MINUTES OF TRANSPORTATION SUB-COMMISSION AFF MEETING
22 OCTOBER 1945 180/M 1

Meeting No. 37:

A Transportation Sub-Commission Staff Meeting was held in the First Floor Conference Room at 8:45 A.M., Monday, 29 October 1945. Colonel Buchanan, Acting Director, was in the Chair.

216. FUTURE MEETINGS: Colonel Buchanan stated that future meetings will be held in the First Floor Conference Room. Economic Staff meetings will probably continue to be held on Tuesdays. In view of that fact, Transportation Sub-Commission Staff Meetings may be held on Wednesday mornings so that anything coming up in Economic Staff Meetings may be taken up the next day in Transportation Meetings. He stated, however, that for the time being the meetings will be held on Saturday morning at 8:45 A.M. unless otherwise notified.

217. ECONOMIC STAFF MEETING: Colonel Buchanan said that at the meeting on Tuesday, General McKinley said goodbye. Mr. Harlan Cleveland has been appointed Acting Vice President and Colonel Densmore, Deputy Vice President. Mr. Cleveland made a statement about things as he had seen them in Washington, but Colonel Buchanan said that he would not quote from this meeting but would wait until the Minutes of the Meeting were ready and would distribute extracts to Divisions for their information.

Colonel Densmore stated that the Transportation Sub-Commission had inquired as to whether there was any objection to publication of freight shipping information. There is no objection to this.

218. ECITO: Colonel Buchanan reported that the European Central Inland Transport Organization (ECITO) contemplates opening a regional office here in Rome as soon as the peace treaty with Italy is signed and Italy can join the organization. In the meantime they are proposing to set up a Military Office (ORMCA). (Office for Relations with Military and Occupation Authorities.) The Headquarters of ORMCA is in Brussels under General Hewer (Deputy Director General of ECITO). Professor Hordelink is Director General of ECITO. General Hewer has appointed Brigadier Fellows as the representative of ORMCA in Italy. Brigadier Fellows is now attending the International Passenger Train Conference in Brussels, but wants to set up his office here and is looking for one or two clerks. If anyone has someone available please get in touch with Lt. Col. Scoggins.

219. RAIL DIVISION: Mr. Moss reported that another grain ship had put in at the Port of Genoa. This shipment was wheat for the American Occupied Zone of Austria. Mr. Moss considered that Genoa was not the proper port for such a shipment but that Venice or Trieste should be used. He said that use of either of these two ports instead of Genoa would save time and cars from the rail standpoint. Major Laraman said that a signal had already gone to AFHQ on this matter and agreed to follow it up with a letter, asking that no more such ships be dealt with in Genoa.

220. MISCELLANEOUS: Colonel Buchanan mentioned that recently there had been quite an epidemic of things disappearing from the offices and suggested that as *Generalissimo Mussolini* had been in the office recently, those that went out in the office

SUBJECT: Transportation Staff Meeting.

TO : See Distribution.

1. Further to Minute No. 217 of Transportation Staff Meeting held this day, following is an extract from the Minutes of the Economic Section Staff Meeting on 23 October, giving Mr. Cleveland's views of matters as they are now seen in Washington.

"In response to General McKinley's request, Mr. Cleveland spoke briefly regarding the Italian situation as it is viewed in Washington. Interest centers around the question of the peace treaty, but since the conclusion of the London Conference, no one expects the Italian peace treaty before Spring. A second basis of interest is our economic work over here, and a third, the part that Italy plays in politics. The financing of the interim program has now been assured through the December loadings. Arrangements have been made with UNRRA whereby they will use part of the funds to buy and have at seaboard supplies for the January loadings. It is realized at high levels in Washington that it would be disastrous to cut off the supply program in the middle of the winter. Between now and the end of the year, the supply part of the Economic Section's functions will be greater than it has ever been before because there are more supplies coming in than ever before. Re-opening of trade between Italy and the U. K. and the U. S. should be possible in the near future as both Great Britain and the United States have now adopted policies which already have or are about to lift any restrictions on that kind of trade. Mr. Cleveland stated that he felt the next three months should be regarded as a period of construction toward a new and better kind of economic operation rather than a liquidating operation. This attitude should be adopted by the Sub-Commission."

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MINUTES OF TRANSPORTATION SUB-COMMISSION STAFF MEETING
21 SEPTEMBER 1945

Meeting No. 16:

The weekly Transportation Sub-Commission Staff Meeting was held in the Third Floor Main Conference Room at 8:45 A.M., Monday, 24 September 1945. Mr. Uyman, Director, was in the Chair; all Divisions and the Truck Operating Group were represented, and representatives of ISN were present.

210. CORRECTION: Colonel Buchanan pointed out that minute 200 in the minutes of meeting for 14 September, third line reading "duty car" should read "duty clerk".

211. ECONOMIC STATE MEETING: Colonel Buchanan also mentioned that the following points had arisen in the Economic Staff Meeting the previous day: a) There is still no news about the turn-back in the North. Altho, politically, it was desirable that the turn-back should happen by the end of the month, no authority had yet been received by USA from HQ. It was not likely, therefore, that there would be any change before the 15th of October; b) Colonel Donomore stated a great portion of the stores in the Naples warehouse might well be disposed of and had suggested to the Sub-Commission that they should review their holdings with a view to the disposal of much of this.

