1. This letter deals only with the following medals:-
 - (a) 1939/45 Star.
 - (b) Italy Star.
 - (c) France and Germany Star.
2. The Defence Medal will be the subject of separate instructions which will be issued later when the appropriate forms are printed.
3. Details of qualifications for award of the following Campaign Stars will be supplied to any personnel who consider themselves to be qualified:
 - (a) Atlantic Star.
 - (b) Air Crew Europe Star.
 - (c) Pacific Star.
 - (d) Burma Star.
4. Details of the Africa Star and Clasps thereto are not included as the majority of qualified personnel have already claimed - details may be obtained from ACI 829/45. Full details of all Campaign Stars are given in ACI 829/45. An extract of relevant paragraphs is enclosed as Appx 'A' to this letter.
5. It is necessary to claim these awards on AF B 2070. Forms may be obtained by Officers of HQ from the HQ Comd, and by CRs from C.C. British Detachment when instructed to do so. HQs in the field will obtain Army Forms from local Stationary Depots in the normal manner and will ensure that copies are made available to all eligible personnel.
6. After completion of Parts I and II ONLY of AF B 2070 by individual claimants addressees will forward the forms together with nominal roll in duplicate to this HQ.
7. Only one copy of AF B 2070 is required from each individual.
8. United States personnel who served in the British Army prior to joining AMB/AC may also claim these awards provided they are NOT eligible for any American award for the same operation. The same form will be used but names will be recorded on separate nominal rolls.

SECTION I

General

1. This A.C.I. gives the details of the conditions of the award of the Campaign Stars and Clasp and Defence Medal promulgated in Army Order 108 of 1945.
2. Officers and other ranks of the following classes will be eligible for the Stars and Clasp and the Defence Medal:
 - (a) All officers (including women officers) and other ranks of the British and Colonial Military Forces and those of Dominion and Indian Forces serving in the British Army.
 - (b) Nursing officers.
 - (c) Officers and auxiliaries of the A.S.S.
 - (d) V.A.D. officers and members.
 - (e) Specially approved extension or untrained civilians.
 - (f) Allied nationals commissioned or enlisted into the British Forces.

3. The Stars and Defence Medal will be worn in the following order - the 1939-45 Star, the Atlantic Star, the Air Crew Europe Star, the Africa Star, the Pacific Star, the Burma Star, the Italy Star, the France and Germany Star and the Defence Medal.

These awards will allow any personnel to wear five of the eight ribbons of the Campaign Stars, i.e.:-

- The 1939-45 Star.
- The Africa Star.
- The Pacific or Burma Star.
- The Italy Star.
- The France and Germany or Atlantic, or Air Crew Europe Star.

The ribbon of the Defence Medal may be worn by qualified recipients in addition to those granted for Campaign Stars.

SECTION II

General Qualifications for Award of Campaign Stars and Clasp

4. Definition of "qualifying service".
 - (a) The service of personnel posted within a War Establishment or attached to a unit or formation for duty will be regarded as qualifying service.
 - (b) The service of personnel attached during journeys, visits or inspections will normally be excluded if the attachment is for less than 30 days. Where special circumstances exist, however, on where the visit has lasted for more than 30 days application may be made to the War Office (A.C. 4(4)), for an appeal to reckon such service.
 - (c) Service in ships making occasional visits to the defined areas for fueling and so forth will not necessarily be a qualification.
5. Qualifying service limitation - Qualifying service for any one of the new Stars cannot run concurrently with the service qualifying for, and preceding the date on which personnel qualifying for the award of the 1939-45 Star (except as stated in para

3. The Stars and Defence Medal will be worn in the following order - the 1939-45 Star, the Atlantic Star, the Air Crew Europe Star, the Africa Star, the Pacific Star, the Burma Star, the Italy Star, the France and Germany Star and the Defence Medal.

These awards will allow any personnel to wear five of the eight ribbons of the Campaign Stars, i.e.:-

- The 1939-45 Star.
- The Africa Star.
- The Pacific or Burma Star.
- The Italy Star.
- The France and Germany or Atlantic, or Air Crew Europe Star.

