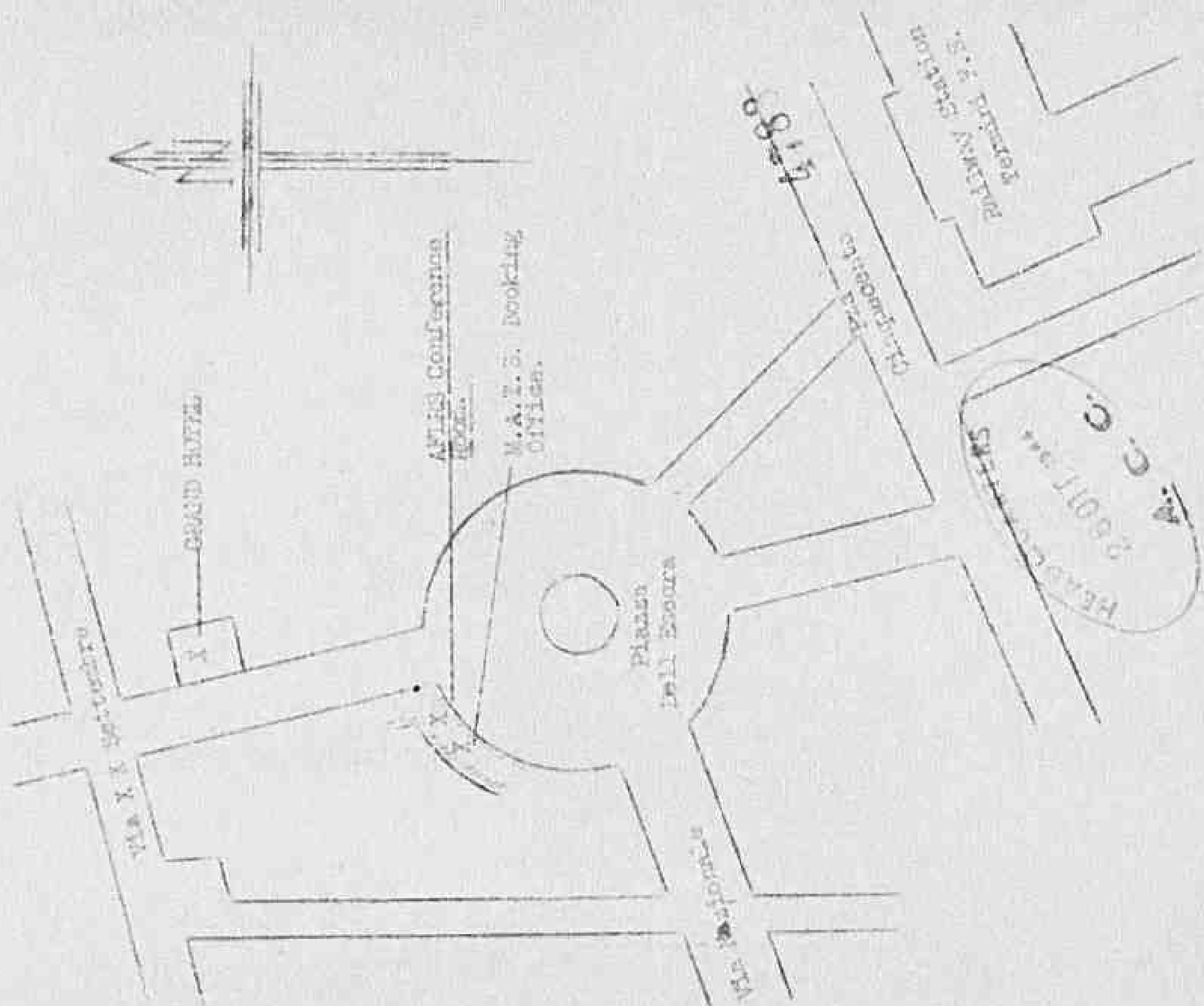

(2) Effects of some particular conditions: Women.

Besides the general requirements enumerated in Art. 1 of the Royal Decree 30 December 1923, others are to be considered which, though not of a completely general character, cannot be considered peculiar to specified jobs.

(a) One of these requirements is the male sex. According to the Law of the 17 July 1913 No. 1176, in general, women are admitted on an equal status to men in all offices and public employment. Art. 7 of the same Law makes exception for offices which imply the wielding of juridical or political power or which concern State defense, or which directly concern such offices. The regulation of 4 July 1920 No. 39 established for the practice of such a restrictive principle, fixes the said exceptions in 2 cases: first it enumerates a series of administrations from which women are entirely excluded without distinction of duty or rank; in the other it concerns only certain ranks or duties in which the exclusion is limited either entirely or in certain specified administrations.

SUBJECT: Local Resources.

TO : The Distribution.

1. In order to obtain information as to available stocks of certain commodities required by the Army and to control their distribution, it has been decided to introduce a new and comprehensive method of recording and forwarding certain commodities in Fifth Army area. Attached is a copy of Fifth Army Administrative Directive No. 53 dated 30th September which lays down the procedure to be followed. This is self-explanatory and should be read carefully by all concerned. Attached also is a copy of a new order which has been prepared for publication in the Army area.

Orders of C.A.O.s and Provincial Supply Officers in implementing this order are set out below.

2. Duties of the C.A.O.

a. The order will normally be posted in each zone occupied at the same time as publications. Where the circumstances have been badly affected and the inhabitants dispersed, C.A.O.s may at their discretion postpone posting of the order until such time as local conditions permit or conditions in the order are suitable.

b. C.A.O.s will impress upon Allied or indigenous carriers the necessity for obtaining the information required and forwarding it to Provincial Supply Officers with least possible delay and where possible they will assist directly in the transmission of documents.

3. Duties of the Provincial Supply Officers.

The main portion of the work entailed by this order will fall on the Provincial Supply Officer but this work can be put to a minimum by careful planning and good organization.

a. The Provincial Supply Officer will be responsible for the translation and copying of all inventories and reports received by him. Four copies of each inventory and report will be sent to this headquarters of which 3 copies will be forwarded to C.A.O. Fifth Army.

b. For this purpose, the Provincial Supply Officer will at the earliest possible moment organize the necessary

Provincial Supply Officer so that he may have a record of the disposal of stocks frozen in his Province.

c. When frozen commodities are required for civilian use e.g. by the Cando Civilo, the requisitions should be sent to this H.Q. which will obtain a release order signed by G-4 and return this order to the officer or agency making the request.

d. When a Province wishes to be in the Army Area control of frozen commodities panned to the Headquarters assuming command of the area (H.Q., A.A.I.). Any countermeasures required on release orders issued by such Headquarters will be given by the Provincial Supply Officer.

