P O R E W O R D

During the past two weeks, there has been a very noticeable increase of 17,220 kilowatts of generating capacity in Central Italy. This increase has mostly resulted from:

- (a) The somewhat improved output of the Rome Steam Plants.
- (b) Increased stream flow to the hydro plants.
- (c) The starting of another unit at Cervara.

In order to facilitate the operation of the two steam plants in Rome, they have been placed under the direction of a single superintendent. One Diesel unit at the ACRA plant is in operative condition, and is used during peak load periods. The field of one 3,000 KW unit in the same plant is damaged and under repair; the starting date is not known. However work done on the other 3,000 KW unit has been finished, it is now being dried out, and is expected to be carrying load within a few days. Use of this machine will again enable the electric auxiliaries of the two plants to be supplied from a separate, and more positive source. Indications are that the plants will soon receive a greater supply of coal. In the meantime, however, the coal storage is decreasing.

The movement of several large transformers from Rome to Terzi is now under way. This equipment will be used when operation is resumed at Galleto.

A previous estimate placed Cegreano in operation by 15 October. There have been difficulties in meeting this schedule, and it is now believed that the two units will not be in service until the end of the month, at least. To expedite this job an officer of Public Works and Utilities Sub-Commission has been assigned to concentrate his time on the work at this plant.