The ribbon of the Defence Medal may be worn by qualified recipients in addition to those granted the Campaign Stars.

SECTION III

General qualifications for award of Campaign Stars and Clasp

4. Definition of "qualifying service".

- (a) The service of personnel posted within a War Establishment or attached to a unit or formation for duty will be regarded as qualifying service.
- (b) The service of personnel attached during journeys, visits or inspections will normally be excluded if the attachment is for less than 30 days. Where special circumstances exist, however, or where the visit has lasted for more than 30 days application may be made to the War Office (J.C. 4(d)), for approval to reckon such service.
- (c) Service in ships making occasional visits to the defined areas for fuelling and so forth will not necessarily be a qualification.

5. Qualifying service limitation - Qualifying service for any one of the two Stars cannot run concurrently with the service qualifying for, and preceding the date on which personnel qualifying for the award of the 1939-45 Star (except as noted in para 7 below) or for another War Star.

Service qualification for Campaign Stars.

6. 1939-45 Star.

To qualify for the 1939-45 Star individuals:-

- (a) Must serve for six (or two) months' service in the operational commands listed in para 13 or 17; or
- (b) With less than six (or two) months' operational service as in (a) above -
- (i) must have taken part in those operations which qualify in themselves for the award, as listed in para 21 (a); or

(ii) who have -

- (1) won honour, decoration, mention in despatches, commendation for brave conduct or commendation for valuable service in the air, for service in operations; or

- 2 -

- (2) died on service; or
 (3) been evacuated as a result of wounds or sickness arising out of service, the sickness not being due to misconduct; under para 21 (b).

7. (a) Pacific, Burma, Italy and France and Germany Stars.

To qualify for either the Pacific, Burma, Italy or France and Germany Star, individuals:-

- (i) must first qualify for the 1939-45 Star by six (or two) months' operational service as in para 6 (a) above, after which they qualify for the appropriate theatre Star by entry into operations, i.e., by service of one day or less:
 or
 (ii) If they have already qualified for the 1939-45 Star by less than six (or two) months' operational service under para 6 (b) (i) or (ii) they must first aggregate six (or two) months' operational service as in para 6 (a), after which they become eligible for the appropriate theatre star by entry into operations;

- (iii) If they have not already qualified for the 1939-45 Star, but have either
 (1) won an honour, decoration, mention in despatches, commendation for brave conduct or commendation for valuable service in the air, for service in operation; or

- (2) died on service; or
 (3) been evacuated as a result of wounds or sickness arising out of service, the sickness not being due to misconduct;

during operations for which the Pacific, Burma, Italy or France and Germany Star is granted, qualify for both the 1939-45 Star and the appropriate theatre Star immediately, without completing six (or two) months' operational service as in sub-para (i) above.

(c) Last six months of the war in Europe.

- (1) During the last six months of the war in Europe, i.e., from 8th November, 1944, to 8th May, 1945, both dates inclusive, qualification for the Atlantic, Italy or France and Germany Star will be by entry into a theatre of operations without the prior award of the 1939-45 Star under para 7 (a) (i) and (b) (i).

- (ii) Recipients of the Atlantic, Italy or France and Germany Star under sub-para (i) above will not be awarded the 1939-45 Star until they aggregate six (or two) months' operational service under para 6 (a) above.

8. Qualifying period - Those who have fulfilled the conditions of para 6 above and have been awarded one of the new Stars, will not be required to complete the six months' (or two months in the RAF) qualifying period referred to in para 6 (a) above a second time in order to qualify for a second new star.

9. Prisoners of War.

into operations;

- (iii) If they have not already qualified for the 1939-45 Star, but have either
- (1) won an honor, decoration, mention in despatches, commendation for brave conduct or commendation for valuable service in the air, for service in operation; or
 - (2) died on service; or
 - (3) been evacuated as a result of wounds or sickness arising out of service, the sickness not being due to misconduct;
- during operations for which the Pacific, Burma, Italy or France and Germany Star is granted, qualify for both the 1939-45 Star and the appropriate theatre Star immediately, without completing six (or two) months' operational service as in sub-para (i) above.

(c) Last six months of the war in Europe.