1. In order to obtain maximum benefit from local resources for the operations of Fifth Army troops, and to effect proper distribution of such resources, the following procedures for acquisition of local supplies or for operation of manufacturing facilities, the extent of which is required for military purposes, will apply hereafter in the Fifth Army zone of action:

a. HQ, Fifth Army, in the only agency authorized to "procure" stocks of supplies, or to order a plant to produce an item for military use.

b. All Fifth Army Services (including civilian agencies when civilian troops are assigned to Fifth Army) will maintain an up-to-date list of items of local supplies, manufacturing plants, and other facilities in which interested. These lists will be furnished regularly to the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4.

c. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4 will consolidate the lists referred to in b above and will furnish a copy of such consolidated lists to the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-5.

d. In theory advances, HQ will submit in form entitled community, an order directing:

(1) That all items, plants or facilities mentioned in the list referred to above are "essential" and will only be released on recommendation of an order in the form specified below.

(2) That every manufacturer, dealer, wholesaler, or a qualified representative of same, owning or having possession of any such item, plant or facility, shall submit a complete inventory of supplies and/or a full report of the contents of the plant or facility concerned including system of production for operation.

e. Four copies of every such inventory and report, when received, will be sent to the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-5, who will transmit three copies to the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4.

f. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4 will send the reports in (e) above, to the Services Command (S.C.) and (if possible) for an immediate statement of needs with respect to Fifth Army.

g. As soon as the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-5, shall

g. The Army, Fifth Army, in the only agency authorized to process requests for supplies, is to order a plant to produce an item for military use.

h. All Fifth Army requests (including requests for supplies) shall be referred to the Fifth Army, which will maintain an up-to-date list of types of items, quantities, and other facilities in which it is being interested. These items will be furnished regularly to the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4.

i. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4 will coordinate the lists referred to in b above and will furnish a copy of such consolidated lists to the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4.

j. As the Army advances, the Fifth Army will submit in one settled community, an order directing:

(1) That all items, plants or facilities contained in the list referred to above are "processed" and will only be released on presentation of an order in the form specified below.

(2) That every manufacturer, dealer, transporter, (or a qualified representative of some) owning or having in possession of any such item, plant or facility, shall submit a complete inventory of supplies and/or a full report of the quantity of the plant or facility concerned including status of production for production.

k. Four copies of every such inventory and report, when received, will be sent to the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4, who will transmit three copies to the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4.

l. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4 will send the reports in (a) above, to the Services concerned (U.S. and British) for an immediate statement of the items and existing status Fifth Army.

m. As soon as the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4 shall have ascertained the immediate needs then existing with Fifth Army, he will:

(1) Prepare a "Release Order" for the Services concerned (U.S. and British) to require its stated requirements, such Release Order to be countermanded, before issue, by the Fifth Army AGC officer.

(2) Report to higher headquarters (AGC) any surplus remaining.

h. On receipt of the "Release Order" duly countersigned as above, the services concerned will amount to the manufacture, color, shopkeeper, or other person residing or being in possession of the items, plant or facility as stated on the face of the Order. Services will give a receipt for everything thus obtained or arrange payment therefor as appropriate with theater policy.

2. Items, plants or facilities reported to higher headquarters (AAI) will not thereafter be available for requisition by Fifth Army Services (U.S. or British) without prior clearance from higher headquarters (AAI).

3. Reported surpluses will be disposed of as directed by higher headquarters (AAI). Release Orders, in such cases, must be presented to the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4, Fifth Army. Such orders will be signed by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4, and countersigned by the Army AGO, as required for the release of supplies, plants or facilities to Fifth Army Services, before such orders are presented to owners, caretakers, shopkeepers, managers, etc.

4. Control of subject local resources, located in areas affected by changes in the Army Rear Boundary, will pass to the headquarters assuming command of the area.

5. The above procedure in no way affects the right of Corps and Divisions to requisition their requirements of local supplies within their own area provided that clearance for "foreign" items is obtained from the local AGO representative.

11. The Board agreed to the election of HACC to membership of the Board, the Labour & Wages Control Committee and the Electric Power Committee.

12. A letter submitted by HQ 214 GP. RAF (Ref. 214G/2009/1.4 dated 4 JULY 45) dealing with the proposed establishment by the RAF of an Italian Auxiliary Corps attached to the RAF was considered. The Board gave its approval in principle to the extension to this proposed Corps of certain facilities as regards rations and accommodation on a basis beyond that allowed for casual labour and on the general lines indicated in the letter from 214 GP. RAF.

The Labour & Wages Control Committee was instructed to consider the details of the scheme and was authorized to reach a final settlement of the matter with the RAF representatives without further reference to the Board.

13. The Chairman stated that his discussions with the Chief Commissioner ACC, regarding the establishment of better means for the co-ordination of Italian industry, had not produced a satisfactory solution as yet. Meanwhile he wished to remind the Board of the important responsibilities of the ACC in the matters which the Board handled. He suggested that the representation of the ACC on the Board and its Committees required strengthening. The Board agreed generally with the remarks of the Chairman and decided to invite ACC to submit the name of a Chairman for the Food Supply Committee. Members also agreed to consider offering the chairmanship of the Labour & Wages Control Committee to the ACC and to submit their views on this point to the Chairman in writing. It was decided also to convey to the present Chairman of the Food Supply Committee the thanks of the Board for the excellent work which he had done, and to assure him that the change being made was in no way a reflection on the manner in which he had performed his task.

14. The next meeting of the Board will be held on MONDAY, 14 AUGUST 44, in the Local Resources Section conference room, HQ AAI.

1. Session No. 1 commenced at 09.00 hours, MONDAY, 22 MAY 64. - Chairman: Limit.
Colonel J.L. Prescott.

2. The Chairman pointed out that exactly six months had elapsed since the first AFSA Board had commenced to function and that this was the first occasion on which all the Vice-Chairmen had met together. Such good work had been done by the Board, the object of the present meeting was to afford an opportunity for frank discussion with a view to inspiring an atmosphere of mutual confidence and co-operation and, as far as possible, a common plan of action.

It is important not to take on more work than can be efficiently performed, for it will be difficult to obtain additional reinforcements from AFRS.

Sicily had also complained that Services had been purchasing in Sicily and exporting thence to the mainland commodities and materials without reference to that Board.

As the result of representations made by the Local Resources Section, "A" Branch have issued a clarifying instruction to Services (Appendix "A").

6. Various aspects of AAI Administrative Instruction No. 3 - Local Resources in Italy: Mainland and Islands - were studied. The Chairman stated that this was a

most valuable weapon and that Military Government action, and, perhaps considered that it gave us too much power. On the other hand the GAO here, in more than one occasion, laid down the dictum that "in certain cases military requirements may be such that civilian requirements must be subordinated to them." The controlling or restricting of an item automatically gave the Board concerned not only right of allocation but also of veto of exportation. The AGC had assisted in the compilation of the Instruction and are abiding entirely by the action. The question of interpretation of a clause of para 6, which had been drafted by HQ AGC, had been taken up with them and a decision reached (Appendix 5). The interpretation was accepted and approved.

7. The question of lists of Controlled and Restricted Items was then considered. Sardinia has not and is unwilling to see published such lists for the Island. The High Commissioner, who is under the control of the Italian Central Government, has assumed the power to forbid any exportation whatever. This means that the Board has only an indirect control. The Sicilian Board views the position as does the Italian Board and these two will negotiate together with a view to obtaining more uniformity in their lists. It was agreed that the lists should constantly be reviewed and that they be kept as short as possible.