212. RAIL DIVISION: Mr. Moss stated there is a general distribution of cars in most of the compartments, especially Naples, which continues to show a surplus of cars. Although the VRB make it is found that cars have not been placed regularly. This is a problem for ISR and MRS. Mr. Moss further announced 18 new passenger services are being inaugurated this week, the majority of which are in the Venice area, but which also includes one train to Pisa, one to Arezzo, and a thru-train between Roma-Legrandrio via Ancone. He also said that authorization was given for a wine tanker train from Puglia to Milan area. The train was authorized but only five or six trains moved due to the fact that ISR and the Italian Government did not requisition the private wine tankers. As a result of a meeting on Saturday, it is hoped the Ministry of Transport will requisition all wine tankers in Italy for this emergency. It was reported that the requisition of material in Italy on the American side has partly been catalogued. In certain depots, Bari, Naples, and Leghorn, material is being made available to the Italian Government, and ISR will act as their agent. Regarding depots of captured material in the north, G-5 says that all material has been turned over to the Italian Government and that ISR should get their part of it. In the establishment of USSET, in the American side, MRS will leave the transport section here. Mr. Moes requested definite information regarding the future responsibilities of USMID Division to enable them to plan their program.

213. ORGANIZATION: Mr. Uman reported that Economic Section has now called for the second phase of the reports from the Sub-Commission concerning a detailed break-down into two parts, the supply functions which UGAR would assume and the other functions which they would not assume and the lay-out program which will continue for the interim period. The second phase seeks for a breakdown of personnel in the various sections and their desire to either remain in this field or be released.

MINUTES OF TRANSPORTATION SUB-COMMISSION STAFF MEETING
11 SEPTEMBER 1945

Meeting No. 25:

The Weekly Transportation Sub-Commission Staff Meeting was held in the Third Floor Main Conference Room at 8:45 A.M., Saturday, 11 September 1945. Mr. Urman, Director, was in the Chair; all Divisions and the Truck Operating Group were represented, and representatives of ISR were present.

199. ECONOMIC STAFF MEETING: Brigadier General McKinley has returned from London and Washington and presided at the Economic Section Staff Meeting. He gave comments and observations of the probable future of AC, UNRRA, and the various other agencies in Italy. There will be a cut of 500 American EM personnel assigned to AC, which constitutes approximately a 50% decrease in strength, to take place by 20 September. Administration Division reports that Transportation Sub-Commission will probably not be hit too hard by this reduction of personnel, which will be determined on the basis of points. With regard to AC, Brig. General McKinley pointed out the major part of strength cut in AC personnel in general will be in the turn-back in the north up to 1 November or 1 December. In that connection, the turn-back date in the north is now being announced in terms of September 3^a instead of September 15, pending official announcement of AHQ. AC will continue, it is pointed out, until the first of the year, at least as a skeleton organization to fill in the gap at present, until such time as UNREL gets into full force on the supply side of the program. At the same time some sort of arrangement for a small economic mission or joint mission will be made. London and Washington are in accord with UNREL taking over the Italian mission, dependent upon the appropriation of funds, chiefly on the action of the American Congress, inasmuch as the major portion of appropriations comes from that source. The General proposed a possible re-organization at this stage of the Economic Section along the following lines: To establish a Supply Division, pulling out technical or economic functions, and separating divisions which UNREL would not take over or would not fall under their program; to separate into two parts, those functions which are to be continued and those not to be continued; is proposed that the various Sub-Commissions give statements as to how their organization should be divided along these lines and suggested consolidating the activities of the different Sub-Commissions. This statement is called for at 4:00 P.M. on Monday, 17 September, and Colonel Buchanan has requested statements from the various Divisions of Transportation Sub-Commission.

200. DUTY OFFICER: Colonel Buchanan stated Transportation Sub-Commission has been requested to have a duty officer on Wednesday and Saturday afternoons and also a duty officer available on Sundays. Administration Division has been requested to compile a roster of duty officers, showing the room where they will be located and also their telephone number. R-H Division is exempted from this routine.

201. MAIL DIVISION: Mr. Mass strated Naples and Farni constitute two "dark spots" for Rail Division. In Farni, the situation has been the result of lack of good direction of the part of ISR and labor conditions.

201. RAIL DIVISION: Mr. Ross stated Naples and Bari constitute two "dark spots" for Rail Division. In Bari, the situation has been the result of lack of good direction of the part of ISB and labor conditions. ISB overtime is paid at the rate of 5-1/2 cents per hour. In Naples, the lack of good direction and enough energy put into railway operations by ISB and the lack of personnel on the part of the military to see that the job is done has produced the situation. The withdrawal of so many personnel as possible has left them without enough people to fully cover the situation.

202. PORT OF GENOVA: The port of Genoa was opened up and developed faster than rail facilities were capable of taking care of the business, and thus

condition will exist until the latter part of this month. Fortunately there were four lines connecting out of the port; one is now operating, the second line will be operating by the 20th of September, while the third line by 10th October. The switching yard was demolished, but will be reconstructed, It will be sometime in the middle of October before goods will be considered "easy". 203. DISCONTINUING OF FLEETING: Mr. Franklin announced the approval of best things that has happened so far in Germany concerned in the discontinuation of the railways. The channel for securing release of these stores is now mulled up since the Army, Peasant Commission, and Engineers of HQ District, that has been unable to obtain any of the stores.

206. ROAD MISSION: Mr. Franklin requested that Division to assist in the transportation of refugees in the north. Due to lack of patrol, the 70 mile round trip, less than a ten-mile stretch in on road transport.

207. STRUCTURE OF MILITARY OFFICERS: American Officers may have the critical stores of points can be promoted if they agree to remain for the emergency and six months thereafter. It is possible arrangements might be made for leaving American Officers and MTOU... Such arrangements have been completed for American Civilian personnel.

208. LOGIC OF REIT AWED: Colonel (Mr.) Moss was awarded the Legion of Honor last week.

209. TRUCK OPERATING CHIEF: The Truck Operating Group has been completed by Lieutenant. The lack of personnel is offering the disbandment of the Maintenance Group. EPA has been requested to extend the time for dissolving this group an additional three weeks; permission has also been requested to freeze Officers for the period, particularly at HQ where records are to turned over.

The Traffic Sub-Committee of the Allied Armies Board, London, Transmits to the T.A.Y. The reported of the railroad, Army Board, London, Transmits to be secured. This will permit more or less free movement in Italy, except for the military, who gets first priority.