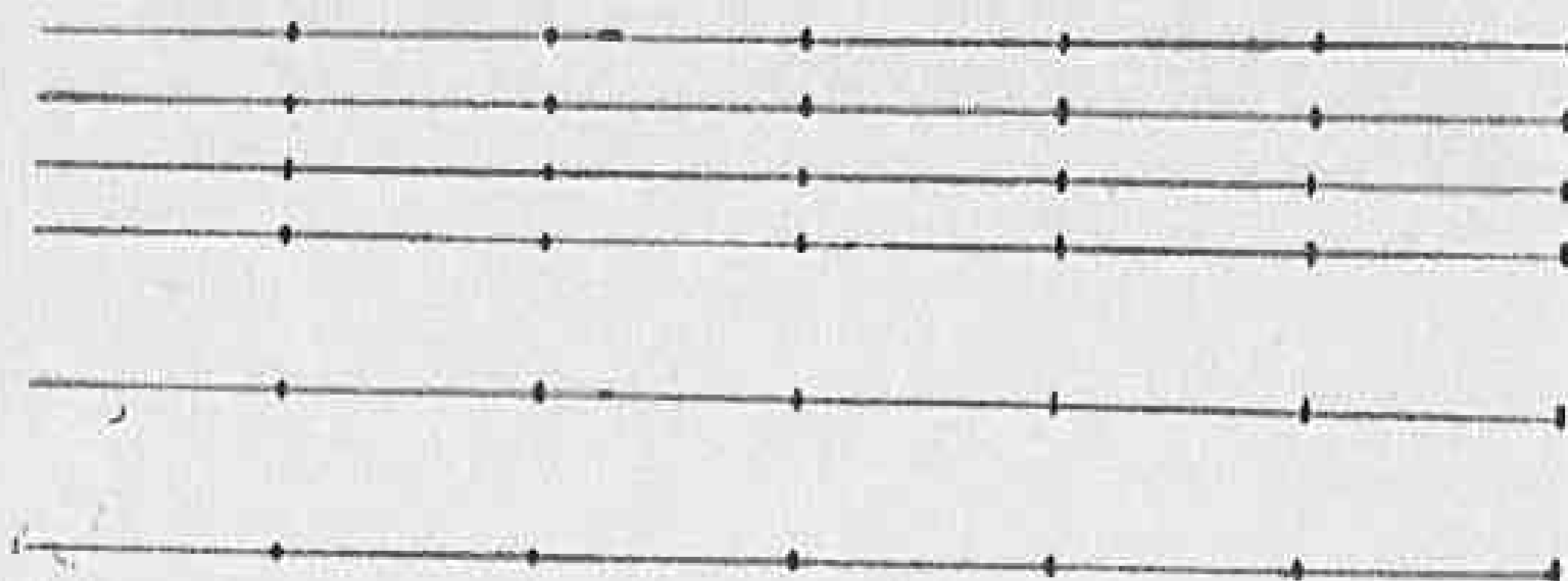

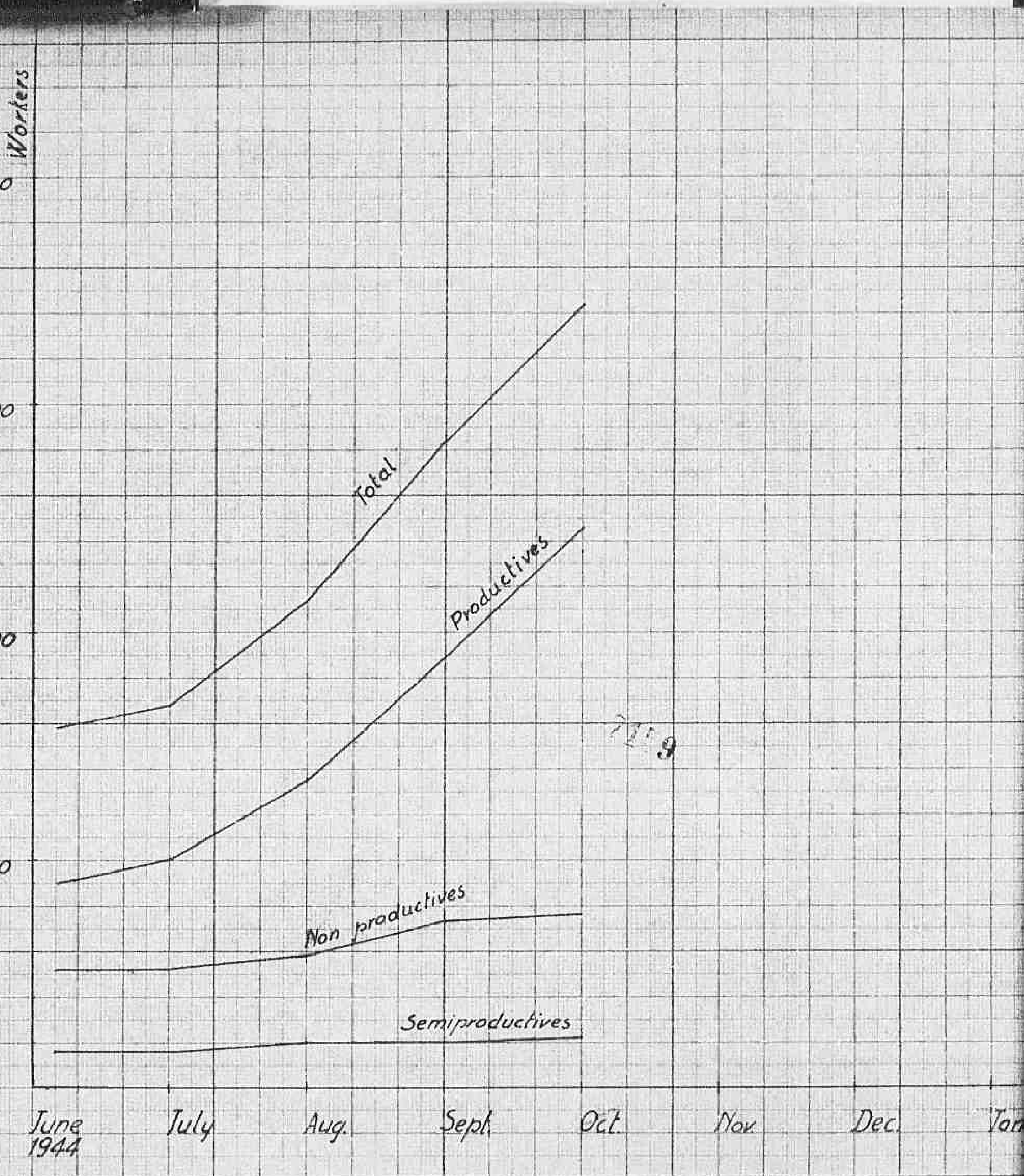

FOREWORD

Developments of interest in Central Italy electricity circuits since the last two weeks are as follows:

(a) A new program for the rationing of the electric power in Rome, prepared by the Rome Allied Area Command, is expected to start on 1 November. The program calls for more electricity to be made available for civilian use.

(b) The Rome steam plants are operating more reliably recently. More fuel is being received at these plants, although up to now the fuel supply has limited the output of the S.R.I. station. A new difficulty has recently arisen at the A.C.E.M. plant, in that the high water of the Tiber has caused debris to be carried into the condensers at the A.C.E.M. plant, and necessitates frequent outages for cleaning.

(c) One unit at Ceprano and one at Fiastra are running short of fuel at the moment to dry the facilities, prior to being connected to the system. Both Ceprano units, as well as the one at Fiastra are expected to be on line by 7 November.

(d) The frequency of the Terna 50 cycles system has been very low during last two weeks. A satisfactory solution to this problem has not yet been reached. However it is being actively studied cooperatively by A.I. No. 1 District, and the Allied Commission.

Since 15 October the following generating stations and transmission lines have been reported as resuming operation:

SUBJECT: Conservation of Electric Power Facilities of Italian Utilities.

TO : All Concerned.

1. A critical shortage of electric utility service exists throughout wide sections of occupied Italy. In order to conserve the limited supply of electric power available, and in order to meet the increasing military and essential civilian requirements, it is necessary that all possible means be utilized to reduce non-essential electric consumption from utility sources, by both military and civilian users in Italy.

2. The following steps will be taken to reduce loads on commercial electric systems:

a. LIGHTING.

- (1) Offices - No lights will be burned during daylight hours except in cases where natural lighting is insufficient for proper working conditions. Wattage of lamps will be limited to a minimum requirement, and fixtures will be located for most economical utilization of light source.
- (2) Halls and Stairways - Lamps in halls, corridors and stairways will be of the smallest wattage commensurate with safety, and a minimum number will be illuminated.
- (3) Hotel Rooms, and Private Living Quarters - No more than two (2) lamps per private living room or one (1) lamp per bath room will be permitted to be connected. No more than one (1) lamp per private living room will be illuminated at the same time. The lamp bulb will not exceed 60 watt rating. Lighting, when permitted in living tents of military personnel, will be limited to one (1) lamp of 60 watt rating in pyramidal or small wall tent.
- (4) Public Space in Hotels, Cafes, Clubs, and Public Buildings - Reduce wattage to a bare essential commensurate with area, use and occupancy. Discontinue all electric signs or display lighting.
- (5) Other Military Facilities - Lighting of mess halls, kitchens, work shops, etc. will not exceed the following scale:

- (6) Outdoor Areas - Guarded areas, POW enclosures, storage areas, streets, etc., will be lighted only in accordance with necessity.