- (i) During the last six months of the war in Europe, i.e., from 8th November, 1944, to 8th May, 1945, both dates inclusive, qualification for the Atlantic, Italy or France and Germany Star will be by entry into a theatre of operations without the prior award of the 1939-45 Star under para 7 (a) (i) and (b) (i).
- (ii) Recipients of the Atlantic, Italy or France and Germany Star under sub-para (i) above will not be awarded the 1939-45 Star until they accumulate six (or two) months' operational service under para 6 (a) above.

8. Qualifying period - Those who have fulfilled the conditions of para 6 above and have been awarded one of the new Stars, will not be required to complete the six months' (or two months in the RAF) qualifying period referred to in para 6 (a) above a second time in order to qualify for a second new star.

9. Prisoners of War.

- (a) The conditions stated in sub-para (b), (c) and (d) below are subject to the proviso that the circumstances of capture are free from blame.
- (b) Prisoners of War who, at the time of capture had qualified for the 1939-45 Star by six months' operational service, (or two months in air crew, R.A.F.) will count time spent as a prisoner of War towards the six or two months' qualifying service for the award of the Atlantic Star (para 25) or Air Crew Europe Star (para 33), if at the time of capture they were serving in operations which qualify for those awards.
- (c) Prisoners of War who, at the time of capture had qualified for the award of the 1939-45 Star by six or two months' operational service will have qualified for the Pacific, Burma, Italy or France and Germany Star, by entry into the appropriate operational service.
- (d) Prisoners of War who, at the time of capture had qualified for the 1939-45 Star by less than six or two months' operational service, or who had not qualified for the 1939-45 Star, will count time spent as a prisoner of War towards the six or two months' qualifying service required by para 6.

- 3 -

Even though time spent in operations and as a prisoner of war may be in excess of six or two months, such service will not qualify these individuals for the Star appropriate to the campaign in which they were captured in addition to the 1939-45 Star. They may, however, qualify for other Stars after release or escape from captivity by performing operational service in the prescribed areas.

10. Honours, decorations, mention in despatches and commendations. - Where qualification for the grant of a Campaign Star or the Defence Medal is dependent upon the award of a honour, decoration, mention in despatches, commendation for brave conduct, or commendation for valuable service in the air, the Star or Medal will only be awarded to those whose grant of an honour, decoration, mention or commendation has been published in the London Gazette (see paras 24 (b) (i), 30, 37 and 94 (c)).

11. Classes. - No individual will be awarded more than one class to anyone of the Stars. A record is to be made in every instance of the alternative Class or Classes that would have been awarded but for the prior award of the Star first earned.

SUBSECTION III

Qualifications for Individual Campaign Stars. The 1939-45 Star.

12. The currency of the 1939-45 Star has been extended and will be granted for service in operations from 3rd September, 1939, to 3th May, 1945, and possibly to a later date as regards the Far East. It is temporarily re-designated the "1939-45 Star". This Star and the Africa Star may now both be awarded to the same individual.

14. Qualifications for award.

- (a) To qualify for an award of the 1939-45 Star an individual must have qualifying service with a unit or formation as defined in para 4 (a) in one or more of the qualifying commands listed in para 15 below, for at least six months (180 days) Army, or two months (60 days) Air or R.N.F.; or
- (b) the Star may be awarded for less than six or two months' operational service under the conditions of para 24.

15. Six months' operational service qualification. - The 1939-45 Star will be granted to every personnel of the classes detailed in para 2 who, from 3rd September, 1939, to appropriate six months' service on the strength of a unit or formation in one or more of the qualifying commands given below:-

SECTION III

Qualifications for Individual Campaign Stars.

The 1939-45 Star.

12. The currency of the 1939-45 Star has been extended and will be granted for service in operations from 3rd September, 1939, to 8th May, 1945, and possibly to a later date as regards the Far East. It is temporarily re-designated the "1939-45 Star". This Star and the Africa Star may now both be awarded to the same individual.