8. The position in Sicily as regards the representative of the Ministry of Food (Mr) is much improved and instead of making indiscriminate purchases, his requirements are now submitted to the Board and co-ordinated with those of the Armed Forces.

9. Item 5(a): The Chairman reported that, although relations with HQ AGC, in the main, were most harmonious, difficulties had occurred by reason of the fact that Services were approaching Sub-Commissions direct. HQ AGC had asked that this should cease (Appendix "C") and HQ AAI had been asked to give effect to their desire.

Item 5(b): Sicily reported that since the visit of Colonel Prescott to Sicily, Colonel Evans of Industry & Commerce Sub-Commission, HQ AGC, had stated that he would welcome co-ordinated assistance from the Sicilian Board in Industrial Investigations. (111) Continuation of this item was delayed until Item No. 2 on this agenda was further discussed.

(iv) He asked who was responsible for the presentation of material for operation of local facilities. (b) The "Green Book" was discussed and Col. Prescott undertook to have the same re-written in the next edition.

(c) Italy outlined the new system for ration food for heavy industry. The Italian representatives mentioned they are getting all the labour they need, but that they do not feed this labour.

(d) The Italian Board has now decided not to issue a request for civil labour.

(e) The Italian representatives said that the Italian view of pay was a little lower than their position on the minimum. There is practically no labour employed by the Italian Government for 200 million worth of goods. Gold, silver and Prescott has no objection to Italian ration being sold, provided the rates are lower, but if they proved to be higher, certainly would be required.

(f) Col. Prescott mentioned that if the basic ration rate could be taken as a basis and percentage variations arrived at, the labour experts thought it would be

be a good thing; the question was whether it is possible for Sicily and Sardinia to accept that figure.

Sicily pointed out that it is a matter of supply and demand; in certain circumstances they might have to be as high as those in Naples, and that percentage variation is inestimable. They could not see that it would be advisable.

(2) The wages for Class "A" ship employees were discussed. The prevailing rates (the same for Italy and Sicily) were thought to be intended to apply to ships of medium tonnage. The Class "A" rates should be given to those employed on ships of 1500 tons, etc. Sicily explained that the same rate of pay for ship employees was wanted in Sicily as in Italy - in fact all over this theatre of operations if possible. A possible rate for those people employed on larger vessels was said to be something like four times the present scale. It was suggested that this matter ought to be taken up at a higher level than that of the Board.

14. Discussion was taken by Sicily to a statement in a recent article of the Labour & wages Committee of the ANA (Italian) Board that it viewed with grave concern the tendency to allow the rates of pay for artisans in Sicily to rise above those of the Naples area. AGI classed had been compared and the following five were the only rates showing any difference:-

Shoemaker, shoe.	90 to 110

Saw settler.	80 " 110
Slater.	70 " 110
Shipwright.	75 " 110

15. (a) Working materials:

Sardinia stated that they have thousands of hides awaiting to be tanned, but that they are unable to have them done. It has been put up to AGI the state that negotiations are in hand with the French authorities in Sardinia, but combined the materials board in Washington will have to be consulted.

Sicily pointed out that AGI in their region are increasing on the U.S. for 10,000 pairs of boots monthly.

After discussion it was finally agreed that this was AGI's province, and the matter should be left to their jurisdiction.

(b) Submarine Anti-

A committee to be known as the Joint Disposal Committee AFMR, for the formulation of procedure within the general policies laid down by War Department, WASHINGTON, and War Office, London, and the co-ordination of action on disposals of British or American property only of the type listed below is hereby designated to function under the Allied Force Local Resources Section. Representatives of AFMR, G-4, Q(Maint), Fiscal Director and Financial Advisor will compose the committee, together with such other representatives of Special Staff (US) and Services (Br) as may be required for any particular meeting.
3. Type of Property and Material to be Considered for Disposition by the Committee:
 - (a) Buildings, installations and utilities serving those buildings or installations.
 - (b) Salvage (material, stores, supplies) which has no further value from a military standpoint and is available for disposal.
4. The functions of the Joint Committee in this respect will be as follows:-
 - (a) To receive lists of property or salvage of the type referred above which is available for disposition by the British or United States Armies.
 - (b) To maintain lists of responsible local firms or individuals to whom such material or salvage may be sold.
 - (c) To recommend the best means for the disposition thereof in the interest of maintaining the economic balance of the country and to avoid inflation of prices as a result thereof or the material falling into the hands of speculators.
 - (d) To advise the Services of the prevailing commercial selling prices.

2. - (a) To receive lists of property or salvage of the type referred above which is available for disposition by the British or United States Armies.
- (b) To maintain lists of responsible local firms or individuals to whom such material or salvage may be sold.
- (c) To recommend the best means for the disposition thereof in the interest of maintaining the economic balance of the country and to avoid inflation of prices as a result thereof or the material falling into the hands of speculators.
- (d) To advise the Services of the prevailing commercial selling prices and prices at which similar material has previously been sold and the conditions thereof.
- (e) To provide any or all of the above data and such other pertinent information to the proposed transaction as may be useful and appropriate.
- (f) To provide a Secretariat to account for and keep records of any meetings held to decide on disposal procedure at the instance of the appropriate British or United States Staff Section.

5. All actual final negotiations, accountancy, and physical transfer of material, property, or salvage will remain a function of the respective Army authorities.

6. The procedures adopted will apply to the theatre as a whole and not exclusively to North Africa.

SUBJECT: Supply of Ramp

TO : Hq AAI (Adm Scholen) Local Resources Section D.H.F.

1. In compliance with letter Hq. AAI (Adm Scholen) Local Resources Section, C.M.F., dated 11 April 1944, subject: Sub-Committee on Heavy, and after a field reconnaissance, two (2) meetings were held on 12 April 1944, and 12 May 1944. The following are the recommendations of the committee:

a. That the H3 boats, tailfins and other pyrotechnics be allowed to remain where they are in view of the fact that the Air Force feels that there is no objection to carrying on the retting and scutching operations in their vicinity. It is believed that there is no particular hazard connected with the presence of these explosives during these operations.

b. In the instances of the C.W.S. dump, it is recommended that the officer in charge be directed to issue his supplies from the proximity of the retting basin in firm priority in so far as is practicable in such a manner that will insure their removal to a distance of approximately 1500 feet by 15 June 1944, thereby permitting access to the ponds.

c. It is further recommended that instructions be issued that an area approximately sixty (60) acres in size of any flood basin be left free in every instance of future planning in connection with military occupancy.

d. Troops and vehicles should not occupy areas considered for 2. above during any time while retting and scutching operations are being carried out.

e. Areas containing growing crops of hemp should be avoided if at all possible to prevent damage.

f. It is further recommended that for purposes of malaria control that until such time as pools are placed in operation, units within mosquito flight range of any such pool may employ Paris Green or No. 2 Diesel Oil (Malarial) for larvackling purposes. If Malarial or No. 2 Diesel Oil is used, great care will be exercised to use it very sparingly to create as thin a film as possible. Once the pools are in operation, the film will be removed.

