SUBJECT: Social Insurance - Changes

TO : Labour Sub-Commission

Reference cable to Regions 1 - 7 inclusive on the subject of continuation of the freezing of social insurance scales, family allowances &c., jointly drafted by the Finance & Labour Sub-Commissions and despatched by the Economic Section under reference 3537 dated 20 April, Region 7 reported on 22 May to this Sub-Commission that no parallel information had reached the Italian officials in Region 7 from the Government.

From enquiries made, it appears that no new official announcement was made by the Government on this subject additional to a notice already published in the Official Gazette dated 25 March, No. 15. A translation of this notice is attached.

As we understand that the Director of the Labour Sub-Commission saw Marshal Badoglio in connection with the cable referred to, it seems that he is in the best position to judge whether this Gazette notice fulfills the arrangements then agreed upon for parallel instructions through Italian channels.

TRANSLATION

Notice in Official Gazette No. 15, 25 March 1944.

Communication from the Head of the Government.

The Head of the Government announces that new legislation, with effect from 11 February 1944, is in course of preparation that will regulate all labour matters in accordance with orders already issued by the Allied Authorities to the Provincial and Regional Labour Offices, the way of composing individual and collective disputes, the recruitment of labour &c. The same legislation will regulate the Economic and juridical state of the said offices in accordance with R.D. 11 Feb. 44 No. 31. Consequently, pending future provisions on this subject, the working of these offices will remain unchanged.

It is also pointed out that by virtue of R.D.L. 11 Feb. 44 No.32, salaries, prices and tariffs must remain unchanged from those in force on 11 Feb. 44, and that any infraction of this law will be punished in accordance with the rules governing the Nation in time of war.

The working classes will understand that it is in an increase in goods and not in illusory increases in wages that the way to a real betterment of their and the country's economic conditions can be found.

## SOCIAL INSURANCE - ROMA

1. Offices of Social Insurance Institutions will be dealt with in three separate categories

- (a) Head Offices
- (b) Provincial Offices (where separately maintained)
- (c) Special Units, such as hospitals etc.

2. Head Offices (listed at Appendix A)

Head Offices will be subjected to investigations detailed at Appendices B, C and D. These will be the eventual responsibility of the Commissioners for each institution under the direction of HQ AGO, but as some time may elapse before the Commissioners can begin, the DPO will make preliminary arrangements to this end, in consultation with the Senior Labour Officer.

Resumption of normal activities of Head Offices will be authorised by HQ AGO after examination of the information obtained by investigation. As soon as possible uniform scales of contributions and benefits will operate in all liberated territory.

3. Provincial Offices

Provincial Offices will be carefully safeguarded but may be kept open at the discretion of the Senior Officer in consultation with the Senior Labour Officer, making scales for contributions and benefit payments uniform with those in other liberated territory as rapidly as possible. Financing of the provincial offices, as may be necessary, should be done by the Banca d'Italia through the Intendenza di Finanza. No direct advances of AMG funds should be made.

Subsidiary offices, such as postal units, for collections and disbursements, should be treated similarly, provided that internal machinery exists, and funds are available.

4. Special Units

Hospitals, therapeutic and medical clinics operated by Social Insurance Institutions should be encouraged to continue their normal work as far as conditions permit. Any requisitioning of such premises should be discouraged. Financial advances may be necessary and should be dealt with as in para 2 above.

APPENDIX B.Financial investigation of Head Offices.

1. Available personnel will be reviewed, and senior officials cleared on political grounds by the AMG Security Branch.
2. As up - to - date a balance sheet, as possible, will be demanded. Speedy approximations are to be preferred to accuracy. All securities, strong-boxes, safe deposits &c. will be adequately safeguarded and placed under the control of approved officials subject to General Orders on such items. If any such have been removed, the approved officials will be instructed to prepare an inventory of the missing items and report on how their absence is likely to interfere with future operations.
3. An early report will be rendered to AMG describing the condition in which premises, records, funds and personnel are found, and giving recommendations on the fitness of Head Offices to re-assume control of their local offices in both Italian Government and Military Government Territory.

APPENDIX CRecords of operations in the North.

1. It is possible that records will exist in Rome of the operations of the Institute in Northern Italy since the Armistice. Such records should, if possible, be segregated, but at any rate safeguarded. Their examination will primarily concern the Intelligence Branches of the Military Authorities, who should be given facilities for investigation.
2. A report on the changes in contributions and benefits since the institution of the Fascist Social Republic Government should be demanded, and forwarded to HQ AGO.

APPENDIX DStocks of Stamps, Stationery and Supplies

1. There is a considerable shortage of all such stocks in the offices in Southern Italy. All stocks extant in Rome must be safeguarded and inventories compiled by the Institute's officials. (They may later be redistributed under the orders of the Commissioner). Provincial offices, upon reopening, may be permitted economical use of such items as are in their possession.
2. The Head Office of "Previdenza" will be requested to render a report upon the facilities immediately available for reprinting "Previdenza" stamps, and the appropriate military authority will be asked to refrain from requisitioning such printing machinery as is normally used for this purpose, that remain operable.

APPENDIX E.Provincial Office

Whilst the continuance of operations by Provincial Offices is a local AMG responsibility, local Finance and Labour officers should report to their superiors on the conditions of local premises, records, finances and staff.  
This information should be made available to the Commissioner.

Reference your letter #S/512/1/1 of 8 May 42.

1. The instructions to which you refer in the said letter were to the effect that all increases in rates of pay etc., not covered by R.C.C. Instructions, were to be immediately rescinded.

2. The effect of carrying out this instruction in this Province would have been to interfere immediately with essential loading of grain, filling of flour, cleaning of streets and sewers, and other actions of operational importance for which, as Provincial Commissioner, I am directly responsible.

3. By virtue of the prerogative I exercised my prerogative as the Chief Executive of this Province to refer back an order for further instructions, on the ground that it would have effects locally which were not known to the officer who originally initiated the order. This prerogative is clearly defined in King's Rule, but as I have not a copy here, I am unable to refer you to the exact paragraph.

4. I discussed this whole question with the Labour Officer of your M.L.R.C.P., who is more directly concerned here than the Finance Officer, and with the Provincial Commissioner's knowledge, discussed the matter again with Col. Radde, the Labour Officer at A.O.T. As a result of these discussions we have now agreed that we should not resipn certain increases, but should report them directly through labour channels to A.O.T. for formal approval by A.O.T. or otherwise. And this is being done.

5. Under these circumstances I am prepared to discuss any detail of action before any higher authority, and I am quite sure that knowing them, you will agree that I have taken the only possible course.

To : The Prefects of Avellino, Benevento and Naples Provinces.

1. You are hereby authorized and requested to proceed as promptly as possible in the publication of the quotas of unified agricultural contributions for the year 1945 and the preparation of the rolls for use by local tax collectors.

2. Any previous instruction which may have been received from the Allied Military Gov't calling for a fixed 50% (forty per cent) reduction in collections in connection with elimination of amounts formerly allocated to certain Fascist organizations is hereby rescinded. Instead, contributions shall be reduced solely by the actual amounts formerly so allocated in each province. Thus, contributions for the following abolished entities will be eliminated:

Confederazione Agricoltori  
Confederazione Lavoratori Agricoltura  
Partito Nazionale Fascista  
Unione Universale Roma

3. The 1945 quotas shall consist of contributions for the following approved purposes:

Social Insurance (invalidity and old-age, tuberculosis,  
births and marriages)

Family allowances

Sickness assistance

Istituto Cooperazioni

Administrative expenses (in the amount of 5% of the total  
for the other items)

4. In accordance with the provision of R.D.L. 18 March 1945, n. 126, published in the Official Gazette of 31 March 1945 an increase of 50% (fifty per cent) is authorized in the contribution for invalidity and old age. No other increases are authorized.