14. Qualifications for award.

- (a) To qualify for an award of the 1939-45 Star an individual must have qualifying service with a unit or formation as defined in para 4 (a) in one or more of the qualifying commands listed in para 15 below, for at least six months (18 days) Army, or two months (61 days) air crew R.A.F.; or
- (b) The Star may be awarded for less than six or two months' operational service under the conditions of para 24.

15. Six months' operational service qualification. - The 1939-45 Star will be granted to any personnel of the classes detailed in para 2 who, from 3rd September, 1939, aggregate six months' service on the strength of a unit or formation in one or more of the qualifying commands given below:-

India will not be regarded as an operational command except for the purpose of operations in Burma and the North-West Frontier (see para 15 (3) and 20)).

Individuals enrolled in the Maritime R.A. or while serving with the A.A. Defence Merchant Shipwreck or A.A. L.F.C. troops for the Defence of Ships in Government service as permanent staff of workshops and hospital ships (carriers) will qualify on completion of six months' sea-going duty in dangerous waters (see para 20).

Journeys by air personnel through dangerous waters (see para 20) to military or naval commands mentioned in para 15 will count towards the qualifying period of the 1939-45 Star, provided that the journey was completed. The journey will count if the date of arrival falls within the dates set out in para 15, against each nation. It will then count from the date of embarkation.

Those who did not complete the journey owing to death, wounds or injury resulting in incapacity will qualify under para 21 (b) (ii) or (iii).

Journeys by air personnel through dangerous waters to non-operational areas will count towards the qualifying period.

The expression "dangerous waters" shall include the following areas:-

(a) From 3rd September 1939, the Atlantic Ocean including North Africa and the North Sea; the Pacific, the Arctic Ocean between Greenland and longitude 70 degrees East; and that part of the Indian Ocean lying south of 15 degrees South and west of 50 degrees East.

(b) From 1st June, 1940, is in sub-para (a) with the addition of the Pacific Ocean and the rest of the Indian Ocean.

(c) From 10th June, 1940, anywhere at sea.

The expression "dangerous waters" shall include the following areas:-

(a) From 3rd September 1939.- The Atlantic Ocean including North Atlantic, North Sea, the Baltic, the Arctic Ocean between Greenland and latitude 70 degrees East; and that part of the Indian Ocean lying south of 45 degrees South and west of 55 degrees East.

(b) From 1st June, 1940.- As in paragraph (a) with the addition of the Pacific Ocean and the west of the Indian Ocean.

73. Qualifications for award.- The Italy Star will be awarded to those who have earned it whatever other Campaign Stars may be granted in addition for service in the present war.

74. Provided that the requirements of para 6 are fulfilled the Star will be awarded for operational service on land under the conditions of para 4 (a) as follows:-

72. Ribbon.--The ribbon is in the Irish colours, green, white and red. There are five vertical stripes of equal width, one in red at either end and one in green at the center, the two converging at the bottom in white.

73. Qualifications for award.--The Irish Star will be awarded to those who have earned it under other Commonwealth Stars and will be awarded in addition for service in the present war.

74. Provided that the requirements of para 6 are fulfilled the Star will be awarded for operational service on land under the conditions of para 4 (a) as follows:--

78. Qualification for award.--Qualifying for the British and German Star an individual must have entered either France, Belgium, Holland or Germany on operational service under the conditions of para 4 (a) between 6th June, 1944, and 6th May, 1945, and fulfilled the conditions of para 6+.

79. Individual entitled in the British R.A.F., or who served with R.A.F. Defence of Merchant Shipping, or R.A.F. I.M.C. Troops for the Defence of ships in Government Service, or as permanent staff of troopships or hospital ships (carriers) will be eligible for the British and German Star.

80. Army personnel with qualifying service in the Royal Navy, Merchant Navy or R.A.F., will be considered to the regulations of these services, which are as follows:

- (a) Royal Navy and Merchant Navy -- Naval and Merchant Navy Service effort in the North Sea south of the line from the Firth of Forth to Kristiansand (South) is the "English Channel or the Bay of Biscay, West of Mount St. Pierre West will be a qualification provided such service was directly in support

of land operations in France, Belgium, Holland, Germany, etc. Naval and Merchant Navy service effort in the Mediterranean is support of operations in the South of France will not be a qualification. Such service will qualify for the Italy Star.