3. In compliance with letter HQ. 441 (Adm Edt) Local Resources Section, O.M.P., dated 11 April 1966, subject: "Recommendations on HEMP, and after a field recommendation, two (2) meetings were held on 12 April 1966 and 12 May 1966. The following are the recommendations of the committee:

a. That the H2 boats, tailfin and other pyrotechnics be allowed to remain where they are in view of the fact that the Air Force feels that there is no objection to carrying on the retting and retching operations in their vicinity. It is believed that there is no particular hazard connected with the presence of these explosives during these operations.

b. In the last issue of the O.M.P. 441, item, it is recommended that the officer in charge be directed to issue his supplies from the availability of the retting basin in first priority in so far as is practicable in such a manner that will insure their removal to a distance of approximately 1500 feet by 15 June 1966, thereby preventing losses to the ponds.

c. It is further recommended that instructions be issued that in areas approximately fifty (50) times the size of any given basin be left free in every instance of future planning in connection with military occupancy.

d. Troop and vehicles should not occupy areas considered in c. above during any time while retting and retching operations are being carried out.

e. Areas containing growing crops of hemp should be avoided in all possible to prevent damage.

f. It is further recommended that for purposes of malaria control that until such time as pools are placed in operation, units within mosquito flight range of any such pool may employ Davis Green or No. 2 Diesel Oil (Malaria) for larvaciding purposes. If Malaria or No. 2 Diesel Oil is used, great care will be exercised to use it very sparingly to create as thin a film as possible. Once the hemp is placed in the ponds, approximately 1 June 1966, oil will not be used and parts from these units will be employed. It is considered unlikely that once the ponds are in operation and are treated with foul decomposing organic matter that the mosquitoes will breed.

It is recommended that AFM Adv Adm Sec Instruction No. 24, 24 JAN 44, be supplemented by the following:-

PAYMENT OF CONTRACTORS' EMPLOYEES

1. Contractors shall pay their employees the following:
 - (a) Base pay (Retribuzione Ordinaria). This base pay must not exceed an amount determined by subtracting from the Allied Forces daily maximum, for the particular occupation, the sum of forty (40) lire for office workers (impiegati), and thirty (30) lire for all others (operai).
 - (b) Presence indemnity (indennita' di Presenza).
 - (c) Family allowance (Assegni familiari).

Where the total of (a), (b) and (c) is less than the Allied Forces maximum the contractor may increase the pay to such maximum. This additional pay shall be termed supplementary indemnity (indennita' Supplementare).

2. (a) The contractor will be required to pay to the proper agencies the employers' contributions for:-

Sickness Assistance	(Assistenza Malattia)
Social Insurance	(Assicurazione Sociale)
Accident Insurance	(Assicurazione Infortuni)
Salary Integration Fund	(Cassa Integrazione)
Fund for Workers called to Arms	(Cassa Richiamati alle Armi)

- (b) The contractor will also be required to pay the amount of employees' contributions for:-

Sickness Assistance	(Assistenza Malattia)
Social Insurance	(Assicurazione Sociale)

which contributions will not be deducted from employees' pay.

3. The Contractor's estimate or bid will consider payment for family allowances of only 20 per cent of the base pay, the contractor being reimbursed by the State for the remaining cost of such allowances.

4. The contributions prescribed by Italian law for the benefits described in paragraph 2 hereof will be calculated on the base pay, and overtime where applicable.

2. Recommendations of the Labour and Wages Control Committee on the question of the increase in the food ration to Italian heavy workers, arising out of the proposals made by HQ ACC (Appendix "A" attached), were considered. The Chairman stated that the Board was concerned with labour employed by or for the Armed Forces and that it was not concerned with labour not employed by or for the Armed Forces. There are two things which are required:-

(a) The Armed Forces require contented, willing and industrious workers.

(b) ACC require a stable economic set up in Italy.
These two requirements may conflict. If they do, the Armed Forces must take priority.

3. ACC stated that their main object was to get uniformity of food and wages of all labour throughout the territory.

ACC considered that if the food was issued through normal alimentation channels, it would be consumed by the labourer for whom it is intended.

4. The general opinion of the employers of labour for the Armed Forces was that in view of the probability of more labour being requisited by private industry and of the disadvantages suffered by the employees of the Armed Forces, such as:-

- (a) Travelling long distances
- (b) Non-entitlement to certain insurance benefits
- (c) Uncertainty of continued employment
- (d) Working on Sundays and public holidays

some regular inducement must be given to these employees and to provide an incentive to these employees to work for the Allies rather than for civilian employers. The only real incentive yet put forward has been midday meal which it was recommended should be retained.

5. The principle was accepted by the ACC that there should be some differentiation between the ration issued to civilian labour employed by the Allied Armed Forces and that issued to civilian labour not employed by the Armed Forces. ACC agreed that this extra ration should consist of bread and dehydrated soup, which, while it would not be on the present scale for issue for the midday meal, would be of sufficient quantity and quality to ensure the necessary degree of differentiation. ACC would submit their amended proposals and the Labour and Wages Control Committee were instructed to examine these proposals in detail in consultation with representatives of ACC and Service employers of labour and submit their recommendations to the Board.

6. The Labour and Wages Control Committee were also instructed to examine the classification of employees having regard to the fact that whereas uniformity was desirable as a principle, some departure from rigid adherence to this principle might be unavoidable for the present. There are three kinds of workers, as follows:-

(a) Those who are employed by the Allied Armed Forces, either

(1) directly,

or

(11) by contractors who in turn are employed 100% by the Armed Forces.

some regular inducement must be given to these employees and to provide an incentive to these employees to work for the Allies rather than for civilian employers. The only real incentive yet put forward has been midday meal which it was recommended should be retained.

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- (a) Those who are employed by the Allied Armed Forces, either
 - (i) directly,
 - or (ii) by contractors who in turn are employed 100% by the Armed Forces,
 - or (iii) by contractors etc. who are employed less than 100% by the Armed Forces, e.g. public utilities.
- (b) Those working for the war effort, other than in (a) (i), (ii) and (iii).
- (c) Those not working for the war effort.

The case of those workers falling under category (a) (iii) above should receive special consideration by the Labour and Wages Control Committee, and the necessary qualifications,

entitling civil labour so employed to benefit by any extra ration, should be determined.

7. The Chairman emphasised that once agreement has been reached, all Armed Forces must respect the conditions and do nothing, save in cases of grave operational necessity, to augment the ration scale from service sources. These proposals should apply also to the Army areas and combat zones and instructions to this effect will be issued through Command channels.

8. The position with regard to the labour situation in Electric Power Companies was considered. A survey is now being made by ACC to determine the comparative position of labour employed by electric power companies with that employed by other industries and utilities. The Board emphasised that both Electric Power and other Public Utility Companies are vital to the Armed Forces. ACC informed the Board that satisfactory steps were being taken to assure a constant supply of contented workers for the Electric Power Companies and that there would be no labour troubles there. Special Consideration is being given to those workers who are required to leave their homes to go forward areas. A report of the survey will be submitted to the Board when it is completed. It was decided that this matter would be left in ACC's hands, but that that it was most desirable that great attention be paid to the situation during any advance of the Armies.