5. As you have previously been informed, responsibility for the proper functioning of the system of unified agricultural contributions rests with the Prefect in each Province and the facilities and personnel of the Provincial Uffici Contributi Agricoli Unificati have been placed under your jurisdiction for such use and disposition as you find proper. In case of any questions regarding contributions comprising the quotas for 1945, the provincial offices of the Istituto Nazionale della Previdenza Sociale and the Istituto Nazionale per l'Assistenza Malattie ai Lavoratori should be consulted.

SUBJECT: Meeting with officials of Labor Ministry in Salerno, 11 May, 1944.

TO : Colonel J. T. H. Bain  
Lt. Col. Junius R. Smith  
Major James C. Babcock

1. Capt. Woods, Capt. Albright and I had a two-hour session with Under-Secretary Sansonetti, Mr. Mauro and members of the Ministry staff concerned with social insurance, namely:

Dott. Marinaro -- Capo, settore Assicurazione Previdenza  
AVV. Pierini -- specialist for Previdenza Sociale  
Dott. Aramenti -- " " Malattia  
AVV. Rosanelli -- " " Infortuni

2. The following subjects, based on the agenda I had brought along for the meeting, were taken up:

a. Commissioners' Appointments

(1) Informant -- our letter approving appointment of Massuci handed to Sansonetti. He will expedite matter and Massuci should be able to take office within a week.

(2) Providenza Sociale -- proposed nominee has not yet returned from Sicily (Dott. Rosanelli of University of Catania), but is expected in few days, and Capt. Albright will arrange to sent him here for interview.

(3) Malattia -- Dott. Malfettani, present incumbent, has been vetted and his record and qualifications appear to be satisfactory to the Ministry. Complaints against him similar to those we know about in Region III were apparently received in Salerno and have been investigated. Under-Secretary Sansonetti agreed, at my request, to send us a confidential memorandum on their findings as to Malfettani's qualifications from both a political and administrative standpoint. This should be received in a few days.

(4) Ante previdenza -- Alessanti, Vitali -- nomine will be proposed as soon as possible. We discussed the basis for our objection to Prof. Grassiani (who was proposed by previous Ministry and whose name has not been withdrawn). Under-Secretary Sansonetti, who knows Grassiani, is aware of the latter's lack of administrative experience and agreed to consider other pos-

sible candidates.

(5) Contribuzione agricola unificata -- nominees will be proposed as soon as possible. The ministry feels that a separate Commissioner is needed for this job.

(6) Contributi Agricoli Unificati -- after discussion of the need of provincial officials, charged with setting rates for unified agricultural contributions for social insurance, to have some central office to which to turn for technical advice and assistance. It was decided that a Commissioner is unnecessary. Instead, the Labor Ministry will undertake to set up a technical service (one or two experts should be sufficient) with responsibility for giving advice and promoting uniform technical procedures in all provinces in connection with the 1944 CAU collections. I stressed the need for speed, informed Sambonetti of the plan authorized in Region III, and explained that we could arrange for provinces in AND as well as Italian Government territory to avail themselves of the technical service in the interests of uniformity in all Liberated Italy.

(7) Vasse per le ferie vacanze (Bakers' Holiday Fund) -- the ministry was not aware of this problem. I explained the situation as brought to our attention by the Malattia Instituto and records tied up at Rome, the holiday season coming on, and the bakers asking Malattia for payments which it formerly handled in each province on behalf of the Holiday Fund. It was decided that a Commissioner will not be required at present, but that the ministry will at once go into the matter and have one of its sections assume responsibility for a plan to be effective in Liberated Italy. Sambonetti is to inform us of the proposed plan as soon as possible.

#### b. Four Urgent Social Insurance Problems

I explained that these four problems involved inter-regional differences in application of national laws and extent of benefits, that prompt agreement on solutions which could be made effective uniformly in all Liberated Provinces was essential, and that we are prepared to work closely with the ministry in order that the present confused situation may be cleared up at the earliest possible moment.

(1) Assanni Familiari -- Under-Secretary Sambonetti was given copy of proposed schedule of flat rates. I stated the Labor sub-Commission's position and stressed that final determination would necessarily rest upon agreement on the part of Finance Ministry, Finance sub-commission, as well as Labor Ministry and ourselves, and top authority on both sides. However, we wish Labor Ministry to immediately examine this proposal and determine its own position and discuss with us any counter-proposals it may wish to make. Sambonetti indicated his personal agreement with the basic proposition of eliminating the demographic <sup>1386</sup> requirements

in the allowances scale simultaneously with an increase approximating the increase in contributions. He stated he would favor a ~~decreasing~~ scale as an eventual logical step and welcomed the flat rate for each dependent as a feasible first measure which would repudiate the Fascist political principle and at the same time be easier and simpler to establish now.

(2) Indennità di Previdenza -- We discussed proposed abolition of reimbursement to employers by Providence Social Institute. Such reimbursement was suspended by ANI in Sicily and Region III. The situation with respect to contributions is very confused. The Indennità is part of the industrial wage structure, and there is no reason why money should flow from employers to Providence Social and back again under a system which has so failed at the outset that it has never properly functioned. A decree law, republished in ANI territory, placing responsibility for paying Indennità di Previdenza on employers (where it now rests, in actual fact, in provinces outside of Sicily) would clarify situation and put an end to employer contentions that they should be reimbursed for part of cost. I showed Under-Secretary Sansonetti a copy of the report of the Region III Committee for the study of social insurance problems on this subject and pointed out that the Committee, representing labor, management, Regional Labor Office and the Insurance Institutes, unanimously favors abolition of reimbursement. He requested a copy of the report (which was despatched today) as a basis for discussion within the Ministry and the drafting of the proposed decree.

(3) Casse Intereconomie -- In presenting this subject, also, I made use of the Region III Committee's report, which adequately reviews the history of this provision, designed to guarantee to workers employed less than 40 hours a week a wage for the "missing hours" equal to 75% of the pay they would have received if they had worked. I explained the present situation: (a) in Sicily, contributions to the Cassa and payments to workers suspended; (b) in Region III and Region II, contributions still being collected, but payments suspended; (c) in Angie, contributions collected and payments being made. I stated that we would like an expression of view from the Ministry; that the existing state of affairs obviously could not continue; and that both Labor and Finance Sub-Commissions were of the opinion that examination of this program with a view to its abolition was in order under present conditions. This is precisely the recommendation of the Region III Committee. Sansonetti indicated that the Ministry has already been considering the Cassa Intereconomie and while they are aware that the need for it has disappeared in most provinces, including Naples, they wish to weigh all the interests of labor involved before commitment. He readily agreed, however, that steps should be taken to suspend contributions whenever payments are suspended, even if a decree for outright abolition is postponed.