204. NEW PASSENGER SERVICES: Rail Division announced the approval of eighteen new passenger services which will be inaugurated between now and 1 October.

205. STONES IN THE NORTH: North of Avrora and in the Brenner Pass territory, is a vast amount of stones. The lack of this material has caused the suspension of work on the railways. The channel Pox securing release of these stones is so muddled up among the Army, Regimental Commissaries, and Engineers of HQ District, that ISH has been unable to identify any of the stores.

206. R.O.D. DIVISION: Mr. Franklin requested R.I.D. Division to assist in the transportation of refugees in the north. Due to lack of petrol, the 70 mile round trip, has put a terrific strain on rail transport.

207. PROBLEMS OF AMERICAN OFFICERS: American officers who have tie critical scores of points can be protected if they agree to remain for the emergency and six months thereafter. It is possible arrangements might be made for leaving American officers and their families. Such arrangements have been completed for American civilian personnel.

208. LEONID OLEINIK ASS'D: Colonel (Min.) Oleinik was awarded the Legion of Merit last week.

209. TRUCK OPERATING GROUP: The Truck Operating Group has been completed by disbanding. The lack of personnel is affecting the disbandment of the Maintenance Group. SHM has been requested to extend the time for dissolving this group an additional three weeks; permission has also been requested to freeze officers for that period, particularly at HQ, where records are to turned over.

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 MINUTES OF TRANSPORTATION SUB-COMMISSION STAFF MEETING
 3 SEPTEMBER 1945

Meeting No. 24

The weekly Transportation Sub-Commission Staff Meeting was held in the Third Floor Main Conference Room at 8:45 A.M., Monday, 3 September 1945. Mr. Ugnat, Director, was in the Chair; all Division and the Truck Operating Group were represented, and representatives of ISR, CGCRA, and EMC were present.

185. MOVEMENT DIVISION: Major Worthington reported that the first wine train was loaded and should have left on the 1st of September. There are 108 cars now in Bari area but they are in very bad condition and will take some time to clear out; therefore the movement of the wine will be delayed. First cars from Salerno due at Genoa on the 4th.

186. RAIL DIVISION: Mr. Moss announced that mills in certain areas which formerly were restricted for military timber cutting have been released by the Military and are now available for the I.S.R. This means that timber will be available in limited quantity for repair of rolling stock, ties and repair to buildings. Mr. Moss reported that the most important thing now for the Rail Division is the procurement of rails. Jobs are at a standstill now for the want of rail. This is being handled with the Industry Sub-Commission. During the past week passenger service between Bari and Bologna was set up. In the North, especially north of Bologna, we have known for some time that there is quite a bit of material which could be used for the I.S.R. This material runs to several thousand tons and it will be made available to the Italian State Railways. Some of this is vital material for reconstruction work. Mr. Moss announced that the wagon control system is now in full operation. Lt. Jeffreys is having meetings daily and is functioning with no continued complaint on shortage of equipment. Reconstruction and repair of box cars will be given first priority. These box cars will be needed during the winter months.

187. PORTS AND WAREHOUSE DIVISION: Mr. Franklin reported that the first batch of vehicles on the 20,000 ton lift had been turned over to the Italian Government; approximately 980 vehicles. Commencing the tenth of the month they will start turning over an additional 3,500 to 4,000. Forty percent are rumors and the remaining 60 percent need work done on them. Will probably be handling 6,000 or 7,000 vehicles to meet 20,000 ton lift.

188. PORTS AND WAREHOUSE DIVISION: Condition of Genoa Port greatly improved. Port capacity now estimated at 8,000 tons. At the end of last week seven Liberty berths available, one berth for large constor. Another Liberty berth occupied by hospital ship and another due to replace it. Italian authorities agreed with Port authorities that port could be stepped up to 8,000 tons only. Mr. Bezzanelli suggested that an expert on rail operation be sent up to Genoa to look into the rail situation. Mr. Crook

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189. TRAIN TRIP TO THE NORTH: Train trip to the North for the Minister of Transport will leave Terminal Station at 10:00 tonight, scheduled to return to Rome, at 2:30 A.M. Monday, September 10. Those going on the trip will be the Director of Roads; Director of Rail; and Director of Transportation; and Mr. Hughes, T.E.A. Administrative Officer. The Economic Section will be represented by Colonel Densmore if Brig. General McKinley returns in time.

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190. SHORTAGE OF MAIL CARS IN GHANA: It was reported that there is a shortage of mail cars in Ghana for the first time. They are only receiving approximately 50 percent of the cars that were ordered. Method of moving foodstuffs, etc., from ports not considered good. For instance, moving of grains from shipside to warehouse to mills to mills.

191. ECONOMIC STAFF MEETING: There was no Economic Staff Meeting held the past week. Brig-General McKinley is expected back in the next day or two.

192. PLANNING DIVISION: Effective today, September 3, 9:15 a.m., the Planning Division is abolished. Col. Lynch is placed on Staff Administration Division as a Transport Economist and will be furnished whatever assistance he needs for special studies and reports that are required.

193. MINISTER OF TRANSPORT: In the past economy visits have been made to the Minister of Transport by too many people. Calls must be cut down and visits should not be made on things of minor importance. On matters of importance visits should be made by the Deputy Director or the Director, when necessary taking with him the person having the best knowledge of the question at hand.

MINUTES OF TRANSPORTATION SUB-COMMISSION MEETING.

A meeting was held in the Conference Room No. 27 on the first floor of the AC building on January 11th at 9:00 AM; representatives of all divisions and branches of Transportation sub-commission were present.