9. The functions of the Central Electrical Board are not in doubt; its directions on matters of policy must be conveyed to the Electric Power Companies by an agency which would also see them carried out. ACC were prepared to perform this function through the Public Utilities Sub-Commission and this offer was accepted.

10. The question of providing the small staff of the Central Electrical Board was discussed. As AFHQ had directed ACC to furnish this staff, the Executive Commissioner ACC agreed to look into the matter immediately with a view to meeting the demand.

5. A letter from HQ ACC, Labour Sub-Committee, on the increase in food ration to Italian Heavy Workers - Reference LHM 091.467, dated 26 MARCH 44 - was received.

The Chairman stated that before this letter was considered he decided, with the approval of the Committee, to take stock of the present situation as regards the supply of food to Italian civilians and to place on record certain basic facts and principles. In his opinion:-

(a) The primary requirement of the Armed Forces is that an adequate supply of satisfied labour is available for military purposes.

(b) At the present time the standard civilian ration is inadequate to produce maximum efficiency from the worker especially in the heavy classes.

(c) Extra food is not supplied as additional pay, as a morale builder, to ensure equality with others, as an inducement or bribe, or as result of pressure brought about by labourers through threatened strikes, or for any other purpose than with/

- 2 -

with the sole object of giving the labourer sufficient strength to do the maximum amount of work required of him, when it is evident that the normal civil ration will not do this.

(d) He must be given these extra calories in kind and not in cash.

(e) It is primarily the responsibility of ACC to feed the civil population.

(f) The Armed Forces have not, at the present time, sufficient reserves within the theatre to permit them to issue food to the civilian labour employed by them.

(g) It therefore appears only reasonable to admit that ACC has the final decision as to what rationed food shall be given to any type of civilian, subject to any over-riding direction by AFHQ.

(h) ACC have stated that they are prepared to give extra rations to workers known as "pesantti" and "pessantissimi," but that they are not at present in a position to do so for "operai leggeri" or "impiegati" (Appendix "B" attached).

(i) AFHQ Signal 1492, dated 30 JAN 44, authorizes a mid-shift meal for Italian Civilians employed at hard labour by Allied Forces and for no others (Appendix "C" attached). Hard labour, or as we have termed it manual labour, is heavy physical labour of sufficiently sustained nature to require so high a degree of expenditure of physical energy that above-normal food intake is required to sustain the strength of the labourer to perform the work for which he is hired.

(j) The supplementary ration is not a free issue and ACC state that it must be paid for by the worker.

A motion that the proposals set out in the ACC letter under discussion be rejected fell out for lack of a second.

7. Chemistry: Worker Furnace feeding workers, outside of calcium farmers feeding and casting workers, phosphates packing workers, oily seeds pressing workers, pressing filters workers.
8. Tanning: Hard diet workers, color refining workers, pressing machine workers, pile makers.

Promise: The following list points out, for each industry's category, the specific qualifications of workers displaying hard work. Then the workers belonging to following categories must be considered displaying hard work even if they work near Commercial, Agricultural or State Company and independently of firm of worker's syndical affiliation.

7. Chemistry: Purifier Sulphur feeding workers, carbide of calcium furnaces feeding and casting workers, phosphorus packing workers, oily seeds pressing workers, pressing filter workers.
8. Tanning: Hand cleaning workers, sales refining workers, pressing machine workers, pile makers.
9. Building: Masons, Road m. men, carpenters, unskilled labourers, "Dismantling" masons, iron workers.
10. Lime, cement, plaster, hard made work: In cement and bricks digging workers, masons, kiln-men, unskilled labourers, packing into sacks workers, small tile layers, firemen, putting into the oven workers, taking out of the oven workers, layers, wheel butter layers.
11. Glass and ceramics: Blowers, moulders and in general all fire workers.
12. Extractive industry: Miners, diggers, piercers, "disintegrators," "crushers," "macerators," "disintegrators" (inside and outside). Trainers (inside) road workers "Dismantling" lime layers, cast. miners, pushers, unskilled labourers (inside and outside) masons, blacksmith (inside) fillers, wheel barrow drivers (inside and outside).

The scale should be calculated on a minimum number of 50 workers in each camp and rising to, say, 500.

(h) It is most unlikely that such camps will be anything other than exceptions, and only when installations are forced to utilize sites in sparsely populated or over-crowded areas should they be necessary.

(i) The recognition of the general principle of civil labour camps will obviate the earmarking of a reserve of Italian Military Labour for this purpose, and will prove a saving to the public.

TO : All concerned.

1. It is necessary that demands for "controlled" materials for essential civilian needs be properly routed so that bills can be presented to the appropriate Committee of the Allied Forces Local Resources (Italian) Board, AFRL(I)B, at their monthly meetings for the allocation of materials. In order to avoid delays in procurement and to ensure proper channeling of demands, the procedure enumerated hereafter will provide the quickest and surest means of obtaining favourable consideration of the Board.

2. Controlled Materials.

- a. A list of the materials now under the control of the various committees of the Allied Forces Local Resources (Italian) Board, is attached (Appendix A) and the Boards approval must be obtained before any such material can be used.
- b. Materials not on this list, can be procured by civilians from any available sources without reference to the Board or this HQ.
- c. Timber.
 - a. Timber is only controlled in the areas allocated to P.F.S. and Directorate of Works. This area covers the forest region of Cosenza, Cavigliatello and San Giovanni in Pione district of Calabria and the Gargano Promontory, Puglia.
 - b. Timber in all other areas is not "controlled", with the exception of "Solid Timber", i.e. over 6" x 6", which is controlled by HQ AOC, Public Works and Utilities Sub-Commission and should, therefore, be applied for as for any other controlled material.
- d. Initiation of Demands.
 - a. Civilian requirements should be presented to the local Provincial Supply Officer who will, after careful screening, fill out form AOC-AMT, No. 10 in triplicate for each commodity demanded, making certain that:-

(1) No new material is requested than necessary for the approved

It is necessary that demands for "controlled" materials for essential civilian needs be properly routed so that this can be presented to the appropriate Board of the Allied Forces Local Resources (Italian) Board, AFRL(I)B, at their monthly meetings for the allocation of materials. In order to avoid delays in procurement and to ensure proper handling of demands, the procedure envisaged hereafter will provide the quickest and surest means of obtaining favourable consideration of the Board.

2. Controlled Materials.

a. A list of the materials now under the control of the various committees of the Allied Forces Local Resources (Italian) Board, is attached (Appendix A) and the Board's approval must be obtained before any such material can be used.

b. Materials not on this list, can be procured by civilians from any available sources without reference to the Board or this HQ.

3. Timber.

a. Timber is only controlled in the areas allocated to E.F.S. and Directorate of Works. This area covers the Forest region of Corsica, Campitello and San Giovanni in Piere district of Calabria and the Gargano promontory, Puglia.

b. Timber in all other areas is not "controlled", with the exception of "Balk Timber", i.e. over 6" x 6", which is controlled by HQ ACC, Public Works and Utilities Sub-Committee and should, therefore, be applied for as for any other controlled material.