(4) Risarcimenti alle Armi (workers Called to Arms) -- Attention was called to the present situation, in which all military benefits under this program remain suspended in Sicily; are being paid to families of men on both sides of the line in Region II; and are being paid to families of men on this side of the line only in Region III. I explained that we were concerned, first of all, with the establishment of uniformity in whatever provision is made for Italian servicemen and, secondly, we would like to open the question as to what justification exists for the wide disparity in provisions for servizi as compared to risarcimenti. Workers in both groups are currently being called up to join the Allied Forces; risarcimenti families receive the difference between the man's civil pay and military pay, if he is an officer, and the wife or his civil pay, if he is a soldier; servizi families receive only the man's family allowance with the privilege of applying to the command for a military relief grant, based on a salvo deiuti, as a supplement. Under-secretary Massonetti agreed to the need for uniformity in all regions. With regard to the difference in treatment of servizi and risarcimenti, he explained that the "wives and children of servizi can be expected to work and earn some income, whereas the wives and children of risarcimenti cannot". (This is reflected in fact that family allowances cease for servizi children at age 1, but continue for risarcimenti children to age 10 if they are in school.) I explained that we had no definite proposals, but felt that the benefit structure, including existing military relief provisions, should be reviewed in connection with the problem of a uniform national policy for the risarcimenti alle Armi program administered by Instituto Previdenza Sociale.

a. Social Insurance for Direct Employees of Armed Forces:

We had a brief discussion of the question of information which the Italian Government had proposed should be furnished by the Armed Forces. Although limited time prevented the reaching of any definite conclusions, we were able to put over the point that data furnished will have to be minimum and it was agreed that some of the items proposed by the Ministry might be dispensed with. This will need follow-up.

DEFINITION OF HEAVY AND  
EXTRA HEAVY WORKERS

13 Aug 1941;  
Labor Sub-Commission.

1. The following list provides for various industrial categories, specific groups of workers who may be classified as heavy or extra heavy workers.

2. The list is based on previously issued Italian Document issued by the "Confederazione dei Lavoratori del Commercio" in Rome 21 February, 1941 in connection with a Circular number 38 of the same date.

3. The term "heavy workers" is known in Italian as "lavori pesanti" and the term "extra heavy workers" is known as "lavori pesantissimi". Both these terms are well known to the Italian people, and if used should present no difficulty.

4. "Pesanti" and "pesantissimi" can be defined as persons doing work of a heavy nature involving the continuous and strenuous application of physical energy in such processes as lifting, conveying, loading, unloading, cleaning, and other operations of a similar nature.

5. Specific industries and occupations coming under this definition are:

1. Millers, flour-paste makers, rice-workers and threshers: Kneading workers, wheat-washers, kneading machine workers, drivers of engines for cereal's threshing and for agricultural mechanical works (seroton-workers).

2. Agriculture and foodstuffs: (milk, its derivatives and meat working) Cellar workers, can-workers, distributors, cheese-makers, slaughterers, refrigerator-workers, flaying workers.

3. Soda waters, beer, ice, saltus: Refrigerator-workers.

4. Vine and liquors: Packing-workers.

5. Wood: Hand-sawyers.

6. Paper and printing: Driver and Fireman Steam Boiler, Engine, wood bands, machine workers.

7. Chemistry: Pyrites furnaces feeding workers, carbide of calcium furnaces feeding and casting workers, phosphates packing workers, oily seeds pressing workers, pressing filters workers.

8. Tanning: Hand cleaning workers, soles refining workers, pressing machine workers, oil makers.

9. Building: Masons, road workers, carpenters, unskilled labourers, "diminutori", miners, iron workers.

10. Lime, cement, plaster, handmade works in cement and bricks: dig-

ging workers, miners, kiln-men, unskilled labourers, packing into sacks workers, salt tile layers, firemen, putting into the oven workers, taking out of the oven workers, layers, wheel barrow drivers.

11. Glass and ceramics: Blowers, moulders and in general all fire workers.
12. Extractive industry: Miners, diggers, piercere, "disagiatori", "armatori", "imboscatori", "disarmatori" (inside and outside). Trackers (inside) road workers "Decauville" lines layers, next miners, pushers, unskilled labourers (inside and outside), furnaces loaders and unloaders, "lavoratori", stone bond cutters, "modellatori", squares, and in general all sulphur mine workers.
13. Metallurgy and mechanics: All foundry workers and belonging to auxiliary services. Furnaces workers, core makers hand machine "staffatori" "abavatori" sanding workers, firing workers, blacksmiths, metallic carpenters, railway cars makers and repairers mechanical workers, galvanizing workers, ship demolition workers, ship makers, ship equipping or repairing workers.
14. Gas, electricity, pipelines: Firemen, driver engine loco, steam turbine workers furnace and boiler, loading and unloading workers, gas separating machine workers, furnace masons, blacksmiths linemen (electricity, water and gas), electricians and water workers in mountains higher than 1000 meters, coal loading and unloading workers, roadworkers, masons.
15. Trucks, Railways and tramways: Drivers engine loco, firemen, armature workers, cars cleaning workers, drivers trucks.
16. Fishing: All workers in little fishing in sailing rowing boats inferior to 10 tons of tonnage - tunny fishing workers (season works).
17. Postmen
18. Printing Industry

Extra Heavy Workers ("lavori pesanti scavi")

Quarry Workers: Miners, sawyers, labourers over 1000 meters in height, handlers of freight over 100 Kg., all port labourers, timber jacks.



SUBJECT: Liquidation of Independent Port Authority

TO : Director, Labor Sub-Commission

1. The Independent Port Authority has existed in one form or another since 1920. It was reconstituted with its present name under a law of 1940, modified by a law of 1941. It is essentially a Para-Statal agency - the status of its employees being very similar to that of railroad workers.

2. The Port Authority has obtained its operating funds, not from the State, but from a special anchorage tax and percentage fees paid by various private firms doing work in the port on a concession basis. I am not certain of exact details of these arrangements.

3. As I understand the pending decree, both the Port Authority itself and certain firms (aziende) supplying machinery and equipment are "liquidated", and, hence, there will be two groups of employees affected -- the employees (impiegati) of the Port Authority and the workers of the dissolved firms, which have had a quasi-public status.

4. The Port Authority operated its own social insurance provisions and set aside funds for the purpose, including funds to pay the dismissal indemnities specified in the decree. The decree provides that the State (in the person of the Italian Royal Naval Command for the Port) will take over the insurance funds and assume responsibility for paying benefits due the workers of both classes.

5. In view of the above general picture and in view of the probability that the State can absorb a majority of the liquidated employees as workers for the Port Naval Command, it is my opinion that:

a. It would be disadvantageous to the workers and contrary to sound social insurance policy for those who can be immediately rehired as State employees to be paid dismissal indemnities and thus lose their future rights to credit for their years of employment with the Para-Statal Port Authority.

b. A clause in the decree or a separate order could provide that accrued insurance funds and insurance rights of such rehired workers be retained for them in their status as State employees, provided they apply for State employment within a specified period and do not accept a dismissal indemnity.

c. Those not rehired would be entitled to payment of dismissal indemnities and any other benefits due them.

1. Confirming our telephone conversation of yesterday, 28 April 1944, the above Administrative Instruction, while entirely sound in its aim to ensure uniformity in the interpretation of the Regional Tax Adjustment Order, involves questions which are currently under consideration in the Labor Sub-Commission and on which final decision has not yet been made. I refer particularly to the treatment of Family Allowances. However, apart from the problem of proper treatment of such allowances, there appear to be other problems, arising from current differences in practice with respect to State employees' compensation, which this Administrative Instruction would not properly resolve, and which must be determined in relation to the existing general, rather than a particular regional, situation.