Mr. Taylor, Director, opened the meeting with the following statement: "We are undergoing a complete change of policy in Transportation sub-commission at the present time. We will function as a staff branch which is the method which the Chief Commissioner desires us to follow. We have disposed of our spare parts industry, tire industry, and all regional functions will be carried in the field under the Regional Commissioners. There are two seemingly conflicting policies we are trying to follow: 1) return of all responsibilities in King's Italy back to the Italians, and 2) setting up a complete Movements Division to rigidly control movements in King's Italy as well as in ANG territory. This movements control is obviously necessary, due to the shortage of transport and competition with military movements, in order to get civilian supplies delivered. Just how this will work out, we do not know. We are in the process of turning back to the Italian Government, the operation of truck pools in King's Italy, as it is practically up to strength in officer personnel, therefore it is difficult to see where we are going to get an material relief in increased officer personnel, unless we get officer personnel from other sub-commissions or have officers attached from ANG. It is obviously necessary to consider all field officers as transportation officers and not as rail officers, road officers, or ports or movements officers. Transportation officers in the field will have to perform any of these various duties in order to make present officers strength go around. In other words, where we have import port activities in a province, an experienced port officer will be appointed as transportation officer for that particular province; in a province where large truck activities are located, an experienced highway man will be appointed, etc. There is no other way to cover our field responsibilities with the limited personnel now available or to become available in the predictable future."

Sixty officers in the field are transportation officers, they will be controlled thru the Administration Division, and the command of the Regional Commissioner will be obtained if an officer is to be moved from one region to another. Where the Regional Commissioner does not agree, the move will be made thru C-1, either American or British, depending upon the nationality of the officer involved, and if C-1 does not agree, we still have recourse thru the Chief Commissioner.

The question was raised concerning three officers for Sicily, or why we should have movements officers in Sicily. It was pointed out that there was no increase proposed in officer personnel for Sicily over the two there at present, and that a movement control is needed in Sicily inasmuch as during the month of December only 40% of the requirements of Sicily for transport by rail was lifted.

It was agreed that for the present, the warehouse branch of Ports & Warehouses division of Transportation sub-commission would assume responsibility of storing supplies which are in transit, inasmuch as we are the only ones at present who have the facilities for doing so.

With regard to the question of the responsibility of the Road Division with reference to PGL or bus lines, it was pointed out that PGL is allocated by AFHQ in bulk statements to regions and that in King's Italy we merely advise and have no control; the question of new bus lines should be taken up with the Priority Board.

It was decided to have a representative of each division meet with the Director or Deputy Director on Tuesday, January 16th for the purpose of making decisions on assignment of personnel to the various regions, keeping in mind that NW Italy should be treated as one region. It was brought out that Transportation sub-Commission had requested in a communication to the Economic Section that NW Italy, for transportation purposes, be considered as a single region and that this request was under consideration.

The question was asked, "Who is to be responsible for supplies necessary to rebuild, construct, and maintain warehouses?" This is primarily a responsibility of warehouse branch, Transportation sub-Commission with assistance of the Public Works & Utilities sub-commission, Engineering Section.

In order to have closer cooperation among the various divisions of XPMSC-Transportation sub-commission, all divisions are to pass third copy of files to the Chief Clerk, who will combine them in a float file which is to be passed around to the various divisions.

It was decided to hold a weekly transportation staff meeting every Friday morning in Room 27, 1st floor, AC building, at 9:45 AM, for a one-half hour session to discuss various transportation problems. These meetings will be attended by all divisions and branch heads and members of the Planning staff. Branch heads may bring other officers from their branches if they desire to do so.

The weekly Transportation Sub-Commission Staff Meeting was held in the First Floor Conference Room at 8:45 A.M., Saturday, 12 May 1945. Colonel M.B. Thomas, Deputy Director, was in the Chair; all divisions of the Sub-Commission and the MT Group were represented.

41. ECONOMIC SECTION STAFF MEETING: The excessive delay in channelling correspondence thru the Economic Section as well as lack of replies to correspondence directed to them was discussed. It was decided that each Division submit to Colonel Thomas a list of memoranda, giving date, reference number, and subject, to which no reply had been received, and a compilation of these memos would be given to Brig. General McKinley for follow-up.

42. ADMINISTRATION DIVISION: It was reported Lt. Col. Harris has been temporarily attached to 15th Army Group during Phase I operations.

43. MOVEMENTS DIVISION: Movements Division reported the rail wagon situation in general is deteriorating and there is no sign of immediate improvement.

44. TRUCK POOLS: Inquiry was made with regard to whom truck companies report for orders when going into another region, as unauthorized orders had been given in the past. It was agreed that truck companies should report to the Transportation Office of the region.

45. RAIL DIVISION: Rail Division reported di Reimondo should no be addressed as Engineer di Reimondo instead of General di Reimondo as in the past. They reported the Division is now represented by two civil engineers and one mechanical engineer in the North, and that in conjunction with MS, they are receiving reports regarding the railway situation in the Northern Regions. A tri-weekly rail service between Rome and Florence, and one between Rome and Arezzo are soon to be established. The wagon position in Calabria has shown improvement in the last week.

46. ROAD DIVISION: Inquiry was made regarding whom to contact for information concerning road conditions in the North. It was agreed the Transportation Officer should supply this information. Administration Division was instructed to send signals to the four regions in the North requesting interim reports on the transport situation in their region with particular attention to the availability of local transports.

47. VEHICLES AND TIES: It was announced that 950 American trucks have been assembled and that the Jeeps recently arrived are reconditioned, have no spare parts, and had to be towed from the ports.

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MINUTES OF TRANSPORTATION SUB-COMMISSION STAFF MEETING - 21 APRIL 1945Meeting No. 15

The weekly Transportation Sub-Commission Staff Meeting was held in the Third Floor Conference Room at 8:45 a.m., Saturday, 21 April 1945. Colonel M. B. Thomas, Deputy Director, was in the Chair; all divisions of the Sub-Commission, and the MT Group, were represented.