4. Initiation of Demands.

a. Civilian requirements should be presented to the local provincial Supply Officer who will, after careful screening, fill out form ACC-MAT. No. 10 in triplicate for each category demanded, adding certain that:-

(1) No more material is requested than necessary for the approved purpose.

(2) Full details of quantities, types, dimensions and other descriptive data of the material are given, in order that allocation from known stocks can be made. For example, wire or sheets should give type of metal, gauge or thickness, length or size, quantity, tonnage, etc.

(3) Complete justification is given on the back of the form used for this purpose.

(4) If known, the nearest source of supply is indicated.

c. Where the need may cover a period of several months, the successive months' requirements should be filled in under para. 4 of the form. However,

new demands must be submitted each month. Where a demand has been denied or only partially granted by AFM (I) B for reasons of temporary shortage of materials, this office will resubmit the following month.

d. Where application has been denied due to non-availability or for other reasons, demands will be returned through channels, with comments and recommendations.

e. Forms AGC-MAT No. 10 are available at Industry & Commerce Sub-Commission, HQ-ACC and will be sent on request.

5. Channel of Demand.

a. Provincial Supply Officers will forward demands to the Regional Supply Officer (RSO), after scrutiny, will transmit demands to Industry & Commerce Sub-Commission, HQ-ACC, for collation and presentation to the appropriate committee of AFM (I) B at its next meeting.

b. Civilians will not be sent personally nor will their letters be sent directly to HQ-ACC; to the Head Control Office; or to the Local Resources Section, HQ-ACC.

c. Where a civilian is doing work for a Military Unit, he may request the Military Unit to obtain the required materials from stocks already allocated to the branch concerned, such as P.B.S., D.A.D.O.S., R.N., etc. Procurement will thus be expedited.

d. Demands for material for use by the Italian Army should be sent by Regional Supply Officers, to the Army Sub-Commission, Legation (Legaco) for approval or comment; for the Italian Air Force, to the Air Force Sub-Commission; and for the Italian Naval Forces, to the Naval Sub-Commission. These Sub-Commissions will forward the demands to Industry & Commerce Sub-Commission.

e. Demands for controlled materials must be in the hands of Industry & Commerce Sub-Commission by the 25th of each month.

f. Only exceptional emergency demands will be accepted by Industry & Commerce Sub-Commission for special consideration and reference to Local Resources Section, HQ-ACC, between regular meetings.

6. Demands by Sub-Commissions or other Agencies.

a. Sub-Commissions or other Agencies handling controlled materials for purposes outside the sphere of Provinces or Regions will submit their demands on Form AGC-MAT No. 10 in triplicate directly to Industry & Commerce Sub-Commission, in accordance with the procedure outlined above.

7. Demands for Uncontrolled Materials.

a. Where no sources can be located within the Region, requests for uncontrolled materials may be made directly to other Regions where the material may be available.

b. Where it is known

Requests for material for use by the Italian Army should be sent by Regional Supply Officers, to the Army Sub-Commission, Legione (Lecce) for approval or comment; for the Italian Air Force, to the Air Force Sub-Commission; and for the Italian Naval Force, to the Naval Sub-Commission. These Sub-Commissions will forward the demands to Industry & Commerce Sub-Commission.

e. Demands for controlled materials must be in the hands of Industry & Commerce Sub-Commission by the 25th of each month.

f. Only exceptional emergency demands will be accepted by Industry & Commerce Sub-Commission for special consideration and reference to Local Resources Section, HQ-101, between regular meetings.

6. Demands by Sub-Commissions or other Agencies.

a. Sub-Commissions or other Agencies needing controlled materials for purposes outside the sphere of Province or Regions will submit their demands on Form LOG-MAT No. 10 in triplicate directly to Industry & Commerce Sub-Commission, in accordance with the procedure outlined above.

7. Demands for Uncontrolled Materials.

a. Where no sources can be located within the Region, requests for uncontrolled materials may be made directly upon other Regions where the material may be available.

b. Where it is known that wanted materials are not available in Italy, proper requisitions for import should be initiated.

c. If uncontrolled materials are unobtainable because the local sources have been blocked by Military, Form LOG-MAT No. 10 should be forwarded through channels to the Industry & Commerce Sub-Commission, giving the details of requirements and justification, the quantity available at the blocked source, location of source and name of Unit concerned. Efforts will be then made to obtain release

of the desired materials.

3. Release.

a. Upon completion of the initial, Local Resources Section, HQ-441, issue release orders to Industry & Commerce Sub-Commission giving authority for procurement, sources, etc., identifying those sources at the same time that the material is available to the applicant. A time limit is usually set within which collection must be made or the release order becomes void.

b. These Release Orders, (Form ACC-MAT No. 11) are then forwarded by us to the initiating Region, Sub-Commission or Agency, together with a copy of the original document attached, or extracted therefrom.

AAI ADMINISTRATIVE INSTRUCTION NO. 8

LOCAL RESOURCES IN ITALY - MAINLAND AND ISLANDS

1. Further to AAI Administrative Instruction No. 2 and with special reference to para 8, the following procedure will be adopted, as far as local conditions permit, by:-

AAIR (ITALIAN) BOARD
AAIR (SICILIAN) BOARD
AAIR (SARDINIAN) BOARD

In order to co-ordinate the procurement and allocation of local resources within the territory under command HQ AAI.

2. This co-ordination will be performed by the Local Resources Section of this HQ. This Section is responsible to the GAC, through the D/CAC or DQMS, for carrying out the policies laid down by this HQ or by AAHQ. It may correspond with and receive instructions from Allied Force Local Resources Section, AFHQ, direct on matters of a technical nature as laid down in AAHQ Administrative Memorandum No. 77 of 11 Nov 43.

Generally, this Section will supervise the activities of the three Boards in their respective territories and will co-ordinate their relations with one another and with HQ AAI.

3. DEFINITIONS

The following definitions, as applied to commodities/materials required by the Procurement Services and Agencies of the Allied and Co-belligerent Forces, will be adopted in all communications regarding local resources:-

(a) FAZEN. Stocks of a commodity/material in short supply, located in civilian hands, required by the Allied or Co-belligerent Forces, will be FAZEN by AAI/AAHQ if so requested by the appropriate Committee of the local Resources Board concerned, i.e., direct procurement by civilians will be prohibited.

(b) CONTROLLED items are those the allocation of which as between the conquerors, military and civilian, must be made by the appropriate local Resources Board, or by a duly authorized Committee of the Board.

(c) UNCONTROLLED items are those which can only be procured by the Allied and Co-belligerent Forces after the cessation of hostilities of the civilian population have been met. Available uncontrolled items, within its territory, will be declared and allocated by the Board, or by a duly authorized Committee of the Board.

in order to co-ordinate the procurement and allocation of local resources within the territory under command HQ AGL.

2.