2. In view of the above points and in accordance with the intent of the telegram of 27 April No. 3537 from this Headquarters on the subject of wages, indemnities and social insurance, withdrawal of the Administrative Instruction referred to is necessary and information to this effect should be communicated to all concerned.

3. At the same time, it is requested that information on hand with respect to compensation systems now in effect for public employees, including inter-provincial and inter-agency differences, be transmitted promptly, with any recommendations you wish to make, to the Labor Sub-Commission.

1. Reference is made to Regional Order No. 2/(Temporary Wage Adjustment) Articles I and IV.

2. State employees salaries are supplemented by sundry indemnities and allowances and opinion differs as to the method of calculating the percentage increases in Art. IV. Therefore, the following will be observed in all Provinces throughout the Region.

3. As of 1 April 1944, increase shall be applied in accordance with the scale as specified in Art. IV upon:-

a. (1) Salary, (2) Indemnity for Active Service,  
~~(3) Family Allowance~~, (4) War Allowance, and (where payable),  
~~(5) Prisoner (or bombardment indemnity)~~. These items to be totalled for the purpose of determining the amount of the increase.

b. Travel indemnity to be calculated separately for the purpose of determining the amount of the increase.

c. Efficiency prizes (payable semi-annually) similarly will be calculated as a separate item for the purpose of determining the amount of the increase.

4. This instruction is issued to ensure uniformity and to convey the Regional Commissioner's interpretation of the Order and does not affect the terms thereof.

Considering the necessity of instituting a Commission that should proceed in the studies for a reform of the Social Insurances;

Having heard the Council of the Ministers. On proposal of our Minister for Industry, Commerce and Labor, and in agreement with the Minister of Finances;  
We have decreed and decree:

Art. I

A royal Commission is instituted at the Ministry of Industry, Commerce, and Labor to examine the forms of Social providence and insurances now existing in Italy, aiming to a reform of the present legislation, inspired by the exigences of having a more simple and uniform regulation that should extend the limits of State Assistance in favour of the working classes.

Art. II

The Commission is constituted by a President, by three Vice Presidents and by seventeen members chosen as follows:

- a) two University professors(ordinary) of financial mathematics
- b) two University professors in the roll list of methodologic statistics
- c) two University professors of economical matters
- d) one University professor of administrative law
- e) five exponents of the categories of labor-employers in the field of Industry of Agricoltura of commerce, credit and of transport
- f) five exponents of laborers chosen with the same standard fixed for the givers of work.

The appointment of the President, of the Vice Presidents and of the members of the Commission will be made by decree of the Head of the Government in agreement with the Ministers interested

The directors of the Institutes that administrate the different forms of social providence can be attached to the Commission as experts, with consulting vote.

- 2 -

Decree of the Minister of Industry, Commerce and Labor  
secretary of the Commission shall be nominated, to be  
chosen among the State functionaries of degree not inferior  
to the VI

Art. 3

The President of the Commission has faculty of requesting  
the assistance and the cooperation that he deems necessary  
from all the State Administrations and the Bodies of public  
right.

The Commission, even through its single members if they are  
delegated by it, has a right to take vision of all documents  
even those of reserved character, to investigate, and to ef-  
fectuate inspections in the Institutes of Social Providence  
for every thing that relates their activity.

However in regards to the nomination for the Commissioner of the "Istituto Nazionale della Previdenza Sociale", we want to inform you that in spite of all the persons interviewed amongst which eventually the Commissioner of the aforementioned Institution shall have to be picked, it has not been possible, so far, to find anyone who is disposed to accept such position.

Therefore, we find it necessary to confirm the proposal previously made to this Commission regarding Prof. Luigi Lordi. Nevertheless, in order to attach to the aforementioned Commission two other persons technically adapted to working with him in directing the Institute, this Ministry proposes that when Prof. Lordi is named Commissioner, there can likewise be nominated two Vice-Commissioners, namely, Doctor Mansuetti Ermanni and Doctor Latte Carmine, respectively, Central Administrative Inspector, and Sanitary Inspector for the Institute.

Doctor Mansuetti and Doctor Latte are both competent in these branches, and together they are the two highest in grade for the "Istituto della Previdenza Sociale" in liberated Italy. In particular Doctor Mansuetti has actually the function of administrative inspector for Sicily, and Doctor Latte is sanitary inspector for Campania, Lucania and Calabria.

Due to the urgencies that require the above named nominations, we pray the Commission to favor us with an approval.

We take this occasion to inform you that this Ministry ~~has made~~ <sup>WILL NAME</sup> these proposals for the "Ente Nazionale della Previdenza" for the dependents of the State.

For seeing that the actual economic system will bring further increases in salaries, this delay in practice will be a real and paper reduction of family allowances. The section of these last ones will verify that they will not get ulterior increase in their salaries and the workers will live on hope of other increases. While this new system is underway the family allowances will remain at 17 and decided in the measure of January 18, 1944 and the contribution that the employers will give to the welfare office will remain the same.

1. This Sub-Commission proposed to issue a memorandum outlining the welfare functions for which it is responsible. The memorandum when complete will be for the use of all other Sub-Commissions and for Regional public health and welfare officers and C.A.O.'s generally. The purpose of the memorandum is to clarify the lines of communication and responsibility and also to assist Regional public health and welfare officers in obtaining uniformity of action as between Regions.

2. As a number of other Sub-Commissions cover activities closely allied with welfare, it is desired to include in the memorandum a description of those related functions and the Italian agencies performing them. It will be of assistance if the interested Sub-Commissions will themselves prepare these statements for inclusion in the memorandum.

3. There is enclosed a skeleton draft of the proposed memorandum. Such comments as may be included concerning your Sub-Commission are not considered to be either final or official. They are based on former understandings or preliminary discussions and are used only to indicate the type of information desired from your Sub-Commission. A complete description of your Sub-Commission is not necessary, what is needed is a statement of those matters which are allied to welfare activities and a description of the existing Italian agencies performing them.

4. We would appreciate a draft of the material to be inserted concerning your Sub-Commission, at your earliest convenience.

MEMORANDUM:

SUBJECT: - Agencies Responsible for Welfare &amp; Related Functions.

TO :

## I. PUBLIC RELIEF:

(Generally- that assistance given purely on the basis of need and not on the basis of prior contributions paid by the recipient or his employer to a fund for his benefit.)

## A. - Food Sub-Commission:

(a) The obtaining and rationing of food for all the population is (with the assistance of certain other Sub-Commission) under the jurisdiction of the food Sub-Commission. This Sub-Commission - (Request insert of the food sub-Commission a brief description of the responsibilities of the sub-Commission concerning 'Food for all civilians', the description particularly designed to indicate to regional welfare and public health officers from what source they can obtain information on types and amounts of food to be available, prices, etc., and to whom they can give information if they find that in a given situation food is not reaching recipients of relief.)

(b) The food sub-Commission also obtains limited amounts, such as cheese, milk, canned goods, etc., which are available to certain sections of the population - refugee camps, hospitals, institutions for the aged, children, etc. Regional public health and welfare officers will be informed of the stocks on hand by the public health sub-Commission. Regional public health and welfare officers should at all times make known to public health sub-commission its needs and the evidence supporting those needs so that requests can be made by Public Health Sub-Commission to draw on the stocks of special food and also in order that the Public health sub-Commission can give the food sub-Commission information on which to estimate future requirements.