(b) Part 7 - Air Crew service in operations in support of qualifying land operations, and operational service, from 6th June 1944 to 30th May 1945, over Europe, will qualify. Air crew service qualifying for the Atlantic Star will not qualify for this Star. Sorties from the Mediterranean area near Europe, will not be a qualification as such service will be a qualification of the Italy Star.

(c) General - For Naval personnel on duty ashore and non-air crew personnel of the R.N.V.R. entry into the prescribed areas of land operations will be a qualification.

61. Class - The France and Germany Star will not be awarded in addition to the Atlantic Star or the Italy Star. Personnel who qualified for these Stars or two of them will be awarded the Star first earned. If the France and Germany Star is awarded under these conditions a Class will be awarded for service which would qualify for the Atlantic Star.

62. Medals - A silver rose shall be added to denote the award of the Class will be worn on the ribbon when the Star itself is not worn.

Domestic personnel serving with the British Army.

Personnel of the Dominion Forces who served with the British Army under the special loan schemes (C.C. Canteen) or exchange schemes may qualify for British Campaign Stars and Medals under the same conditions as for personnel of the British Army.

101. Civilians.

(a) Members of the civilian organisations listed in Appendix 'D' are eligible for Campaign Stars and Medals.

(b) It is a condition without any exception that persons were full-time workers, were in uniform and met the conditions appropriate to military personnel.

(c) Applications for awards by civilians will be made to the Secretary at the Headquarters of the organisation to which the individual belonged during the period of service in an operational area.

(d) Claims by civilian officers and other ranks in respect of former civilian service in any of the above organisations, will be submitted to the War Office for investigation. If the service is a covered claim form will be returned to the War Office for investigation. Concerned for qualification, will be returned to the War Office for investigation.

(c) Applications for members of civilians will be made to the Secretary at the Headquarters of the organization to which the individual belonged during the period of service in an operational area.

(d) Claims by serving officers and other ranks in respect of former civilian service in any of the above organizations, will be submitted to the War Office for investigation. If the service in the civilian form will be returned to the G.C.O. or O.C. unit concerned for publication in Part II/III Orders and will thereafter be disposed of in the normal manner.

(e) The Secretary of the organization will be informed by the War Office of any claim approved.

102. Allied Nationals. - Claims are received from Allied nationals who are serving or have served in the British Army, and who claim to have qualified for the award during such service will be dealt with under the normal procedure. A separate roll of such individuals will be prepared for despatch to the War Office when ready. Applications received in respect of service which relate to service not in the Armed Forces will be forwarded to the War Office. (A.C. 4 medals) for necessary action. In every instance, the award is made on the understanding that by the acceptance of a British Campaign Star or Medal, an Allied national will not be entitled to a similar award from his own Government, or any other Allied Government. There is to any

a similar award is to be interpreted as a Cross of Merit Star or Medal instituted for the period and the service for which a British Star or Medal has been granted. The continued wearing of the ribbon will be invalidated by the acceptance of any other award as above defined.

SUBJECT: Recommendations for Medal of Freedom

TO : Directors of Divisions, Sub-Commissions and Chiefs of Branches
Economic Section.

1. The U. S. War Department has authorized the awarding of the Medal of Freedom to persons heretofore designated, who since 7 December 1941 have performed a meritorious act or service which has aided the United States in the prosecution of a war against an enemy or enemies. The Medal of Freedom will not be awarded to a member of the armed forces of the U. S. for services rendered while a member of such forces.

2. The Medal of Freedom may be awarded to:

a) Citizens or habitual residents of a United States for acts or services performed while residing or taking in areas outside the continental limits of the United States. When the award to such personnel is based on "services rendered", the requirement will be the performance of exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services. The basic medal only, without palm, will be awarded to citizens or habitual residents of the U. S.

b) Members of Armed Forces of Friendly Foreign Nations who have distinguished themselves by exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services. To recognize appropriately the degree of service rendered, the Medal of Freedom may be awarded to such persons, with Gold Palm (highest award), with Silver Palm, with Bronze Palm or without Palm. For such personnel the Gold Palm will be considered comparable to but below the degree of Merit degree of Chief Commander, the Silver Palm to but below the degree of Commander, the Bronze Palm to but below the degree of Officer, and the Basic Medal without Palm to but below the degree of Lieutenant. (See Para. 12 AR 600-45).

c) Foreign civilians of Friendly Foreign Nations, with appropriate medals, for performance of duty in such a manner as to merit recognition by the service as being clearly exceptional.