- (7) TURN OFF ALL LIGHTS NOT IN USE.

Post signs conspicuously and make every individual economy-minded in use of electricity.

b. HEATING AND COOKING.

- (1) Electric heating will be permitted only in essential industrial processes engaged in production for the military effort; and in hospitals for the treatment of patients.
- (2) No electric cooking will be permitted.

c. POWER.

- (1) The use of electric power will be limited to:
- (a) Those industries contributing directly to the military effort or essential to the civilian economy.
 - (b) Installations necessary to safeguard public health.
- (2) Elevators will be operated by electric power only for movement of hospital patients or for heavy freight.
- (3) No electric motors will be allowed to idle for extended periods.

- d. ELECTRIC RAILWAY POWER will be utilized only on approval by the Electric Power Committee of the AFLR (Italian) Board.

- e. ELECTROLYTIC PROCESSES AND ELECTRIC ARC FURNACES will be utilized only on approval by the Electric Power Committee of the AFLR (Italian) Board.

3. Military Commanders will be responsible that these instructions are carried out within their jurisdiction of military installations, and civilian authorities will be required to enforce similar measures in those civilian installations which are allowed to receive electric service.

FROM : ECONOMIC SECTION

1. The Economic Section has a definite policy of refusing entry to all technicians and civilian experts representing private concerns.

2. While we respect the validity of individual cases, we cannot afford to jeopardize the over-all program of industrial rehabilitation.

3. The highly limiting factors of transport, critical materials, power allotments, and plant-use in relation to military necessities preclude the granting of selective admissions of technical personnel responsible solely to private establishments.

4. We are forced to promote and safeguard the ²⁷³⁶restoration of industrial facilities on the basis of national need and military urgency, and not the local or individual plan.

5. It is regretted in the subject case that permission of entry cannot be granted.

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SECTION I

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GENERAL

1. PURPOSE. The purpose of this publication is to provide a uniform system for the orderly return to the United States by water transportation of ALL baggage and personal property of military personnel and other persons who have baggage to be shipped to the United States at Government expense; also to assist commanding officers, command echelons and transportation agencies in the prompt and systematic processing and disposition of such baggage. The provisions of the directive apply to the baggage of only that personnel defined in paragraph 5 below. While this letter prescribes procedures for processing baggage by the Army, certain provisions have been included to accelerate customs clearance of baggage after arrival at US ports, in conjunction with Circular 335, WD, 1944, Subject: Inspection and Customs Clearance of Baggage.

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2. DISTRIBUTION. It is desired that all concerned be informed of the provisions of this publication and that the procedures called for be closely observed by responsible commands during all phases, to insure the orderly and efficient return of baggage. It is imperative that officers in overseas ports concerned with the return of baggage be furnished copies of this letter. Instructions in the provisions of this publication will be given commanders of overseas and US ports, transport commanders, cargo security officers, and all officers concerned directly with the return of baggage from overseas commands. Although this publication is classified Restricted, reproduction of it in whole or in part is authorized.

3. RESCISSIONS. The following publications are rescinded:

a. WD Memorandum No. W55-45-43, 19 October 1943, subject: Return of Baggage and Personal Effects of Military Personnel from Overseas, with one change thereto.

b. Letter, AG 524 (11 Mar 44) OB-S-E-SPMOT-M, 11 March 1944, subject: Disposition of Individual Baggage Returned to the United States Separately from the Owner, with one amendment thereto.

4. EFFECTIVE DATE. This publication will become effective upon receipt in each overseas command of the supply of tags prescribed in paragraph 14 below, except for any baggage already prepared for shipment or in process of shipment. These shipments will be completed under the former procedures.

5. DEFINITION of terms as used in this letter:

a. Allied Nations Materiel refers to items of materiel of any Allied Nation, except the United States.

b. Baggage includes duffel bags, barrack bags, flying bags, trunk lockers, wardrobe trunks, handbags, containers suitable for shipment, bedding rolls, items of T/E No. 21 equipment, other authorized personal property, and other items authorized in movement, shipment or travel orders.

(1) Hand Baggage refers to baggage carried by the owner and retained by him in his quarters aboard ship.

(2) Hold Baggage refers to baggage loaded in the hold of the vessel.

(a) Hold Baggage, Accompanied refers to hold baggage, the owners of which are passengers on the same vessel or convoy.

(b) Hold Baggage, Unaccompanied refers to baggage, the owners of which are not passengers on the same vessel or convoy. This term will include shipments of baggage made by individuals who remain in overseas commands.

c. Captured Materiel Trophies refer to items of enemy equipment. The authority and procedure by which these items may be acquired is set forth in Section 8, Circular 217, WD, 1944, subject: War Trophies, or supersessions thereof.

d. Casual or Casuals is an individual or group of individuals separated from his or their unit, or who are not members of a group organized for movement purposes.