## B. - Public Health Sub-Commission:

(a) The public health sub-Commission through its welfare Sub-section works with those Italian agencies whose functions involve the assistance to civilians already established in a community (see para. I (c) on displaced person sub-commission and para. I (d) on Refugee sub-Commission) who have no other means of support, for that portion of the population who are unable to obtain food because of lack of income even though food as such is available in the community, assistance is, where practicable, given in cash. This operation and the Italian agencies involved are in ACC/AMC primarily a responsibility of public health sub-Commission. The larger Italian agencies involved in this work and to which the Public Health sub-Commission responsibility extends are:

## I. Ente Comunale di Assistenza.

A relief agency, operating in every commune, it is headed by the Simaco, but receives its funds from the National Government. The following are examples of the forms of aid usually extended by it:

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ers on vendors for food, or the operation of soup kitchens, aid in case, either continuously, or subject to re-application each time aid is desired.  
 Aid to refugees from other parts of Italy, or from Italian colonies.  
 Aid is extended to persons established in Comunes by the Italian refugee branch of the P.C. and M.G. Section.  
 Aid to transients and the homeless.  
 Aid to persons who received money from relatives in foreign countries.  
 Advances to persons who expect to receive indemnification for destruction of personal property by enemy action.

2. provincial welfare departments.

Organized in Sicily to supervise the operations of family welfare and child welfare activities in the comunes, to establish standards of care, to inspect and make recommendations, and to supervise the use of funds allotted to the comunes for these purposes. The provincial welfare department is responsible to the prefect.

3. Soccorso militare.

A communal agency, which certifies for payment persons in need who are entirely dependent upon men now serving in the Italian Army, exclusive of officers. Payment is usually made through the post office. It is understood funds come from the Italian Minister of the Interior. This agency is not operating in Sicily.

4. Distretto militare.

Operates with funds from, and under the Italian Ministry of War, makes payments are charges against the pay of the individual and are not paid on a "needs" basis. The activity of the Distretto militare is in the nature of an allotment and not relief based on need.

5. Opera nazionale fra Mutilati ed Invalidi di Guerra.

A national organization for incapacitated war veterans. Some specializes medical care and orthopedic appliances are made available, efforts are made to find employment for persons of limited employability, and small sums of money may be given. The National Italian Government supplied fund. Supervision is exercised through a national headquarters. Applications usually handled by unpaid workers in the communes.

6. Associazione nazionale delle famiglie dei Caduti in Guerra.

A national organization serving chiefly the families of those killed in war. Aid is given families in the obtaining of pensions, and small cash contributions may be given. The Italian National Government normally supplied by the National Italian Government.

7. Opera nazionale per gli Orfani di Guerra.

A national association, providing scholarships and funds for the education of war orphans. It also renders social services arranging placement and sometimes contributing to the support of orphans in institutions. Funds are normally supplied by the National Italian Government.

(Request that Regional Public Health and welfare officers add any already available information regarding these agencies as to amount of benefits in the particular region and as to whether these agencies or any other major agencies, <sup>and</sup> listed, are functioning in the region.)

8. Displaced persons sub-commission.

Request insert by Displaced Persons Sub-Commission of a description of the

classes of people and methods of handling, including such housing feeding, clothing, etc., as is performed by the Displaced Persons sub-Commission and the Italian agencies involved. Also statement of the point at which the public health sub-Commission is expected to provide for these people, which as we understand it, has in the past been, that displaced persons living or finally established in communes (not in camps or congregate shelters) are at that point assisted through E.C.I., which in turn is in ACC/AGC a responsibility of public health sub-Commission.

1. Refugee Branch of E.C. and U.G. section.  
Request insert by refugee branch of E.C. and U.G. Section of a description of the classes of people and methods of handling, including, such housing, feeding, clothing etc., as is performed by the refugee branch and the Italian agencies involved. Also include statement of the point at which, the public health sub-Commission is expected to provide for these people, which as we understand it, has in the past been, that Italian refugees living or finally established in the communes (not in camps or congregate shelters) are at that point assisted through the E.C.I., which in turn is in ACC/AGC a responsibility of public health sub-Commission.

2. ASSISTANCE IN THE NATURE OF INSURANCE RATES. SUBSTITUTION E.D.

A. Labor sub-Commission.

The labor sub-Commission works with those Italian agencies where benefits or assistance arises out of prior contributions by the employee, employer or state where the benefits are in the nature of a wage substitute. Generally, these agencies are under the jurisdiction of the Italian ministry of labor, industry and commerce. The larger Italian agencies involved in this work are:

1. Istituto nazionale della previdenza sociale.

This institute administers some social insurance, supported by contributions from workers or employers.

Pensions for invalidity and old age.

Care of tubercular persons, including medical and institutional care, as well as limited assistance to the families of these persons.

Unemployment insurance.

Loans to those contemplating marriage.

Cash supplement to wages, based upon size of family.

2. Istituto nazionale per le assicurazioni contro gli infortuni.

This institute provides assistance for employees injured in industrial accidents and occupational diseases. It is supported by employer contribution. Typical benefits provided are:

Cash indemnity and medical, surgical and hospital care to injured or disabled.

Cash grants to the family of a deceased to cover immediate funeral expenses.

A pension to the family of a deceased.

Pensions to the totally disabled.

Financial aid and educational opportunities for orphans of covered workers.

3. Istituto nazionale assistenza malattia ai lavoratori.

This agency, supported by contributions of the employer and the employee provides:

Daily compensation during sickness.

Medical and surgical care to the insured.

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medical care to other members of the insured's family, aid to cover special situations, and funeral expenses. Grants at child birth.

(Request Labor Sub-Commission develop this list both as to description of function of agencies, amounts of benefits, whether they operate in all provinces and suggested methods of clearance between public welfare agencies and those labor agencies on individual cases. Also request any important agencies omitted in this list be added w/ appropriate descriptions.)

3. ASSISTANCE FOR THE AGED, THE DISABLED AND CHILDREN.

a. Public Health Sub-Commission.

The public Health Sub-Commission through its welfare sub-section covers institutions for the aged, the infirm and for children (except correctional or penal) when these institutions are supported in whole or in part by public funds. Due to the complexity and number of institutions of this character and to the fact that few of them are established on a national basis, no attempt at listing them by name or function is contemplated in this memorandum.

Request regional public health and welfare officers expression of opinion as to whether a listing of these institutions should be attempted and if it is desired, they be listed, such pertinent information as is available in the regions or desired from other regions.

b. Public Safety Sub-Commission.

Correctional and penal institutions for children are under the jurisdiction of Public Safety Sub-Commission.

(Request Public Safety Sub-Commission insert description of the functions on this subject.)

c. CIVILIAN CIVILIAN Agencies.

a. Allied Red Cross.

(Request insert of functions performed and services available to the civilian population by the Allied Red Cross.)

b. ASSOCIAZIONE SAN VINCENZO DI ROMA.

Public Health Sub-Commission is requesting an official statement from International Red Cross, Italian Red Cross and the Associazione San Vincenzo di Roma as to the functions these organizations feel they are able to fulfill. These statements when obtained will be incorporated in this memo.

5. UNCLASSIFIED AND INTERNATIONAL SUBJECTS.

a. Public Safety Sub-Commission.

Requests as to the whereabouts, safety and condition of civilians in Italy are handled by the Public Safety Sub-Commission through the Carabinieri, such requests should be referred to Public Safety Officers.