13. REPORT OF TOUR OF LT. COL. BAKER. Colonel Thomas asked for reports from the Chiefs of Divisions on action taken by them in response to Colonel Baker's requests covered in his report of tour of Southern Italy. With reference to Item 2 (iv), Messina Ferry, Colonel Lindberg reported that the firm date for the completion of the Petrace Bridge is 30 June (although it is hoped to have the work completed before that time), and when this bridge is repaired, the Messina Ferry will run from Messina to S. Giovanni instead of from Messina to Reggio. Referring to Item 4 (viii), Rolling Stock for Sicily, Colonel Sieff reported that there has again been a drain of box cars from Sicily. Referring to Item 4 (iii) Colonel Sieff reported this has been taken up with Industry, G-5 and Commerce, who have been told that the present bottlenecking in sulphur is not the fault of transportation, but production. With regard to INT, Sicily, it was stated that Captain Irvine Lynch will take over the same responsibilities as had Captain Calvanese in respect of INT road vehicles, actual operation being with the Italians. Colonel Thomas stated that Captain Irvine Lynch will stay for the time being in Sicily as Transportation Officer, and will not be removed on 1 May as originally planned. Referring to Item 4 (xiii), Railway Coal for Sicily, Colonel Lindberg reported that for the last two or three months there has been a total allocation of 9,000 per month; it is probable that 9,000 tons will not be sufficient if every civilian demand is to be met and a limited passenger and freight train service should be maintained. It was reported that there is not at present any coal reserve in Sicily. Reference 5 (f), A.C. Port Liaison Officer (Bari), it was reported that three transportation officers will remain in Bari - Major Taylor, Captain Hall and Captain Woodcock; and that Lt. O'Leary is being relieved.

14. VISITS. Colonel Thomas stated that he will be going on Monday of next week to Umbria-Marche Hqs.; a Mov-Road representative will visit Leghorn, Florence and Ancona next week; and Major Godfrey reported that a Mov-Shipping representative will be visiting Port Iglione in the near future. Colonel Thomas reminded the personnel present at the meeting to be sure to make contacts with these people if they have any points to be covered in the areas visited. Colonel Sieff mentioned that a minimum of two meetings weekly at AFHQ are attended by Movements Division personnel, and that Mov-Rail or Mov-Shipping should be contacted for any points to be discussed there.

15. CORRESPONDENCE. Colonel Thomas requested that letters of importance, acted on in his absence by divisions, be brought to his attention on his return in order that he may be kept up to date on these matters; he said he would like to initial all important incoming letters before they were filed. Colonel Thomas also reviewed the procedure for the preparation of correspondence as outlined in previous directives.

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16. ADMINISTRATION DIVISION. Colonel Scoggins announced that Lt. Colonel Giles had reported as Chief Transportation Officer, Toscana Region. Colonel Thomas said that there is available in the Administration Division a list of Italian decrees.

17. PLANNING STAFF. Major Richardson said there had recently been allocated 2,000 tons of cement for lack of which construction is being held up; an emergency bid has gone in for the movement of 650 tons, but he understood that this has been turned down by AFHQ; this was not confirmed and will be followed up by Movements Division.

18. MOVEMENTS DIVISION. Colonel Sieff said that combined shipping authorities have handed back to Italian operation and control, under over-all supervision of AC and Mediterranean shipping authorities, 10 ships, totaling some 35,000 tons dead weight, which will be run on regular coastal liner sailings. Arrangements have also been made for a section of Naples port to be handed back to the Italian authorities. So far as is possible ships containing civil supplies will be discharged in the wire-enclosed portion of the port given them. In answer to Major Klein's inquiry as to who is responsible for port clearance, Colonel Sieff stated that the clearance arrangements remain the same as those now operating.

Colonel Sieff stated that the Accounts and Statistics Branch is now providing very useful information as to bids programmed and the tonnages actually carried, and analyses of programmed tonnages not carried.

Colonel Sieff read a letter from 8th Army regarding the work of forward stockpile warehouses, reflecting credit on the Port and Warehouse Division's manner of doing their job.

19. RAIL DIVISION. Colonel Lindberg reported that a Diesel rail coach has been brought to Rome for the use of AC officers. Colonel Thomas asked for weekly reports of scheduled runs. Colonel Lindberg advised Movements Div. that when the Ancona-Ortona line is opened (early in May) there will be a reduction of traffic and a considerable drop of military tonnage on lines between Naples, Rome and Ancona, easing the East-West position. The line will be opened for moving of military traffic on 5 May, and the civilian traffic will start moving 15 May.

20. ROAD DIVISION. Colonel Fernyhough asked if bids for movement of grain will be put in locally or through Food Sub-Commission; he was told that Food Sub-Commission will submit all bids for grain movement.

21. M. T. GROUP. Colonel Bordass gave some figures on the number of WD vehicles in Italy, stating that they were inaccurate; more accurate information will be provided at future meetings for information and record. It was announced that on 1 April 32 vehicles were assembled at the MT Group plant.

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MINUTES OF TRANSPORTATION SUB-COMMISSION STAFF MEETING - 14 APRIL 1945

Meeting No. 14

The weekly Transportation Sub-Commission Staff Meeting was held in the Third Floor Conference Room at 8:45 a.m., Saturday, 14 April. Colonel M. B. Thomas, Deputy Director, was in the Chair; all divisions of the Sub-Commission, and the MT Group, were represented.

1. MONTHLY REPORT. Colonel Thomas thanked the divisions for the way in which their last monthly reports were presented; the reports had been submitted in proper form and on time, and the compilation of the Sub-Commission's Monthly Report had thus been expedited.

2. WEEKLY SITREP. Colonel Thomas stated that the Weekly Sitrep the sub-commissions submit is for compilation of the AC Sitrep, which is in turn made a part of the AFHQ Sitrep for submission to Washington. Only items of real importance are to be put in these reports; the whole Sub-Commission's report would be just two or three lines. Nil returns should be reported in writing.