(1) The Gold Palm shall be awarded to men foreign civilians who have distinguished themselves by the most exceptionally meritorious conduct or have displayed the most extraordinary

- (4) The Basic Medal Without Palm may be awarded in cases of less meritorious or heroic acts, which will still have been of unquestioned aid to the United States or to a nation engaged with the United States in the prosecution of a war. The minimum requirement is the standard for the award of the Legion of Merit, degree of Legionnaire, to a member of the armed forces of a friendly foreign nation. (See Para. 12 AR600-45)

3. Recommendations

- a) Who may submit. Recommendation may be submitted by any individual having personal knowledge of the facts of the rendition or contribution of the required service.

b) Recommendations will:

- (1) Describe specifically and in detail the service or act deemed to be meritorious, including dates, the nature of the act or acts forming the basis for the recommendation.

- (2) Include a proposed citation. The proposed citation will include:

- Name, civilian or military status and identification, period of time (inclusive dates) of service rendered, and the general locality.
- A condensation of the letter of recommendation including all pertinent facts upon which award is based.
- The last sentence of the proposed citation will include the individual's home and state or present home address.

4. Deserving recommendations will be submitted on a form similar to that outlined in the appropriate enclosure hereto. The degree recommended -- gold, silver, bronze or basic -- will be specified in all cases except for 1, 3, civilians. Nationalities or places of habitual residence will be indicated in each recommendation.

5. In the case of the recommendation of a national of a country other than the United States of America or the United Kingdom, the name of his country shall be inserted appropriately in paragraphs 1 and 4 of the recommendation as it to read:

"... aided the United States and similarly aided the United Kingdom and ... engaged with the United States ..."

6. It is requested that all recommendations from divisions, branches and sub-commissions of the Economic Section be compiled and in the hands of the Administrative and Personnel Branch Economic Section on or before Saturday, 27 October 1945, since all recommendations from the Allied Commission must be processed by 2675th Regiment and forwarded to JMWOC at ...

6. SEVEN NEW DISTINCTIONS FOR WAR SERVICE

DEFENCE MEDAL FOR CIVILIANS ON HOME FRONT

ALL RIBBONS DESIGNED BY THE KING

Details of the seven new distinctions for war service—six campaign stars and a defence medal—were announced by the Prime Minister in the House of Commons yesterday. Qualifications are set out in a White Paper.

FEATS OF ARMS AND COURAGE

BATTLE OF BRITAIN EMBLEM

WESTMINSTER, FRIDAY

The PRIME MINISTER made a statement in the House of Commons to-day, on the eve of the Whitsun recess, on the new distinctions which have been created by the King for service in the war. He disclosed that the King had given much time to the subject and had considered and designed all the ribbons himself.

Mr. Churchill said:—

The House will have learned this morning of the new distinctions which have been created by his Majesty for service in the war. It is now some 14 months since we debated this subject, and hon. members will have noticed in that interval one or two events which seem to call for recognition. (Laughter and cheers.) The new campaign stars are six in number—the Atlantic Star, the Air Crew Europe Star, the Italy Star, the France and Germany Star, the Pacific Star, and the Burma Star. They will commemorate the feats of arms, endurance, and courage of our forces by sea, land, and air, and of our Merchant Navy in the main theatres of war. (Cheers.) Two new stars for operations in the East will also mark the service of those who have gone out, or go out in the future, to finish the war against the Japanese. The ribbons are

QUALIFICATIONS FOR AWARDS

EXTENSION OF 1939-43 STAR

The six campaign stars and a defence medal are the subject of a White Paper issued yesterday (Cmd. 6633, Stationery Office, 3d.).