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e. Civilians refer to persons not in the Army, but who have baggage to be shipped to the United States at Government expense. This may include:

Members of the American Red Cross
Those civilians indicated in paragraph 20, AR 600-40
Members of USO units
Civilian employees of the War Department or the Army who were moved overseas under competent orders.

f. Effects refer to the personal property of deceased, missing, missing in action, captured, or interned personnel.

g. Military Personnel includes all members of the Army.

h. Sick or Wounded denotes personnel returning to the United States for hospitalization and scheduled to travel directly from a US port to a hospital.

i. Unit denotes an organization constituted and activated under an approved T/O and E, an activated detachment, or a group organized for movement, such as a Rotation Group; Temporary Duty (TD) Group; Provisional Medical Hospital Ship Platoon, Separate; and so forth, which is assigned a shipment number or other code designation for movement purposes.

SECTION IIPROCEDURES OVERSEAS6. GENERAL.

a. Authority. Individuals or units are authorized to ship baggage to the United States as prescribed in movement, shipment, or travel orders. Commanders concerned are authorized to ship, at Government expense, from overseas commands to US ports, and thence to destinations in the United States designated by the owner thereof, at Government expense, accompanied and unaccompanied baggage of military personnel and persons described in paragraph 5 above, subject to the restrictions and conditions contained herein.

(1) Inclusion of captured materiel trophies in shipments of baggage is authorized. ⁷¹²⁷

(2) The authorized unaccompanied baggage of individuals returning to the United States by air, or by a vessel or convey other than that carrying such baggage, will be shipped at Government expense.

(3) Personal items of individuals remaining overseas, declared excess by overseas commanders, may be shipped as unaccompanied baggage, at Government expense, as directed by overseas commanders. In addition, at the time a shipment of personal items declared excess is made, each individual is authorized to include in the shipment other personal items and captured materiel trophies not to exceed 25 pounds.

(4) Additional shipments for the convenience of an individual remaining overseas may be made, subject to availability of transportation, and

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provided that no liability for safe passage of the shipment is assumed by the Government. Ocean transportation will be furnished without expense to the individual, when such shipments are carried aboard any vessel manned or operated by the War Department, or any vessel on which space has been allocated to the War Department (within the limits of the space allocated). When shipment is made on a vessel of the War Shipping Administration, as stated above, the property will be included in the weights stated on the warship lading or bill of lading furnished the agent. Shipments from US ports to consignees in the United States will be made at the owner's expense (express collect).

(5) All shipments outlined above will be processed as prescribed in this publication.

b. Addresses. The address to which any individual may request that unaccompanied baggage be shipped will be limited only by the condition that such address must be within the continental limits of the United States, except that shipments may not be made to Government storage facilities. For example, such requests may indicate a US port, a new duty station, the individual's home, or any place desired by the individual, other than a Government storage facility.

7. PERSONNEL PRECEDING BAGGAGE TO UNITED STATES.

a. Unaccompanied baggage of personnel who have returned or are returning to the United States by a means of transportation other than the vessel or convoy carrying the baggage will be processed under the provisions of this publication. Where the ultimate consignee address in the United States is unknown, overseas commanders will acquaint personnel concerned with the provisions of Section II, Circular 142, WD, 1944, furnish the individual with a copy of the letter suggested in paragraph 3 thereof, and instruct him to make the appropriate remark on the baggage tag. See Inclosure No. 7 for sample of tag in these cases and Inclosure No. 11 for sample of individual's notification of address to which baggage is to be forwarded.

b. In cases of return by air, travel orders of each individual will indicate the weight of baggage to accompany the individual, and will indicate disposition to be made of all unaccompanied baggage.

c. Overseas commanders will forward such baggage without delay to the nearest appropriate port for shipment to the United States by first available water transportation.

8. DECEASED PERSONNEL. Effects and unidentified baggage will be processed in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 16, Circular 195, WD, 1943, as amended by Section I, Circular 266, WD, 1944, or supersessions thereof.

9. UNAUTHORIZED ITEMS IN BAGGAGE. The items indicated below are not authorized for inclusion in baggage and, unless specifically excepted by proper authority, will be withdrawn by the overseas inspecting officer prior to loading aboard ship and turned over to the appropriate supply or salvage officer (see Inclosure No. 10 for form of various certificates prescribed below). The certificates referred to below are those outlined on the reverse side of Inclosure No. 10.

a. Government Property, except that which is:

(1) Issued under authority of movement orders.