3. ECONOMIC SECTION STAFF MEETING. Colonel Thomas reported that the subject of inflation had been brought up in the Economic Staff Meeting on Friday, 13 April. It was brought out that in Northern Italy prices are much lower than those in the South (e.g., ENAC truck rates) and it is proposed that when we go into the North two separate economies will be temporarily established, one for the North and the other for the present Liberated Italy. The avoidance of inflation in the North is very much to be desired; and it is hoped that, rather than having inflation in the North, the Northern prices may tend to bring down those in the South. It is possible that the Germans, before their withdrawal, will raise prices in the North. If that should be the case, when the Allies go in all prices will revert back to the prices established as of 3 April.

In answer to Major Klein's question as to whether or not there will be published a scale of wages, Colonel Thomas stated that this will be done in the near future. He also stated that road blocks are going to be set up to prevent haulers going south.

It was also mentioned in the Economic Section Staff Meeting that there is to be a reorganization of Economic Section, with Mr. Antolini heading it as Vice President; one of the changes will be the appointment of a second Deputy Vice President (Brig. Anderson), in addition to Deputy Vice President Brig. Gen. McKinley. An organization chart will be put out as soon as possible.

A further point raised was the fact that all personnel questions must be handled through Economic Section. Colonel Scoggins will be the channel so far as Transportation Sub-Commission is concerned.

4. LEAVE. Colonel Thomas asked that all divisions who have not submitted leave rosters to Admin. Div. do so, as it is important that all officers who are eligible take leave.

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5. CORRESPONDENCE. It was stated that there was still a good deal of difference of practice in the signing of letters, and the following arrangements should be observed in amplification of the procedure laid down in AC Tn Memo No. 2 of 16 March:

Letters to higher or equal echelons should be signed "For the Chief Commissioner: (e.g.) /s/ J. SMITH, Major" (excluding functional title); letters to regions and subordinate formations should be signed "By command of Rear Admiral STONE: (e.g.) /s/ J. SMITH, Major." (In writing to both of these groups on matters of an important technical or routine nature the letters should be signed by the Director or Deputy Director, rather than by a divisional officer.) In writing to the Ministries, or organizations other than military, letters are not to be signed "By command of Rear Admiral Stone" or "For the Chief Commissioner," but should be signed "For the Director: (e.g.) /s/ J. SMITH, Major" (using a Subject-To heading); however, when corresponding directly with a Minister on matters of concern to him, letters should be addressed and signed as laid down in AC Tn Memo No. 2. Memos to the Economic Section or to other sub-commissions should be signed "For the Director: (e.g.) /s/ J. SMITH, Major" or, without authentication line, by the Director or Deputy Director. Memos from one division of the Tn S/C to another should be signed for the chief of the division.

6. DIVISIONAL MATTERS OF IMPORTANCE. Colonel Thomas asked that in the future very brief divisional reports be given at the weekly Tn S/C staff meetings on salient points that occurred during the week within the respective divisions, inasmuch as the Sub-Commission as a whole would be interested.

7. ADMINISTRATION DIVISION. Nil.

8. PLANNING STAFF. Nil.

9. MOVEMENTS DIVISION. Clearance in Civitavecchia. Major Worthington stated that they are having difficulty in getting the requisite number of wagons in order to maintain port clearance. Arrangements have been made for a road lift of 200 tons per day to Rome for clearance of wine.

Piombino. Mr. Bazzanella asked if more wagons could be obtained for Piombino. Major Worthington stated that there again wagon availability was the controlling factor, coupled with tonnage agreed by AFHQ for movement on lines 50, 213, and 219 to Leghorn, Pisa and Florence, and the possibility of consignees' acceptances. (750 tons per day have been agreed to.) Mr. Bazzanella stated that they would like to get 1,000 tons per day discharged, if possible, for barley. Major Worthington said that it is not possible at the moment to clear other than the tonnage allowed by AFHQ, but that everything possible is being done to raise the port clearance figure to 1,000 tons per day. The question of inadequate warehousing at Piombino was raised.

Wheat Movement. Lt. Col. Bordess stated that the No. 7 QM Company, which had moved over to the Macerata area, had arranged for the movement of wheat, but up to date had moved only 20 tons due to the shortage of sacks. Lt. Col. Farnyough said that he had taken the matter up with Food Sub-Commission. Major Worthington stated that urgent demands had been made for the distribution of sacks, and that he believed

that the shortage of sacks in any one locality was due to the sudden change of program. Major Worthington also stated that an endeavor is being made to meet any emergency bids put in by Food Sub-Commission for rail movement of sacks.

10. ROAD DIVISION. In reply to Colonel Thomas' querie as to how many of the 1700 trucks had arrived from the United States, Road Division reported that to date the number is 1,364. Colonel Thomas requested that up-to-date figures be quoted at future meetings.

11. PORT & WAREHOUSE. Mr. Bazzanella announced the location of his offices, which are as follows:

Major Klein reported that the expected arrivals of the next three convoys in Naples will far exceed the warehouse capacity there, there being a matter of thousands of tons involved. Colonel Thomas asked that this be brought up outside the meeting.

12. VISITS. Mr. Bazzanella announced that Captain Smith is making a trip to Salerno, Torre Annunziata and Castellammare on Monday, and offered his services should any division desire to have him take up any matters at those points.

Colonel Thomas suggested that details of proposed trips to small places not frequently visited by divisional representatives be brought up in the above manner at future staff meetings in order that other divisions could put up inquiries they may have to be brought up in areas visited.

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MINUTES OF TRANSPORTATION SUB-COMMISSION STAFF MEETING - 7 APRIL 45

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MINUTES OF TRANSPORTATION SUB-COMMISSIONER'S MEETING

14 MARCH, 1945

Transportation Sub-Commission Staff Meeting was held in the 3rd floor conference room at 8:45 AM, 17 March, 1945, all divisions and branches being represented.