Approval has been granted for the prolongation of the currency of the 1939-43 Star to May 8, 1945, the date of the end of active hostilities in Europe. The question of the possible prolongation of the currency of this star to the end of active hostilities in the Pacific will be a matter for consideration. The requirement that the Africa Star and this star should not be awarded to the same individual is withdrawn. Special grants of the 1939-45 Star may be made. Selection will be guided by the principle of responsibility for operational decisions. Senior officers such as the chiefs of staff, commanders-in-chief, and commanders thus qualified may be awarded the star.

ATLANTIC STAR

The Atlantic Star is intended to commemorate the Battle of the Atlantic and is designed primarily for convoys and their escorts and anti-submarine forces, as well as for fast merchant ships that sailed alone. The ribbon is blue, white, and sea green, shaded and watered. The star is to be granted for six months' service afloat in the Navy in the Atlantic and home waters since September 3, 1939, and until May 8, 1945. The Merchant Navy will be awarded the star under the same conditions as the Navy, except that six months' service any-

ATLANTIC STAR

The Atlantic Star is intended to commemorate the Battle of the Atlantic and is designed primarily for convoys and their escorts and anti-submarine forces, as well as for fast merchant ships that sailed alone. The ribbon is blue, white, and sea green, shaded and watered. The star is to be granted for six months' service since September 3, 1939, and until May 8, 1945. The Merchant Navy will be awarded the star under the same conditions as the Navy, except that six months' service anywhere at sea will qualify, provided that one or more voyages have been made in the defined area. Air crews of the R.A.F. will also be eligible.

AIR CREW EUROPE STAR

The Air Crew Europe Star is an award for operational flying from United Kingdom bases over Europe since September 3, 1939, and up to June 5, 1944. The ribbon is light blue with black edges and a narrow yellow stripe on either side.

ITALY STAR

The Italy Star has been approved for entry into operational service on land in Sicily or in Italy at any time during the campaign there from the capture of Pantelleria on June 11, 1943, and until May 8, 1945. The ribbon is in Italian colours, green, white, and red.

FRANCE AND GERMANY STAR

The France and Germany Star has been introduced for operational service on land in Germany, until May 8, 1945. The ribbon is in the red, white, and blue of the Union Flag, and these colours are also used in a symbol of France and the Netherlands. The 1939-45 Star must be earned by six or for air crew, two months' service in operations before a candidate can qualify for the France and Germany Star. The star will not be awarded in addition to the Atlantic Star or the Air Crew Europe Star. If a candidate should qualify for these three stars or two of them the star first earned will be awarded.

PACIFIC STAR

The Pacific Star is for operational service in the Pacific theatre from December 8, 1941, until further notice. The ribbon is dark green with red edges and with a central yellow stripe.

BURMA STAR

The Burma Star is for the campaign from December 11, 1941, until further notice. The ribbon is dark blue with a central red stripe and in addition two orange stripes. A candidate who qualifies for both the Burma and the Pacific Stars will be awarded the star first earned.

Although time spent as a prisoner of war may be counted towards the qualifying period for the 1939-45 Star, such time will not be counted towards the period of six or, for air crew, two months' operational service which must be completed before the grant of one of the new stars. A person who at the time of his capture has completed the six or two months' operational service required for the award of the 1939-45 Star may, however, count time spent as a prisoner of war towards the period of six or two months' service required for the award of the Atlantic or Air Crew Europe Stars. No person will be awarded more than one clasp to any one of the stars. Consideration will be given to the production of a scheme for the award of the new stars in certain conditions for those civilian crews who have flown into or through theatres of war or over dangerous waters. Air crews of the Royal Air Transport Command engaged in similar duties will also be considered.

In the case of persons in operational service at the end of active hostilities in Europe, the Italy Star and the France and Germany and the Air Crew Europe Stars will be awarded by virtue of entry into a theatre of operations and the previous six or two months' service

The troops are particularly pleased to be able to mount them.

The currency of the 1939-45 Star has been prolonged until this month, and the award will be described for the present as the "1939-45 Star"; that is to meet the time involved.