This co-ordination will be performed by the Local Resources Section of this HQ - this Section is responsible to the HQ, through the D/CAG or DQM, for carrying out the policies laid down by this HQ or by AFHQ. It may correspond with and receive instructions from Allied Forces Local Resources Section, AFHQ, direct or matters of a technical nature as laid down in AFHQ Administrative Memorandum No. 77 of 11 Nov 43.

Generally, this Section will supervise the activities of the three Boards in their respective territories and will co-ordinate their relations with one another and with HQ AGL.

3. DEFINITIONS

The following definitions, as applied to commodities/materials required by the Procurement Services and Agencies of the Allied and Co-belligerent Forces, will be adopted in all communications regarding Local Resources:-

- (a) FREEZE. Stocks of a commodity/material in short supply, located in civilian hands, required by the Allied or Co-belligerent Forces, will be FROZEN by AGO/AGL if so requested by the appropriate Committee of the Local Resources Board concerned, i.e., direct procurement by civilians will be prohibited.
- (b) QUOTED items are those the allocation of which is between all consumers, military and civilian, must be made by the appropriate Local Resources Board, or by a duly authorized Committee of the Board.
- (c) RESTRICTED items are those which can only be procured by the Allied and Co-belligerent Forces after the essential needs of the civilian population have been met. Available balances, within its territory, will be declared and allocated by the Board, or by a duly authorized Committee of the Board.
- (d) UNCONTROLLED items are those in sufficient supply to meet both military and civilian needs, and, consequently, not scheduled as either CONTROLLED or RESTRICTED.

4.

Schedule of CONTROLLED and RESTRICTED items will be issued through Command Channels on the recommendation of the Board concerned and will be circulated, in triplicate, to each Board to the other two Boards. Separate lists of CONTROLLED and RESTRICTED items will be submitted in respect of each Committee established. Each schedule will bear a serial number, and every item in a schedule will also bear a running serial number. They will be frequently reviewed by the Committee concerned and every effort will be made to keep the lists as small as possible.

An item declared RESTRICTED or CONTROLLED in one territory need not necessarily be either controlled or restricted in another.

5. PROCEDURE

The following procedure in connection with allocations will be adopted:-

- (i) Applications for controlled and restricted items in regular demand will be submitted by interested Services and Agencies monthly on a day to be fixed, but not less than 72 hours before the date of meeting of the Joint-Requirements Board or of the Committee concerned, in the case may be. Bulk demands for civil requirements will be submitted by HQ ADC.

At the same time the organization responsible for the submission of figures of availability will lodge particulars.

Applications for items not in regular demand, or emergency requirements, may be submitted at any time.

- (ii) Applications will be submitted in duplicate on a proforma similar to that at Appendix "a". The stock on hand will be listed together with the estimated days of supply. To aid in assessing priorities, applications will indicate whether requirements are:-

- (a) Urgent operational
- (b) General maintenance
- (c) Stockpiling requirements

- (iii) After allocation by the Board/Committee, the Board will issue release orders, in duplicate, signed by a Vice-Chairman, ordered, where necessary, by ADC/ADP or other appropriate agency, to the Donating Service or Agency, copy to ADC or other controlling agency. Any balance not drawn within the specified period will be forfeited.

- (iv) When Services or Procurement Agencies are unable otherwise to obtain stocks of items required by them which are manufactured by, or held under the control of, a particular Service or Agency, the Head of Committee concerned may direct that such stocks will be held either in whole or part pending allocation. This allocation will be evidenced by the issue of an official Release Note signed by a Vice-Chairman of the Board. This authority does not extend to the case of items imported from outside the command by Services or military tonnage.

6. In general, when assessing the relative priorities of demands for CONTROLLED OR RESTRICTED items, the following table should be used as a guide:-

- (iii) After allocation by the Board/Committee, the Board will issue release orders, in duplicate, signed by a Vice-Chairman, endorsed, where necessary, by ACC/AGC or other appropriate agency, to the Demanding Service or Agency, copy to ACC or other controlling agency. Any balance not drawn within the specified period will be forfeited.

- (iv) When Services or Procurement Agencies are unable otherwise to obtain stocks of items required by them which are manufactured by, or held under the control of, a particular Service or Agency, the Board or Committee concerned may direct that such stock will be held either in whole or part pending allocation. This allocation will be evidenced by the issue of an Official Release Note signed by a Vice-Chairman of the Board. This authority does not extend to the case of items imported from outside the command by Services or military tonnage.

6. In general, when assessing the relative priorities of demands for CONTROLLED or RESTRICTED items, the following table should be used as a guide:-

Subject: Labor subcommittees

1. I stopped in Bari yesterday and spent half a day investigating the labor subcommittees you discussed with me. No one seems to have any very definite information about these subcommittees. I talked first with a Major Martelli whose title is DAQM and he referred me to Col. Orpwood who is the Liaison Officer for ACC/AMB and Col. Orpwood gave me all the information that is available about the matter.

2. Col. Orpwood said he assumed that he would be the one to sit on the district sub-committee inasmuch as he is the Liaison Officer. He did not seem to feel it necessary for me to sit with the committee but did invite me to attend should I care to do so. I left my name and address and asked him to please notify me of any meetings and I would be glad to attend. The Col. said obviously it would not be possible for me to attend all of the sub-area committee meetings; that it was the thought that the AMB/ACC officer in charge of the province should attend these sub-area meetings and report on labor matters. I said of course I would be glad to attend any meetings possible for me to get to but the Colonel feels that the AMB/ACC officer in charge of the province is the proper official to attend these sub-area meetings. A request was made of the sub-areas for topics for discussion at a meeting which had been called for the district sub-committee on Feb. 7 but the sub-areas did not have any topics for discussion and therefore the meeting which had been scheduled was cancelled.

SUBJECT: Local Resources for the Use of the Armed Forces

The following information is intended as an advance indication of the broad policy which has been agreed in relation to LOCAL RESOURCES and RIGHTS.

LOCAL RESOURCES.

1. An ARMY, NAVY, RESOURCES (ITALIAN) BOARD is now being set up to control the local procurement of supplies, services and facilities available to the armed forces within ITALY (including SICILY and SARDINIA).
2. This Board will co-ordinate all Navy, Army and Air Force requirements from local sources and lay down the procedure for procurement of them.
3. Working under the central Board there will be local Boards (similar to the one already functioning in SICILY).
4. AXI/AMG will be represented on the central Board (and local boards) and will advise the Boards what local resources are and can be made available to them, i.e., all such local resources as are not essential to civilian requirements.
5. The way in which the Boards will work, is broadly as follows:
 - (a) the Navy, Army and Air Force in any one area will make known their requirements to the local Board.
 - (b) the local Board will then ascertain from its AXI/AMG member what local resources can be made available to the armed forces and will authorize their procurement.
 - (c) the AXI/AMG representative will only make available to his local Board such local resources as AXI/AMG Headquarters has instructed may be made available.

6. Because there are surpluses over civilian requirements in one area, or developable resources, it does not follow that these surpluses and resources can be made available to the armed forces in that area.