(Request Public Safety Sub-Commission comment on this statement.)

b. POW and internees and Italian soldiers on active duty in Allied Occupied Territory.

Public Health Sub-Commission has requested information from the Administrative Directorate on the agencies responsible for clearance of information on the above questions.

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**5. CHILD WELFARE****A. Public Health Sub-Commission.**

The majority of the children's and youth organization in Italy had strong political objectives and are not now operating. The necessity for the establishment of some governmental agency to deal with welfare problems peculiar to children has been recognized in the establishment by allied action of child welfare sections in the provincial welfare departments in Sicily. The preoccupation Italian children's organizations now in existence are:

**Opera nazionale per la maternità e l'infanzia.**

Operates a general program of maternal and child health service which varies considerably in its emphasis between provinces. The following may be provided:

Consultation services to pregnant mothers.

Meals to pregnant women or nursing mothers, either in central locations or by means of orders for food.

Temporary care in maternity institutions.

for children, admission to pediatric clinics, provision of extra food and milk; operation of day nurseries and nursery schools.  
Supervision is through a national headquarters, money supplied by the national government.

SUBJECT: Social Insurance Premium

In accordance with my conversation of this morning, the following is the outline of the case on which a ruling is sought. It is pointed out that a number of cases in which the same principle is involved have been brought to the notice of this office.

1. A Building Contract was entered into between the firm of Pisa and Infortuni (hereafter known as Pisa) and the Comitato Tessile (hereafter known as C.T.S.) approved on 21 Nov. 1943 to run from 7 Nov. 1943.

2. There is at the moment recited in effect that the C.T.S. will not be responsible for the various risks usually covered by insurance.

3. Pisa states that he will be bound by the labor laws of the areas in which he operates.

4. Pisa states, previously writing on para. 2, that in November 1943 he contacted the state insurance institution known as the Institut National de l'Assurance contre l'Infortune et le Travail (hereafter known as the Institut) to obtain certain "Workers Compensation" provided by the Infortuni but alleges that such insurance cover was refused on the grounds that the necessary provision was being made by the Allied Military Government. As a result Pisa quotes that he did not include in his contract price any sum to cover this item.

5. The contract was concluded on January 21, 1944, and the Infortuni now claim that the insurance premiums should have been paid from 7th November, 1943. Pisa, however, points out that as any resistance to cover this amount was excluded from the contract he is not in a position to make the payment demanded.

6. The Infortuni estimate that as the wages paid out by Pisa would amount to L. 4,000,000 they are due to receive L. 200,000. In addition to which Pisa is liable for a fine of L. 200,000 for non-compliance with the labor laws.

7. On the suggestion of Pisa, contact was made with Capt. Shilton S. Morris, Mr. C.T.S., who was alleged to have been acting as I. O. when the contract was being negotiated. The case was presented to Capt. Morris who having

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referred to a higher authority informed this office on 5th Feb. 19~~44~~, that there was no claim against Pisa. Letters were therefore sent by this office to that effect to Pisa and the Infortuni. The latter, however, continue to press their claim against Pisa in spite of the letter which was naturally written over the signature of the A.M.G. and also in spite of the fact that, on their own admission they gave Pisa no insurance coverage during the period of the contract.

S. The directions of the proper authority in this matter would be appreciated at an early date, please.

SUBJECT: INSURANCE

TO : Major Duncan, ADCOT, APC 78. (via) re: Labor Division, Reg. 3, COT

1. On 7 November 1943, a contract was negotiated between Highway Division, Transportation Section, TOS and Engineer Gennaro Mangoni, whereby former stipulated that, the latter would operate and maintain (let and end etc.) a civilian truck organization.

2. The undersigned was appointed as liaison Officer between the U.S. Government and the civilian organization.

3. Clause 9 of the above contract No. 3-407-78-1, released the Government of the United States of America of all responsibility as regards ~~EXCLUDED~~ insurance of personnel, or of third persons, but delayed on advice of the Insurance Officer, the insuring of personnel. This advice was based on information from the Judge Advocate's Office, that the Italian Government had agreed to carry full insurance.

4. Shortly after consummation of the contract, a representative of the civilian organization, accompanied by the liaison Officer, visited various U.S. and Italian Offices, in an effort to determine, according to the terms of the armistice, the status of Italian Law as applied to the Occupied Area, and specifically, with regard to the insuring of civilian personnel employed by the U.S. Government. No information could be obtained, but a secretary of the prefect of Naples finally agreed to investigate the matter further.

5. Engineer Mangoni had initially insured against accidents to third persons, and when, after several weeks, the Prefect's Office announced that the Italian Law held, as regards insurance of personnel, he at once contacted Signor Ruscilli, of an Italian insurance agency. The latter when the situation was explained, agreed to disregard the time lost, and any accrued penalties, and it was decided that the new policy would be effective as of 22 January, 1944.

6. Meanwhile, on 22 January, 1944, for the reasons of policy, the contract between Engineer Mangoni and the U.S. Government was terminated. Signor Ruscilli, when informed of the fact, then stated, on behalf of his company, that Engineer Mangoni would be held responsible for premiums payable on personnel insurance since the formation of the organization.

7. Following a conversation between Major Duncan of ADCOT, the undersigned, relative to the rights of the matter Capt. Harold Bergman, expressed the opinion that inasmuch as engineer Mangoni had acted throughout in good faith, as he had submitted no invoice to the U.S. Government for such premiums, and as the U.S. Government had received no benefit from said insurance, there was no liability involved.

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8. It would appear that the question is one of interpretation and clarification of terms. If, under the terms of the Armistice, as regards the insuring of Italian personnel employed by the Government of the United States, the term "Labor" applies to both direct and contract labor, then evidently, the insurance company has no true claim against Engineer Mangoni. If said claim is declared valid, then it is requested that AMGOT recommend to the Administrative Officer of Transportation Section, PBS, the payment, by him, of any sum awarded the plaintiff in settlement of the case.

Because both the Labour and Finance Sub-Commission, A.C. will have responsibilities of varying degrees concerning the operation and overall supervision of the several social insurance plans in force in Italy, it has been deemed appropriate that their respective parts in this activity be made a matter of record. Thus, designation of effort will be avoided.

It is agreed between the two Sub-Commissions, therefore, that the following are the broad areas in which each will operate, through time properly constituted Italian authorities:

The Labour Sub-Commission shall assume responsibility for:

1. The adequacy of payments to beneficiaries in the several categories, in cooperation with the Public Welfare Sub-Commission.
2. The proper functioning of the several organizations as they exist or may be changed to ensure prompt and regular payments.
3. All dealings with labour which touch on the insurance systems.

The Finance Sub-Commission shall assume responsibility for all of the following, where deemed advisable:

1. Complete actuarial analyses of the several systems to determine their financial soundness, and recommendations for changes, if any, as a result of such analyses.
2. Study of the operation of the systems with a view to increasing their efficiency and eliminating waste, dishonesty in administration, if any, and recommendations for change.

Workers who are guaranteed employment -- those that live at place of employment -- doormen and families in general service -- those that are classed as indispensable -- workers who are hired on a contract basis for a period of six months or less.

Contributions actually being made are those resulting from the table.