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(2) Purchased by an individual out of personal funds, when accompanied by a certificate or affidavit to that effect.

b. Undeveloped Exposed Film.

c. Documents, Papers, Communications, and Photographs, unless passed by a Military Censor. Censorship is applied to official messages transmitted in the clear via electrical means and to personal communications; letters, post cards, films, photographs, press dispatches, newspapers, journals, magazines, books, pamphlets, parcels, recordings and transcriptions, radio broadcasts, telegrams, cables, radiograms, telephone messages, and other communications, regardless of means of transmission. (For further reference see War Department Training Circular No. 15, 1943.)

d. Captured Materiel Trophies, unless accompanied by a Certificate of Retention, in duplicate, signed by the individual's commanding officer, stating that retention of the items in question are specifically authorized by the overseas commander in pursuance to Section VIII, Circular 217, WD, 1944, or supersessions thereof.

e. Items of Allied Nations Materiel, unless accompanied by a Certificate of Ownership or Right to Possess, in duplicate, signed by the individual's commanding officer, indicating his ownership of or right to ship the materiel.

f. Clothing and Textile Items Originating in Areas Where Louse-borne Typhus Fever Exists, unless accompanied by a certificate, in duplicate, that the items have been properly disinfested in accordance with paragraph 24g(1), SGO Circular Letter 33, 2 February 1943, subject: "Treatment and Control of Certain Tropical Diseases".

g. Items as Follows, the Importation of Which into the United States is Prohibited, except in those specific cases where a clearance to import items, such as those for scientific, educational or military purposes, is obtained from the proper civilian agency through military channels, prior to shipment from an overseas command:

(1) Smoking opium and narcotic drugs.

(2) The following plants and plant products:

(a) Fresh fruits and vegetables, including sweet ~~potatoes~~ ^{potatoes} and yams.

(b) Bamboo seeds or plants and unhulled rice.

(c) Sugar cane, citrus plants or cuttings, and banana plants.

(d) Raw cotton and cotton seed hulls, including seed cotton and cotton bolls, etc., as such; or, when used as a packing material, lint containing seed; cotton seed hulls; rice straw and rice hulls, including such products used as packing material, leaves or plants used as packing material, or dried grasses used as packing material.

NOTE: Dried, cured or processed fruits and vegetables, such as cured figs, dates, dried peas, and beans are unrestricted. Processed cotton lint, such as

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absorbent cotton, cotton batting or other forms of lint, free from seeds, is not prohibited as a packing material.

(3) Articles bearing names or marks which copy or simulate registered and recorded trade-marks or recorded trade names, except that such articles are not prohibited from importation, if the name or mark is completely removed before the articles enter the United States.

(4) Birds of paradise, aigrettes, osprey plumes and feathers, heads, wings, skins, etc. of wild birds, raw or manufactured. This prohibition does not apply to ostriches or domestic fowl of any kind.

(5) Skins of fur seals or sea otters, taken in the open waters of the North Pacific Ocean, and garments made in whole or in part of such skins, unless the skins have been taken legally under the Act of February 26, 1944.

(6) The mongoose, the so-called "flying fox" or fruit bat, the English sparrow, the starling and all other birds injurious to agriculture or horticulture.

(7) Live insects, including eggs, pupae, larvae and adults.

(8) Eggs of wild birds.

(9) Goods made by convict labor, forced labor, or indentured labor under penal sanctions.

(10) Lottery tickets and advertisements of any lottery.

(11) Obscene and immoral articles, books, pictures, films, or publications, and seditious or treasonable matter.

(12) Articles or medicine for the prevention of conception or causing abortion.

(13) Counterfeits of coins, securities, or postage stamps, and colored illustrations of postage stamps.

(14) Gold, except to the extent permitted by the Provisional Gold Regulations issued under the Gold Reserve Act of 1934.

NOTE: Fabricated gold (gold manufactured for customary industrial professional or artistic uses; not including gold coin), such as jewelry may be imported into the United States. Gold coin of recognized special value to collectors of rare and unusual coins may also be imported.

(15) Hay and straw for packing, unless disinfected.

(16) Tea in packages exceeding 5 pounds each and not conforming to fixed standards.

(17) Arms and ammunition (when not specifically issued or when not war souvenirs or relics covered by permit from owner's commanding officer).

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- (18) Liquor candy.
- (19) Absinthe.
- (20) Matches, white phosphorus.

NOTE: For information on certain other items the importation of which into the United States is restricted, see Circular 335, WD, 1944.

10. WEIGHT LIMITATION OF ACCOMPANIED BAGGAGE.

a. Each officer will be authorized not to exceed 25 pounds of baggage in addition to the weight of clothing, equipment, and personal baggage authorized at the time of his original overseas movement. The provisions of paragraph 2a(2), AR 55-410, 6 October 1942, are suspended accordingly, insofar as they pertain to the weight of baggage returned with individuals.

b. In addition to the clothing and equipment authorized in movement or travel orders of individuals returning to the United States, each enlisted man and civilian will be authorized not to exceed 25 pounds of baggage for personal items and captured material trophies.

c. The 25 pound additional allowance prescribed in a and b above may be included in the unaccompanied baggage of individuals returning to the United States by air or by another vessel or convoy.

11. PACKING. Baggage will be securely packed in suitable containers. Containers will be locked only when keys are available; otherwise, they will be securely strapped or banded and shipped unlocked. Keys for all unaccompanied baggage will be properly tagged for identification purposes and turned over to the ship's master (or cargo security officer) for delivery to the Superintendent of Water Division at the US port. Items not entitled to duty free admission into the United States and restricted items will be packed either separately or in such manner as to be readily accessible for customs inspection at the US port.

12. MARKING.

a. Containers will be clearly marked by stenciling, painting, or lettering to show:

(1) Name of owner.

(2) Rank and ASN.

(3) Shipment number or code designation (applicable to unit, and rotation and temporary duty group baggage only).

b. Other inapplicable markings on containers will be effectively obliterated.