It was requested the minutes of the meeting held on 17 March '45 be amended as follows: The date, as well as the hour, should be designated on the front page after a review of same.

At the Economic Section Staff Meeting held on 21 March, a review was made of the Italian economic situation, which is not good because of the inability to obtain sufficient supplies from all producing countries to rectify the situation. In certain cases, when supplies are available, sufficient port capacity cannot be allocated. In view of this, improvement of the situation must come from production within Italy, which necessitates the most efficient use of transportation facilities now existing. These points were brought out as possibilities of relieving the economic situation:

- 1) The possibility of imports from Switzerland as soon as the North is liberated.
- 2) Imports from the Argentine where Italy has certain credits to be bolstered by Italian settlers in Argentina.
- 3) Imports of certain supplies from Spain in repayment of old debts.

None of the above/possibilities are firm yet.

The coal situation for Italy is likely/worsen in view of the fact there is no coal available for several months, threatened strike in American mines may cause a reduction in coal output, and strikes at the German mines have greatly reduced the output of coal for several months.

Members of the Sub-Commission were cautioned to refrain from discussing the general situation outside the U.S.

Regarding office space, it was announced that the Economic Section had been advised office accommodations for the Transportation Sub-Commission ^{as} entirely unsatisfactory, and that immediate movement of Fort and Vanderveen Division was

It was stressed that all matters of major policy must be discussed with the Director or Deputy Director, and no divisions should deal directly with the Economic Section before doing so. The Economic Section returned same to Transportation Sub-Commission and asked if Transportation as a whole acquiesced. In this particular instance, Transportation was not in accord.

An announcement was made of the much publicized loan to be floated by the Italian Government in the near future. In the approximate amount of twenty-five billion lire. They were requested to submit the list of necessary materials presented and the list of equipment already received in order that this matter could be reviewed.

Transportation Sub-Commission Staff Meeting was held in the 3rd floor conference room at 8:45 AM, 17 March, 1945, all divisions and branches being represented.

Allied Railway Board held its third meeting during the week, and altho no points of general interest were raised at the meeting, it was reported that the work of the five sub-committees of the Board is proving most useful.

At the Economic Staff meeting, the 25% cut in Italian personnel at this HQ was discussed and Transportation Sub-Commission stated it was not in a position at this time to make such a cut. While Mr. Antolini is conferring with higher authority in an endeavor to clarify the situation, no further cut will be made by Transportation Sub-Commission of Italian personnel. Members of the Sub-Commission were, however, cautioned to view the situation from the standpoint of a future reduction.

On matters of major policy end points, all communications with G-1 should be cleared thru the Economic Section; on minor points, the Administration Division should use discretion in deciding what matters should be referred to the Economic Section and what points can be dealt with direct.

Withdrawal of MT units for the north is going to create a very serious problem in meeting high priority programs in presently Liberated Italy, and a particular problem in Abruzzi-Marche Region, where, in order to meet the 200 gram ration and clear the warehouses so that the next harvest can be gathered and stored, 8,000 tons per month lift must be made available. The MT Group was requested to present a program of any new companies and units which will become available with approximate dates. The railway from Ancona to Ortona is scheduled to operate at the end of April. Rail Division was requested to examine how much of the 8,000 tons lift can be carried out by rail.

It was requested that any failure to load ships, rail wagons, or MT should be brought to the attention of the Deputy Director or Chief, Movements Division at the earliest possible moment.

Rail Division reported a serious lassiness in the circulation of the float file, stating receipt of same varied from seven to ten days. Chairman ruled that each Division may retain the float file for not more than half a day.

Port & Warehouse Division requested that any information that may be of interest to that division in possession of other divisions should be passed on to them to give them a complete picture of what is going on and to enable them to function more efficiently. This applied particularly to current operations. Chairman agreed and instructed that this be done.

The question of port clearance of cased vehicles was brought up, and it was stated that cased vehicles are to be bin a part of the normal AC

Representative of the MT group suggested that a proforma be constituted, which would be passed to the MT group covering hauls which vehicles of the group would have to lift. This proforma would give MT group necessary information re tonnage to be lifted, point of loading, destination, etc. MT group, Road Division, and Road Section, Movements Division were instructed to prepare an agreed proforma.

18941MINUTES OF TRANSPORTATION SUB-COMMISSION STAFF MEETING

The weekly Transportation Sub-Commission Staff Meeting was held in Room 27, 1st Floor, AC Building, at 8:45 a.m. on 3 March 1945, all divisions and branches of the Sub-Commission being represented.

Mr. Taylor stated that the program for the rehabilitation of Italy is pretty well completed. 41% of the necessary lift for civilian supply is being made, and the intention is to secure as much equipment and other material as possible to increase this percentage. This is one of the purposes of Mr. Taylor's proposed visit to the United States.

It was announced that Colonel Carnes, Lt. Col. Bordass, Major Pepper and Major Bruce have moved over to the special AC Truck Regiment, and that Mr. Gross has taken over as Chief of Road Division. In conjunction with this, it was stated that 1,700 trucks coming from the United States, plus 900 trucks now on hand, will be turned over to the military unit, giving us the necessary highway lift for Northern Italy.

Mr. Taylor stated that Captain Lynch had spoken to him with regard to the wagon situation in Sicily, which is very serious, and it was suggested that Movements Division meet with Captain Lynch on this question.

Colonel Thomas brought out the point that all officers in Transportation Sub-Commission should attend the weekly staff conferences.

No definite paper is as yet out on the withdrawal from King's Italy, though several drafts have been made. Colonel Thomas said that Transportation Sub-Commission is in rather a special position in that its functions are more executive than other sub-commissions; this point is receiving special consideration to the extent that its officers may be allowed to be exempt from the withdrawal; they will probably report direct to this Sub-Commission.