7. In providing for civilian needs throughout the whole of ITALY (including SARDEGNA and SICILY), ADI/AMG will often have to transfer the surpluses of one area to another area, and the Reps. of ADI/AMG on local Boards will need to work very closely with ADI/AMG Headquarters in that connection.

7. On the other hand (after providing for essential civilian needs) ADI/AMG will do everything possible to meet the full requirements of the armed forces -- by making available surpluses -- by placing at their disposal local industry, services and facilities -- by fostering increased production of foodstuffs -- and generally assisting in the development of those industries which can produce military requirements.

8. It follows of course that ADI/AMG Headquarters will work in the closest liaison with the central AFHQ LOCAL RESOURCES (ECONOMIC) BOARD, which is expected to start work by the beginning of Dec.

9. From ADI/AMG standpoint, this policy should ensure:

(a) the systematic utilization and allocation of local resources between civil and military

(b) prevention of competitive buying

(c) co-ordinative information to guide ADI in its development of local industry and resources.

EXPORTS.

10. After civilian needs, U.S.S. priority exports, and requirements of the armed forces have been met (in that order), AOC/ANG is responsible for exporting such surpluses as it may decide.
11. Pending the issue of a detailed directive the method of dealing with exports from ITALY (including SICILY and SARDINIA) will be as follows:

CHANNEL OF PROCEDURE.

- (a) AOC/ANG will advise available exports to NSB.
- (b) NSB will negotiate the sale of exports, and all enquiries, correspondence, and negotiations with Govts, Ministries and Agencies outside ITALY will, provisionally, be conducted through NSB.

BUYING PRICES AND ACCOUNTING PROCEDURES WITHIN ITALY.

AOC/ANG will agree or if necessary fix a fair price to be paid to the supplier. As a broad basis, this price will be determined by manufacturing or production cost, including a fair margin of profit.

AOC/ANG will pay in A.M. lire for goods to be exported, recording quantity purchased and shipped, and accounting money thereon expended as straight expenditure by AOC/ANG

ALLIED FORCE LOCAL RESOURCES ALLOCATION BOARD

1. Pursuant to Administrative Memorandum No. 77, this Headquarters, as the Allied Force Local Resources (Allied) Board is hereby set up to carry out the policies of this Headquarters in regard to the local procurement and allocation of supplies, facilities and services, except rail and water transport and personnel, required by the military within the Italian mainland, now or in the future, occupied by the Armed Forces under the command of this Headquarters.

2. The Board will coordinate all Army, Navy and Air Force requirements from local resources and decide on policies and procedures for the procurement of them. It will allocate to the interested agencies of the Armed Forces the local resources available for each.

3. In giving effect to paragraph 3 of Administrative Memorandum No. 77, this Headquarters, as the Board will work in liaison with the Allied Control Commission and Allied Military Government.

4. Nothing in this Administrative Memorandum shall detract from the responsibility of the Allied Control Commission, or Allied Military Government to utilize and develop the local resources of ITALY.

5. The Board will be constituted as follows:

together with such other persons as the Chairman of the Board may from time to time designate.

6. The Vice Chairman shall be officers designated for full time duties with the Board.

7. Members of the Board may designate one permanent officer to act as substitute for them in the event of their absence.

8. The Board shall meet regularly, as directed by the Chairman or Vice Chairman.

9. There will be a permanent joint U.S. and British Secretariat of the Board responsible for maintaining records of all meetings and furnishing the secretarial requirements of the Sub-Committees referred to in paragraph 12 below.

10. The Allied Control Commission will provide the Board with information regarding local resources of all kinds and also state the minimum needs of civilian requirements. The Board will, in coordinating the needs of all interested agencies of the Armed Forces with the needs of the Control Commission, allocate to the Military agencies concerned the local resources available for each.

11. Any matters for decision by higher authority will be forwarded by the Chairman to this headquarters.

12. To assist it to carry out its functions, the Board may establish Sub-Committees as necessary. The membership and duties of these Sub-Committees will be determined by the Board, which will insure that all interested parties are represented.

13. Additional Boards, where necessary, under the Chairmanship of the Base Section Commander (American) or Commander Base Sub-Area (British), as the case may be, may on the advice of the Board, be set up as necessary to deal with local questions. The names of any additional Boards set up will indicate the areas for which they are responsible to the Allied Force Local Resources (Italian) Board set up by this memorandum. (AG 321(AFHQ) 44-444)

ALLIED FORCE LOCAL ECONOMIC BOARD

1. The Allied Force Local Economic Board (A.F.L.E.B.) is hereby established as a Staff Section of this headquarters under the supervision of G-4, this headquarters.

2. The Section will:

a. be responsible for the organization within various designated territories in this theater of operations, of local boards to coordinate the procurement and allocation of all forms of local resources and services, except such as are allocated to other agencies available to the Armed Forces.

b. assist the respective Boards in the development of information concerning local supplies and facilities and aid the Board in the procurement of local supplies and facilities required for the Armed Forces.

c. Through the Allied Force Headquarters Middle East Administrative Information Section (A.F.H.Q. I.S.) obtain information concerning the Middle East Supply Center resources which may be made available to this headquarters.

3. The local boards will ascertain what is available to the Armed Forces and coordinate prices to be paid, in liaison with the Allied Control Commission, Allied Military Government, or other government authority responsible for controlling the economy of the territory in which the board is operating.

4. The Section will recommend to G-4, this headquarters, the basic policies under which the local boards will operate. It will be responsible for the execution of those policies by the local boards. Any matters for decision by higher authority will be forwarded by the Chairman to this headquarters.

5. The Chairman of local boards will be appointed by this headquarters.

6. Each board will be composed of a Chairman, Vice Chairman or Vice Chairman (U.S. and British) as the case requires, a Secretary and such members of the board as the Chairman may, from time to time designate.

7. By direction of the respective Chairmen, the Vice Chairmen will be responsible

ADMINISTRATIVE INSTRUCTIONS

1. The Allied Forces Local Board will be established in each theater to coordinate the supply of local goods and services to the troops in the theater.

2. The Section will:

- a. coordinate the supply of local goods and services to the troops in the theater;
- b. assist the respective Boards in the development of information concerning local supplies and facilities and in the procurement of local supplies and facilities required for the armed forces;
- c. through the Allied Force Headquarters Middle East Administrative Information Section (A.F.H.Q. Admin. Information) disseminate the Middle East Supply Center resources which are available to the armed forces.

3. The local boards will ascertain what is available to the armed forces and coordinate the supply of local goods and services to the troops in the theater.

4. The Section will recommend to the respective Boards, the local boards which will be responsible for the execution of these policies by the local boards. Any matters for decision by higher authority will be forwarded by the Chairman to this Headquarters.

5. The Chairman of local boards will be appointed by this Headquarters.

6. Each local board will be composed of a Chairman, Vice Chairman or Vice Chairmen (V.C. and V.C.1st), and other members, a Coordinator and such members of the board as the Chairman may, from time to time, require.

7. By direction of the respective Boards, the Vice Chairman will be responsible for providing a report to the Chairman of all matters of the local boards and such other reports as may from time to time be required.

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