13. TAGS. The appropriate tag, as indicated below, will be accomplished to the fullest extent possible from available information, in addition to the marking required by paragraph 12a above, and will be securely attached to each container.

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a. Hold Baggage, Accompanied, of the following types, will be tagged as indicated:

<u>Type</u>	<u>Sample</u>
(1) Sick and Wounded	See Inclosure No. 1
(2) Casuals	See Inclosure No. 2
(3) Civilians	See Inclosure No. 3
(4) Units	See Inclosure No. 4
(5) Rotation and Temporary Duty Groups	See Inclosure No. 5

b. Hold Baggage, Unaccompanied, of the following types, will be tagged as indicated:

<u>Type</u>	<u>Sample</u>
(1) Effects of deceased, missing in action, missing, captured, or interned personnel and <u>unidentified baggage</u> .	See Inclosure No. 6
(2) Baggage not accompanied by the owner on the same ship or convoy.	See Inclosure No. 7

c. All Hand Baggage. See Inclosure No. 8

d. Customs Declaration Tag. (See paragraph 15c(1) below and Inclosure No. 9.)

14. PROCUREMENT OF TAGS.

a. The Adjutant General will be responsible for procurement and distribution of all tags prescribed for use in this publication.

b. Following receipt of the initial supply of tags, as prescribed in c below, tags will be requisitioned as required by overseas commanders. Requisitions will be processed as outlined in ASF Manual M 411, 29 June 1944.

c. Each port commander will be responsible for the initial supply of tags to overseas commands for which he has primary supply responsibility. This supply will be obtained from the adjutant general depot serving each port.

15. OWNER'S INVENTORY AND CERTIFICATES AND CUSTOMS DECLARATION.

a. Prior to embarkation, each individual will accomplish, in triplicate, an inventory of the items in each container accompanying or being shipped by the individual, as illustrated in Inclosure No. 10. This inventory will also apply to hand baggage.

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b. Each individual also will have executed the certificates, as applicable, on the reverse side of the form when the inventory includes any of the following items:

- (1) Government property purchased by an individual.
- (2) Captured materiel trophies.
- (3) Allied Nations materiel.
- (4) Clothing and textiles being shipped from areas where louse-borne typhus fever exists.

c. In all cases, the individual will accomplish the Customs Declaration provided on the same form. This declaration will serve the purpose of that prescribed in paragraph 5a, Circular 335, WD, 1944.

(1) On all baggage, except Effects, in addition to the Customs Declaration prescribed above, the individual will accomplish a Customs Declaration on the proper tag and securely attach it to each container. This will facilitate customs processing and clearance upon arrival at the US port (see Inclosure No. 9 for sample of Customs Declaration tag).

d. The number of the tag on each container, except for hand baggage, as prescribed in paragraph 13 above, will be entered on the bottom of the front side of the corresponding Owner's Inventory.

e. One (1) copy of the Owner's Inventory, with certificates and Customs Declaration accomplished, will be retained by the owner. The original and one (1) copy will be placed within the container in such manner as to be readily accessible when the container is opened. Upon inspection, and prior to loading aboard ship, as prescribed in paragraph 16 below, the Inspecting Officer will withdraw one (1) copy for his files and future reference.

f. Owners will be instructed to retain these copies of Inventories until determination of safe receipt of baggage in the United States by owners or addressees has been made. In the event of loss or damage, the owner's copy of the Inventory will be attached to any claim made against the Government.

16. PRE-EMBARKATION INSPECTION. Overseas commanders will cause all baggage shipped to the United States by agencies or individuals under their command to be inspected by a commissioned officer, designated by such commander as Inspecting Officer, prior to loading on board ship, to insure compliance with weight, packing, marking, and disease prevention requirements, and to withdraw items not authorized for shipment. Officers so designated must be informed that these inspections are vitally necessary in securing speedy clearance of individuals at US ports, in complying with laws of the United States, and in preventing the entry of diseases into the United States.

17. INVENTORY OF ITEMS WITHDRAWN BY INSPECTING OFFICER.

a. Whenever possible, owners should be present at the inspection of their baggage. In these cases, the inspecting officer will sign all copies of the Owner's Inventory, if correct. In event of withdrawal or discrepancies, the Owner's Inventory will be rewritten or corrected, signed by the owner and inspecting officer, and placed in each container.

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b. If the owner is not present at the inspection, the inspecting officer will make an inventory, in duplicate, of all items withdrawn from the baggage, including Government issue, with a brief description of each item removed. Discrepancies between the Owner's Inventory and the contents of the container will be noted. The original copy of the inventory, certified by the inspecting officer, will be placed in the container from which the items have been withdrawn, and the copy retained by the inspecting officer.

18. CERTIFICATE OF THE INSPECTING OFFICER. The tag (reverse side of Customs Declaration tag) upon which will be inscribed a certificate by the Inspecting Officer substantially as shown in Inclosure No. 9, will be securely attached to each container. In no case will hold baggage, accompanied or unaccompanied, be returned to the owner after the inspection prescribed above, or prior to loading aboard ship. Further processing of accompanied baggage for customs clearance purposes will be accomplished by inspecting officers in accordance with paragraph 5d, Circular 335, WD, 1944.