Colonel Thomas reminded the staff that the monthly report and the abridged report are due on the 8th of each month, and the weekly Sitrep report is due at 10 o'clock every Tuesday morning.

The question of the wagon situation in Sicily is being discussed at the meeting of the Traffic Sub-Committee of the Allied Railway Board at 10 o'clock 3 March. Mr. Taylor said that the matter of withdrawal from Sicily is of much concern, and Colonel Sieff stated that 100 box cars went out of Sicily during the past week, and 168 into Sicily and that the adverse balance was starting to right itself. Wagons are starting to arrive in Reggio ex N. Africa, and the Sicilian wagon position should be straightened out in the next month. Captain Lynch stated that 3,017 wagons have been lost in February, and that 1,800 wagons are necessary to meet needs. Mr. Taylor pointed out that the position is bad everywhere, not only in Sicily, and that an attempt is being made to get more wagons; he said that the flow of wagons from Sicily must be reversed.

Movements Division reported that they are meeting with difficulty in bringing case vehicles from the port of discharge into Rome, and increasing difficulties are foreseen. They would like the responsible branch to re-examine the possibilities of assembling the case vehicles in the neighborhood of Naples, Piombino or Leghorn. Mr. Taylor said this should be taken up with the Truck Regiment direct.

The new "Campbell" committee had its first meeting on 8 March; this committee has been set up to establish responsibilities between the Italian authorities and A/C representatives of the Combined Shipping Board in ports in King's Italy. No final results will be seen for some weeks. MECBO has allocated the "Campidoglio" to run from Sicily, alleviating the rail wagon position; her capacity is about 250 passengers.

Colonel Sieff asked the Rail Division to hasten the rail work at Civitavecchia. There is likely to be a waste of shipping in Civitavecchia since the use of lighters depends on rail siding. Rail Division was asked to give a report on this at the next meeting.

Colonel Thomas requested from the Port and Warehouse Division a list of duties of port liaison officers and warehouse officers for distribution.

Colonel Thomas stated that a rubber stamp is now available in the Administration Division for stamping letters requiring the signature of other divisions. The buck slip is mainly for routing purposes and remarks, unless of an unimportant nature, should not be put on it. Any remarks of an important nature should be written on the letter itself or, preferably, in a separate memorandum attached to the letter. (The buck slip must be returned to the Administration Division with the number of the file. After this number has been recorded in the book, buck slips are destroyed.)

MINUTES OF TRANSPORTATION SUB-COMMISSION STAFF MEETING

The sixth Transportation Staff Meeting was held in Room 27, 1st Floor, AC building at 8:45 AM on 17 February 1945, all divisions and branches of the sub-commission being represented.

Brig. General E.B. McKinley, Acting Vice President of the Economic Section, was present at the meeting. He stated that he advocated programming action to be taken with commitments as to when action would be carried out. "When a person says he is going to do a certain thing by a certain date, he should do it."

Mr. Taylor announced that during the past week, ENAC is getting into operation and plans are being made for turning over AC truck pools to ENAC. ENAC dispatching, registration, and allotment of gasoline were matters to be discussed at a meeting to be held immediately after this meeting.

The second meeting of the Allied Railway Board was held this week at which a review of problems was made arising from meetings of the five sub-committees. Transportation Sub-Commission has obtained substantial benefits for Italian civilians thru the Railway Board, particularly in regard to Passenger Traffic.

It is proposed to form a temporary committee under the auspices of MEDBO, composed of representatives of MWP, WSA, Italian Merchantile Marine, G-5 (Mov & Tr), and Tr. S/C to determine responsibilities for loading and discharging ships, port clearance, tariff rates, and determine other port and warehouse procedures and practices.

In view of the policy of withdrawal of personnel from King's Italy, it was announced that this sub-commission has determined its requirements as 15 officers for this territory, and that if this number is not allocated for transportation purposes, responsibilities will have to be assumed by AFHQ as a military commitment. In addition, it is necessary to have a limited number of officers to protect WD vehicles in truck pools in the territory turned back to the Italian Government. It is impossible to sell WD vehicles to the Italian Government at this time. This can only be done as part of our over-all program of the rehabilitation of Italian economy thru C.C.A.C. The value of these vehicles would have to be charged against the dollar credits of the Italian Government. Consideration is being given to removal of trucks from AC pools and turning them over to the new Motor Truck Brigade, placing newly imported trucks which are property of the Italian Government in the pools.

It is proposed to turn over AC warehouses in Leghorn, Ancona, and Naples to the Federazioni Consorzi Agrari for operation.

Colonel Thomas requested that all divisions and branches adhere to the deadline of the 8th of each month for handing in of monthly reports, and that reports should be presented in simple, brief and concise form. It was also pointed out that weekly Sitreps are due at 10 AM on each Tuesday.


Lt. Warley, Port & Warehouse Division; Major Long, Rail Division, Chairman, and Capt. Peterson, Road Division were designated as a committee to decide on the allocation of clothing for claimants in transportation field.

Colonel Sieff announced that Commerce Sub-Commission concurs in recommendation of G-5, AFHQ, that responsibility for transport of export shipments be transferred to TN S/C. Economic Section has been advised.

Col. Sieff also announced that we will be unable to carry out our program for stockpiling for Northwest Italy unless we obtain roofing materials for warehouses, and that we should put in an emergency bid for this material to AFHQ. This responsibility is assigned to Major Klein for action.

Road Division reported that NDIA has issued an order for civilian operators to deliver to the Italian Army 180 trucks from Region IV which they claim are captured enemy equipment.

Subject of buck slips was discussed and the Administration Division was requested to make necessary arrangements to insure proper distribution of correspondence and notations by those who have read it within the sub-commission. Administration Division was requested to arrange to have signals "deciphered" to facilitate the reading of float files.