At the same time his Majesty the King has approved the award of this star and the Africa Star to the same individual. Hitherto only one or the other could be worn. The maximum number of stars granted to any one recipient will be five.

His Majesty has also instituted a gilt rose emblem to be worn on the ribbon of the 1939-45 Star for air crew of fighter aircraft engaged in the Battle of Britain between July 1 and October 31, 1940. (Loud cheers.)

RIBBONS SOON

The ribbons of these stars will be coming out now, but I cannot promise a date for the actual stars to be struck. They have been most carefully considered, so that every difficulty that we can foresee has been dealt with. The matters were of extreme complication, but we have tried to meet all objections. No doubt there will be some improvement which can be suggested later, and I do not say that anything is absolutely final, in the sense that a reasonably hard case might be conceivably considered.

We have also struck a defence medal. It is intended to recognize the service here of forces from the Dominions who stood by us in a time of the gravest need, and it will also be awarded, subject to three years' qualification, to those citizens of this country who, during the years of danger, served here in the forces of the Home Guard, the National Fire Service, the Police, and the Civil Defence. (Cheers.) This medal will touch about 7,000,000 people, and recognize the struggle against the enemy's air and bomb attacks.

DEFENCE MEDAL

The Defence Medal is to be granted for three years' service with forces in non-operational areas subjected to air attack or closely threatened; for one year's non-operational service with the forces overseas from or outside the country of residence; for three years' civil defence or other specified civilian service in military operational areas and for civil defence service in non-operational areas subjected to air attack or closely threatened. The time qualification in the case of mine and bomb disposal units of the forces will be three months.

The centre of the ribbon is flame-coloured and the edges are green, symbols of the enemy attacks on our green and pleasant land. Two black stripes represent the black-out.

Those qualified for any one of the campaign stars may be granted this award in addition. Members of Dominion forces who have served in the United Kingdom will be eligible and the Home Guard will be included. Service by United Kingdom forces in West Africa, Palestine, or India, as well as service by Dominion forces in non-operational areas outside their own countries, will also be a qualification. The part-time service of the Mulla Home Guard will be specially recognized by the grant of the Defence Medal.

Members of civilian services in the United Kingdom eligible for chevrons for war service in the United Kingdom will receive the medal and civil defence services in Gibraltar and Malta and in other territories in the Colonial Empire which qualify for chevrons will also be eligible. Service will be counted from September 3, 1939, to May 8, 1945, or to the stand-down of the organization if earlier. Home Guard service will be reckoned from June, 1940, to the stand-down in November, 1944. Service in the various eligible categories may be aggregated.

The medal will be granted without regard to the period of service to those who may have received an award of commendation for brave conduct or commendation for valuable service in the air, provided that the recipient, when the commendation was earned, was serving in a category eligible for the medal.

HOME GUARD

SIR I. WARD (Hull, N.W., U.) said that many Home Guards served during the blitz on London and other places in 1940-41, and subsequently joined in the Forces because they were young. Would they be ineligible for the Defence Medal because they joined the Forces before they completed three years in the Home Guard?

Mr. CHURCHILL—I think that if they go to the Forces they will get these other Stars.

Mr. W. G. HALL (Colne Valley, Lab.) asked whether the King's African Rifles and other Colonial troops would get medals, and also women in all branches.

Mr. CHURCHILL—Women are included, of course, wherever they are in the same position as men. There is provision for the Defence Medal being given to persons who served abroad in areas which, although not military areas, were either seriously threatened or subjected to the danger of air attack.

Replying to further questions, Mr. CHURCHILL said that consideration would certainly be given to the issue of certificates to relatives of servicemen killed in action. After the last war, as Secretary of State for War, he signed a number of such certificates which were hung up in the houses of the bereaved. He also considered that there should be certain appointed days—days of celebration and holidays—when persons entitled to do so should wear their medals on their civilian clothes.

"We must never forget," he said, "that these medals are the poor man's escutcheon."

Questioned about the award of further decorations, Mr. CHURCHILL said: "We must not get our argument too full. The limits of the human breast also introduce cautionary ideas. (Laughter.)"

There might be a United Nations medal, but the Defence Medal must complete the story for Great Britain.