19. SHIPPING AND LOADING INSTRUCTIONS.a. Segregation and Stowage.

(1) All accompanied hold baggage will be segregated and placed aboard ship as follows to permit discharge in the priority listed:

- (a) Casuals.
- (b) Sick and Wounded.
- (c) Rotation or Temporary Duty Groups by separate groups.
- (d) Units - Segregated by separate units.
- (e) Civilians.
- (f) Others.

(2) All unaccompanied hold baggage will be segregated and placed aboard ship as follows:

- (a) Effects and unidentified baggage.
- (b) Other unaccompanied baggage.

b. In ships utilizing two or more holds for baggage, it is desired, subject to other loading factors and circumstances, that all unaccompanied baggage be placed in one hold. Baggage of units and rotation groups may be placed in the same hold as top stowage for immediate discharge. All other baggage will be stowed in other holds as top stowage.

20. DOCUMENTATION.

a. Manifest. A separate sheet or sheets of the ocean manifest will be used for baggage only. One entry will be made on this sheet for each group of baggage indicated in paragraphs 19a(1) and (2) above, showing total pieces of baggage, identity of group and the location aboard ship (see sample entries in Inclosure No. 12).

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b. A Separate Baggage List of the Containers Comprising Each Segregated Shipment, as listed in paragraphs 19a(1) and (2) above, will be prepared as follows:

(1) Baggage List.

- (a) Name of owner, rank or other identification.
- (b) Number of tag on the baggage.
- (c) Type of container.

(2) Keys for unaccompanied baggage will be placed in one package and entered as the first item on the appropriate baggage list.

(3) Distribution of Baggage List.

(a) Four (4) copies of each Baggage List will be turned over to the ship's master (cargo security officer or transport commander). Three (3) copies will be delivered to the Superintendent, Water Division at the US port; the fourth copy will be retained for the ship's record.

(b) Four (4) advance copies of each Baggage List will be dispatched by air courier, with the advance copies of the manifest or bill of lading, to the Superintendent, Water Division at the US port at which debarkation or discharge is scheduled, who will forward two (2) copies to the Chief of Transportation, Washington 25, D. C. (one each for the Chief, Water Division and the Chief, Traffic Control Division). If the US port is unknown, they will be dispatched by air courier to the Chief of Transportation, Washington 25, D. C. (Attn: Chief, Ship Operations Branch, Water Division). Air mail will be used only when courier service is not available.

(4) A sample Baggage List is shown in Inclosure No. 13.

SECTION III

PROCEDURES AT US PORTS

21. INSPECTION AT US PORTS. Any class of baggage bearing the proper certificates will not be inspected. All baggage, except Effects, not bearing signed certificates of inspection, as required by paragraph 18 above, will be opened and examined under the supervision of a commissioned officer designated as Inspecting Officer by the port commander.

22. LOCKED BAGGAGE. Where inspection is necessary, ⁷¹²³locked baggage for which keys are not supplied at time of arrival of the baggage will be opened by forcing the locks, or other appropriate means, under the supervision of an inspecting officer. After inspection, containers will be securely strapped or banded.

23. INVENTORY AT US PORTS.

a. Where containers are opened at US ports, an inventory of each will be prepared, in duplicate, indicating:

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- (1) Name of owner.
- (2) Army serial number and grade, or civilian designation.
- (3) Address of consignee.
- (4) List of items in container.
- (5) Pertinent notations as to withdrawals, and so forth.

b. The inspecting officer will certify to the correctness of the inventory. The original will be packed with the contents of the container and the duplicate retained for the port files.

24. ITEMS TO BE WITHDRAWN. The inspecting officer will withdraw and turn over to an appropriate supply or salvage officer the following items, subject to the exceptions noted:

a. All Government Issued Property, except that listed in paragraphs 9a(1) and (2) above, and that packed in containers addressed to the owner at a duty station in the United States (see paragraph 25 below).

b. Captured Materiel Trophies not Accompanied by a Certificate of Retention (as required in paragraph 9d above), except when, in the opinion of the port commander, value as trophies outweighs usefulness in the service or value as critical scrap. Specific articles, the possession of which is forbidden by directives, will be withdrawn.

c. Items of Allied Nations Materiel not Accompanied by a Certificate of Ownership or Right to Possess (as required in paragraph 9e above), except when, in the opinion of the port commander, value as trophies outweighs usefulness in the service or value as critical scrap. Specific articles, the possession of which is forbidden by directives, will be withdrawn.

d. Items the Shipment of Which is Prohibited by Competent Authority, including narcotics, explosives, live bombs, and live ammunition, loaded weapons, certain fruits and vegetables, and others (see paragraph 9g above).

e. Clothing and Textile Items Requiring Disinfestation, unless facilities exist at the port for performing this function prior to shipment from the port.

25. GOVERNMENT ISSUE PROPERTY, except that listed in paragraphs 9a(1) and (2) above, found in containers owned by a member of the military service and addressed to himself at a duty station in the United States, will not be withdrawn. A suitable notation will be made on the inventory and a copy mailed to the commanding officer of the new duty station for appropriate action upon arrival of the owner.