SUBJECT: Summary Report of Committee as of 29 Jan 1944

To : Labor Sub Commission--Col J. T. R. Bain

1. The Committee, appointed by Col. Bain on Jan 12, 1944 consisted of Major Fisher, Lt. Salenberger, Capt. Ernest, of Welfare Sub Commission, and Capt. Albright, Chairman. Meetings were held on January 20 (with Dr. Mario Silvano and Dr. Mauro of the Italian Ministry of Labor) and on January 27, at the latter meeting Capt. Silvano was present in place of Capt. Ernest.
2. The Committee agreed on the following division of the Responsibility between Sub Commissions:

(A) Labor should handle those programs which relate to "workers" and their families and are supported by contributions from wage earners and/or employers.

(B) From an administrative viewpoint, Labor should also handle related programs which are under the jurisdiction of the Previdenza, the Cassa Mutua Mazzatorta, and the Istituto Infortuni.

(C) On certain technical matters the Labor Sub Commissions should consult with Health or with Finance Sub Commissions.

(D) Welfare should handle those programs not covered above.

3. Minutes of both meetings were filed by Capt. Robertson. A separate report has been filed by Capt. Albright on the Infortuni. A plan has also been filed for insurance coverage for Civilian Workers of the Allied Military Forces.

ASSURANCE PAYMENT FOR CIVILIAN LABOR

The Royal Navy employs a certain number of contractors who supply labor and/or materials for Naval use. In the case of labor, the question of payment of the various contributions, insurance, etc., (amounting to 50% of the wages) has been under consideration. It is understood that the British and American Services are not required to pay taxes and contributions, (e.g., when labor is directly employed and not through a contractor) but if contractors are required to pay the contributions, they cannot fail to pass these charges on, in which case the service is in fact paying them. In view of this, it seems reasonable to make no differentiation between the directly and indirectly employed so far as wages or contributions are concerned, with a consequent saving of money to the Services.

2. It is requested that I may be informed of your views on this matter and if the contributions are to be paid, it is further requested that full details of the contributions and taxes etc., may be supplied. As the matter is now urgent, it would be appreciated if an early reply could be given.

SUBJECT: Social Insurance Coverage for Civilian Labor

1. Reference is made to your letter of 29th December, 1943, addressed to Hq., AMC Region 3, requesting our views on the question of insurance coverage for civilian labor employed by contractors serving the Allied Forces.

2. Social insurance provisions in Italy fall within three main categories, each of which is administered by a national agency, with branches in each province; namely:

(1) General protection of individuals and their families through compensation and allowances in cases of invalidity and old age, tuberculosis, unemployment, underemployment (less than normal work week), military service, marriages and births, and through family allowances paid with wages in the cases of workers of certain classes -- administered by Istituto nazionale della Previdenza Sociale (National Social Insurance Institute).

(2) Insurance against sickness, with provision for medical care and compensation -- administered by Istituto per l'assistenza ai Malati e ai Lavoratori (Institute for Sickness Assistance to Workers).

(3) Insurance against industrial accidents and occupational disease -- administered by Istituto Nazionale per l'assistenza contro gli Infortuni sul Lavoro (Institute for Insurance against Accidents at Work).

3. The above insurances are obligatory with respect to employers and employees under Italian law. Although certain of the benefit provisions -- notably those for underemployment and military service -- are temporarily suspended by AMI order, all of the insurance contributions are currently subject to collection from Italian employers. Moreover, we are encouraging the insurance agencies (which are under supervision of the AMC Labor Division in Region 3) in the conduct of a law-enforcement drive. We are of the opinion, therefore, that it would be unfortunate and indefensible to exempt Army or Navy contractors from compliance with the social insurance laws and to permit them to disregard obligations toward their employees which other Italian employers are compelled to recognize.

4. It is true that British and American services are not required to make insurance contributions with respect to labor employed directly by them, since the Armed Forces are not subject to provisions of Italian law. Provision has been made, however, for accident compensation coverage for such labor through the regular Italian Inforni agency, with premium costs charged to the Italian government. In our opinion, the entire question of extending other types of insurance coverage to workers employed directly by the armed forces should be explored thoroughly in the near future, with a view to working out a formula that would at the very least give sickness, unemployment, old-age and invalidity protection to these workers. Compelling reason for such a move, aside from the welfare of the workers themselves, are: (1) the difficulty of continuing to operate a national insurance program for any extended period of time on a sound basis with so large a block of the labor force excluded from participation and contributions, (2) the desirability of doing everything possible to reduce labor turnover and promote stable employment on Army and Navy work projects by means of legitimate incentives, of which normal minimum insurance protection is certainly one.

5. Because of the complexity of the various insurance schemes and variations in rates, it is not possible to furnish you with a single set of percentages which would be applicable to all contractors serving the Royal Navy. A typical figure would be about 4.5% of the payroll, with variations of as much as 5% either way. This would include variable health, accident and social insurance premiums averaging about 1.5% and the following fixed contributions for particular purposes:

- (a) Family allowances (assegni familiari) paid as part of wages and determined by size of family and past earnings..... 20%
- (b) Compensation for underemployment (Cassas Integraciones) by reason of less than normal work week..... 5%
- (c) Fund for workers recalled to Italian armed forces -- to finance allowances to their dependents:
  - For laborers..... 1%
  - For other employees..... 5%

We shall be glad to have an exact determination made of the percentage contributions and premiums for which any particular Italian contracting firm is liable, should you so desire. We can also undertake to furnish more detailed information as to the different insurance programs upon request.

Capt. Albright, stated that he would make available for the minutes a paper on social insurance, one that was presented in Berlin.

What branch of the Italian Government is in charge of social insurance?

Dr. Salibante:

The Ministry of Industry, Commerce and Labor.

Capt. Albright:

Are there functions exercised by other units or affecting the insurance program?

Dr. Salibante:

No, it is handled entirely by the Minister of Industry, Commerce and Labor.

It should be here stated that the interpreter, who was engaged, was incapable of accurate translation and was excused.

Dr. Salenberg:

Do you supervise the hospitals that are maintained for sick or injured workers?

Dr. Salibante:

They are under the general health officer, usually the same hospitals available to the general public.

Capt. Zarrest:

How are they financed?

Dr. Salibante:

By contributions.

Major Fisher:

Are any different plans for the operation of the social insurance program in contemplation?



REPORT ON THE ACTIVITIES OF THE MUTUAL INSURANCE COMPANIES

In the Province of Matera at present four Sickness Groups are operating, two of which have their seat in Matera, these two being that of Industry and of Agriculture, while those of Commerce and Insurance are under the orders of the Bari Division.

The purpose for which the "Mutuals" were created was to assure, in accordance with the various statutes of the various groups sickness insurance to the laborers.

The diversity in statutes has always created inequality among the various kinds of workers, to eliminate this inconvenience eventually the NATIONAL INSTITUTE FOR SICKNESS INSURANCE FOR WORKERS was created (based on law of 11 January 1943 n. 138) which was to provide for unification of insurance groups and the establishment of a single statute. Interference by war events did not permit complete putting into effect of the measure foreseen by law.

At present the Groups are functioning separately with separate administrations and give assistance based on their respective statutes, the various differences of which we deem necessary to point out.

"MUTUAL" FOR SICKNESS OF INDUSTRIAL WORKERS

The Industrial Group gives its proper members, without group distinction, the following benefits:

- 1) Daily benefit (family members excluded)
- 2) General and specialized medical-surgical assistance.
- 3) Pharmaceutical assistance.
- 4) Extraordinary support
- 5) Funeral funds.
- 6) Health assistance in favor of families of the members.