26. CUSTOMS INSPECTION. Customs clearance of the accompanied baggage of individuals will be accomplished as prescribed in Circular 335, WD, 1944. Other baggage will be submitted as desired by representatives of the Collector of Customs for appropriate customs examination which includes examination for censorship purposes.

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27. RESHIPMENT FROM US PORT.

a. The appropriate port commander will forward baggage to the consignee in the United States at the address indicated on the baggage or to a new address of the consignee in the United States, and is authorized, upon request, to forward a portion of an individual's baggage to a duty station or hospital and the remainder to another designated address in the United States (the provisions of paragraph 16, AR 55-160 will not apply to the above shipments). Shipments to duty stations and hospitals will be made by express.

b. Baggage will be forwarded in accordance with the status of the owner or consignor at the time shipment was initiated. Information received by the transportation officer of the owner's subsequent change of status to deceased, missing, missing in action, captured, or interned will not warrant diverting the shipment to the Effects Quartermaster, Army Effects Bureau, Kansas City Quartermaster Depot, Kansas City, Missouri.

c. Keys will be mailed to the consignee, unless otherwise requested by the owner or his representative.

d. Unaccompanied baggage without a forwarding address will be delivered to individuals through use of the procedure prescribed in paragraph 7 above. Upon arrival at the port, all shipments of baggage not showing specific forwarding addresses will be reported to the Chief of Transportation (Traffic Control Division).

e. Upon being notified by the individual of the address to which the baggage should be forwarded, as prescribed in Section II, Circular 142, WD, 1944, the Chief of Transportation (Traffic Control Division) will inform the proper port of such address so that delivery of the baggage may be made.

f. Upon receipt of this information from the Chief of Transportation, US port commanders will forward baggage of individuals to the designated addresses. Express shipments will be utilized to duty stations or to hospitals. Freight shipments will be utilized to other designated addresses, unless a more economical means of shipment is available.

28. MISCELLANEOUS.

a. The Chief of Transportation will establish a clearing agency in his office for collection of notifications from individuals, reports of arrival of baggage from US ports, and the appropriate dissemination of this information.

b. This publication will be cited as authority to ship baggage from US ports to consignee addresses in the United States. 7122

c. As stated in paragraph 14 above, the forms outlined in Inclosures No. 1 to 9, inclusive, will be furnished from the United States; the forms outlined in Inclosures No. 10 to 13, inclusive, will be reproduced in each overseas command.

d. The forms prescribed in this letter in no way affect the "Lists A and B", prescribed in Circular 9, WD, 1944, and the "C and E Adjustment Form", prescribed in Circular 200, WD, 1944, which are necessary for property accounting purposes of unit commanders and individuals, respectively.

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SECTION IV

RESPONSIBILITIES

29. CHECK LIST. For convenience, the responsibilities of individuals and agencies, in order, in shipping baggage from overseas commands to the United States are outlined below.

a. Owners.

(1) Prepare Owner's Inventory, in triplicate, of items in each container, as prescribed in paragraph 15a above, retain one (1) copy, and place the original and one (1) copy in each container.

(2) Execute the certificate, if applicable, on reverse side of the Owner's Inventory Form, as prescribed in paragraph 15b above.

(3) Execute Customs Declaration on the lower portion of the reverse side of the Owner's Inventory Form, as prescribed in paragraph 15c above.

(4) Accomplish the proper Identification Tag, as prescribed in paragraphs 13a, b, and c above, and enter the tag number on the bottom of the front side of the corresponding Owner's Inventory.

(5) Execute the Customs Declaration on the front side of the Customs Declaration Tag, as prescribed in paragraph 13d above.

b. Unit and Group Commanders. Execute the appropriate certificates on the reverse side of the Owner's Inventory Form, as required for each individual under his command.

c. Overseas Inspecting Officers.

(1) Inspect the baggage of each individual, make such changes on the Owner's Inventory Form as are necessary, and certify inventories, as prescribed in paragraphs 16 and 17 above.

(2) Accomplish the declarations and certificates for customs clearance purposes, as prescribed in paragraph 5d, Circular 335, WD, 1944, and deliver them to the transport commander.

(3) Execute the Inspecting Officer's certificate on the reverse side of the Customs Declaration Tag of each container, as prescribed in paragraph 18 above.

d. Commanders of Overseas Ports.

(1) Prepare a Baggage List of the containers comprising each shipment and distribute copies thereof, as prescribed in paragraph 20b above.

(2) Load all baggage aboard vessels, as prescribed in paragraph 19 above.

(3) Prepare a separate sheet on the vessel manifest for all baggage, as prescribed in paragraph 20a above.

R E S T R I C T E Dc. Transport Commanders.

(1) Execute a blanket declaration, in duplicate, for baggage of all individuals aboard the vessel and take such other action as is prescribed in paragraph 6, Circular 335, WD, 1944.

(2) Deliver the blanket declaration to customs officials upon arrival at the US port.

f. Commanders of US Ports.

(1) Take such action with respect to inspection and inventory of baggage as is prescribed in paragraphs 21 to 25, inclusive, above.

(2) Deliver accompanied baggage to individuals prior to their further movement, wherever possible.

(3) Ship unaccompanied baggage to addresses shown on the containers or obtain or verify the forwarding address, as prescribed in paragraph 27 above.