Sickness compensation is based on the amounts established in the following table:

"MUTUAL" FOR SICKNESS OF AGRICULTURAL WORKERS

The Agricultural Group gives its proper members:

- 1) Daily compensation to all categories including tenants and to families of all the members.
- 2) Health Assistance;
- 3) Medical specialized assistance excluding dental treatment;
- 4) Medical pharmaceutical assistance for all members including tenants and family members.

Sickness compensation is paid in amounts based on the following table:

Salaried category: Permanent, habitual, occasional	L. 7 daily
The same categories for women and children	L. 5 *
Exceptional categories, men	L. 5 *
Tree crews, olive crushers and threshers	L. 6 *

These expenses as above and administrative costs are met through contributions of the workers and employers on the following basis:

- a) Industry - 5.10 on gross wages with accounting system.
- b) Agriculture - Tree, oil and threshing with accounting system based at L. 1.60 for men and L. 0.40 for women and boys for each day of work.

For the remaining categories the office arranges for payment of unified deductions based on the following table:

#### COORDINATING AGENCIES

Had been created at the respective Federations with a compensation fund, which had the function of distributing equally receipts among the various Provinces so as to give to each the same means.

Under that point of view, an Industry Division, deficitary in that Province, received a subsidy variable in accordance with the requirements of the moment, while that of the Agriculture contributed with statement advances to the operations of the sister groups of other provinces, whose revenues were insufficient for its operations.

REPORT ON THE UNION ORGANIZATION OF MATERA PROVINCE

Instead of the Fascist Union organizations, dissolved by Regional Order No. 5, no other Union organization had as yet been created in the Province of Matera.

The Christian-Democratic Party had begun the establishments of a Union and some members of other parties had made application to the Governor of the Province to also obtain authorization to establish other Unions. But the Governor, believing that the organization of the Party Unions would mask the political organization of the various parties, which is prohibited, had ordered the closing of the seat of the demo-Christian Union and has not authorized the establishment of Unions applied for by members of other Parties.

As matters stand, therefore, there is no Union in the Province.

Memorandum on Operation of  
Istituto Nazionale de la Previdenza Sociale

Procedures now in use for establishing the right to eligible social security benefits - old age, unemployment, invalidity, maternity, marriage, and tuberculosis.

1. When a worker is employed, the employer at once notifies I.N.P.S. (Mod.0.9)
2. I.N.P.S. checks files to see if worker already has no identification number.
3. If he has no number, one is assigned to him.
4. I.N.P.S. then sets up (a) a small index card (ad.0.6) in the name of the employee; (b) an account card (Mod.0.7) also in the name of the employee;
5. I.N.P.S. then forwards (at it may picked up) a Stamp Book (Mod.0.1) to the employer, which contains:
  - a. On its face, personal history of the employee
  - b. On the inside of cover, spaces for the employer to affix stamps which represent taxes due for social security.
  - c. On the back, printed instructions.
6. Stamps. These are in 85 denominations and were purchased by the employer at a local post office or the local office of I.N.P.S. The employer bought stamps for the whole, but deducted the worker's share (one third) from his wages. The post office remitted to Rome the amounts collected from the sale of such stamps, but the small proceeds of stamp sales by I.N.P.S. were reserved by that agency for emergency distribution. The Naples office now has stamps to a total value of lire 10,000,000 but many series of the smaller denominations are practically exhausted and the stamps on hand are not suitable or adequate to meet present requirements: (In the event these stamps should be used, it is suggested in the Conclusion of this Memorandum, it is recommended that they should be overprinted to indicate current validity). 1308
7. When stamp book was completed filled, the employer surrendered it to I.N.P.S. where stamps were examined for validity and then cancelled by punching.
8. At the same time I.N.P.S. issued "Libretto Personale" (Mod. 0.1 bis) to employee, which contains space for entering the amount of taxes

paid for employee's benefit. This book is held by the employee and surrendered to I.N.P.S. whenever another stamp book is filled, so that amount of the contributions may be transferred to the employee's credit.

9. Above procedure is forwarded until employer becomes an applicant for benefits.
10. When application for benefits is made, the employee fills out a form for the specific benefit to be received, which he submits to the local I.N.P.S. office.
11. Local office investigates application. In the case of sick benefits, a physical examination is required, other investigations for other types of benefits are made.
12. If application for benefits is approved in local office, a certificate of approval is issued in duplicate - one copy retained in files at local office - the other forwarded to National Headquarters of I.N.P.S. at Rome. At the same time applicant receives from local office a certified booklet to be used in claiming benefits in cash at his local post office.
13. I.N.P.S. at Rome issued, in the name of the applicant for old age benefits, a punched booklet of 24 Tickets (enough for two years) and sent this booklet to local post office.
14. Once a month when applicant applied at local post office, benefit payment was made in cash and one ticket from the punched booklet was returned to Rome as evidence that monthly cash payment had been made, this ticket having been signed by the applicant as a receipt for the money.
15. In order to receive cash payment at post office, applicant had to present certified booklet in which the local post office entered the date and amount of payment.
16. Once a month, local post office assembled all tickets from punch card booklet, on which payment had been made, prepared an itemized list of same, forwarded it to Rome and was subsequently reimbursed for total amounts paid.

Comment

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It will be seen from the foregoing, (points I to 12) that the flow of funds for social security purposes was very largely from the employer to Rome, through the local post office, and that local I.N.P.S. did not receive the actual contributions of funds. Points 13 to 16 show that the flow of benefit payments was largely from Rome to the employee, again through the local post office without actual contact with the local I.N.P.S.

Thus, the local I.N.P.S. was largely an investigating and recording

agency, without being an important fiscal or financial factor. Once contact with Rome was broken, the local I.N.P.S. might well continue indefinitely its record-keeping functions (so long as it could employ its personnel), while the reserve funds would be frozen in Rome and all distribution of benefits on the local level would be stopped. (Exception: In certain instances, as in Naples, a local I.N.P.S. had an deposit in local banks, in the form of something similar to a letter of credit, funds for administrative and other purposes, that could be utilized for benefit payments in times of emergency when contact with Rome was broken.)

However, once the local post office was closed, there was no place where an employer could buy stamps except the I.N.P.S., but in Naples, only certain lower denominations, which are not greatly in demand, are available. As a result, the fiscal part of the program was completely broken down, both on the side of employer contributions to social security and on the side of employee benefits payable from Rome.

At this point, on October 20, 1943, with the consent of A.M.G., the Naples I.N.P.S. secured the release at the Banca d'Italia, of lire 5,000,000 which was available in the form of something similar to a letter of credit. Major Rogers, of Finance, advised I.N.P.S. that application for the release of further funds would be considered whenever needed, but up to November 8th, no further application had been received.

#### Conclusions

1. The maintenance of social insurance benefits is necessary for the social order of the community and the military discipline of the Allied forces;
2. Employees and workers who have been paying on their social security benefits, have established an equity in the various insurance programs;
3. The re-opening of the post offices would make it possible for the Naples I.N.P.S. to resume normal operations if the post offices are furnished with adequate operating funds and supplies for insurance programs;
4. To provide a continuation of the social insurance plans already in operation, and to protect worker's future benefits, provision should be made as soon as possible for the resumption of

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- (a) employer contributions, either in the form of an Allied military government stamp, or by the direct payment of lump-sum taxes to a recognized fiscal agency of the local government with adequate safeguard for sequestration and supervision by an A. G. Finance officer; and
  - (b) the resumption of benefit payments to qualified beneficiaries, through the established account of the post office.
