1. Formation of the Economic Commission. -

After long discussions extending during the month of November, there was issued on 28 November Executive Order N.84 from Headquarters, Allied Commission, which abolished the Office of the Representative of the Chief Commissioner in Northern Italy and created the Office of the Economic Commissioner, Northern Italy, effective 1 December. The offices of the Economic Commission formed a part of A.M.G. Lombardia Region.

The Economic Commissioner Northern Italy was responsible for all AC/AMG economic activities in Liguria, Lombardia, Piemonte and Venetia Regions, and reported directly to and received directions from Vice-President, Economic Section, Rome.

The following divisions were part of the Economic Commission: Food and Agriculture, Industry, Public Works and Utilities, Finance, Labor, Transportation, and C.E.M. The officers of the various divisions were reassigned in certain cases in order to consolidate operations and make for increased efficiency.

It was planned to prepare a directive for each division indicating precisely its various duties and functions, such a directive to be approved and issued by the Vice-President Economic Section. A few of these directives were issued, but there were others that had not been prepared at the time of the closing of the Economic Commission.

With the closing of A.M.G. on 31 December and the passage of the four northern regions to Italian Government control, the Economic Commission Northern Italy brought its activities to an end.

2. Rationing of Electric Power.

The gravest problem which confronted the Economic Commission was the critical shortage of electric power. After long discussions held between the various officers of the Public Utilities and Industry Divisions with representatives of the Italian Government, North Italy Industrial Council, the interested industrial committees and the electric companies, an ordinance limiting the use of electric power was drawn up. This ordinance was submitted to the regional commissioners for consideration at their meeting of 11 December in Milan and was approved with minor alterations. It was finally in the form of regional ordinances and in addition to suspending power for other than essential purposes also cut all industrial and civilian consumers to 70% of their November consumption.

In addition to the a/m regulations, with the co-operation of the Coal Division, coal was obtained and several of the North Italy thermal stations were placed in operation which aided to a certain extent in relieving the deficit of power from hydro-electric sources. A supplementary ordinance was issued on 29 December, regulating the rates to be charged for electric power in order to cover the increased costs of thermal energy.

Despite the measures, however, that have been taken, the supply of electric power is still critically short and without rain the situation will become more grave in the next two or three months.

3. Food and Agriculture Division.

c) General Food situation.

The general food situation remains virtually unchanged. This Division has received numerous reports of shortages in provinces but upon investigation it has been found that the usual amount of exaggeration and unfounded stories in the press have been the cause for these reports. The situation remains and will remain tight until a feeling of responsibility towards maintenance of the ration and towards making what they have go the furthest possible way in feeding the people is created in the minds of the civilian population.

b) Grain.

Due to forces beyond our control the programme of arrivals of grain ships has fallen even further behind the schedule laid down. The slowness of the final phases of the national programme of wheat flour is due to various factors i.e. rail car shortage and difficulties made by exporting provinces. - b6

With the addition of provinces in Venetie Region to the importing programme it can be seen that unless the shipping situation improves and a much tighter rein held on the Sepral there will be no improvement in the position of Northern Italy.

c) Sugar.

The ration of sugar has been increased as per orders received from Rome. This increase came as a great surprise to this Division as it is well known that sugar is in short supply the world over. Local supplies will last only until the end of February and Northern Italy will then be one hundred per cent dependent on imported sugar until the end of the month of September.

d) Fats.

There has been no allocation of imported fats for the month of December, however it is expected to make an allocation in January. Small towns and villages are not too hard pressed, but the large cities i.e. Milan, Turin, Genoa are feeling the shortage acutely.

e) Rice.

The entire rice crop is being used to substitute the pasto or "generi di ministero" ration. There is a large amount of illegal traffic in this product and only a small part of the total illegal shipments are being stopped. If the rations programme continues to be as unsuccessful as it has in the past there will be sufficient rice to give only one kilogramme per person until the new harvest is brought in.

f) Cheese.

The cheese programme has progressed but only with the strongest possible opposition from all the producers, as they hope to retain their 1942-43-44 production for free export. The Commissariato Interregionale Alimentazione has done an excellent job in collecting over sixty per cent of total stocks for shipment to Central and Southern Italy.

4. Labour Division

a) General

There were no important changes in the general industrial situation in North Italy during the month. There were further indications of labour unrest over wage rates and high living costs

and a number of disputes involving a stoppage of work were reported. In most cases, however, these affected comparatively few workpeople and in all cases the stoppage was short-lived. There was considerable agitation amongst State employees for payment in lieu of the annual holidays to which they were entitled but did not enjoy in 1945 owing to pressure of work and payment of salary for the thirteenth month "as a gratification". In the Bergamo province of Lombardia the State employees sent a telegram to the Ministry of the Interior in Rome threatening to take strike action in 7 days if, in the meantime, their demands were not met. They decided later, however, to await the result of the negotiations that were taking place between the C.G.I.L. and the Italian Government on these issues.

The number of registered unemployed in each of the four regions increased during the month. In Venezia region the total unemployed - as shown on the registers of the Collocamento Offices - exceeded 170,000 at the end of December, an increase of over 10,000 as compared with the total unemployed register on 30th November.

b) Wage Agreement for Northern Italy.

The negotiations which commenced in Turin in October between representatives of Employers' and Workers' Organizations and the Italian Government and were later continued in Rome and Milan, resulted in a general wage agreement for Northern Italy. The agreement provides for new minimum basic wage rates for specialized, qualified, semi-skilled and unskilled workers according to industrial group and geographical location and also for the contingency indemnity to be adjusted periodically in accordance with variations in the cost of living.

The agreement, which should dispose of most current wage issues concerning industrial workers, has been welcomed by the trade unions concerned and the Camere del Lavoro while prominent industrialists have expressed the view that although the new minimum basic rates were somewhat higher than they had been prepared for the agreement as a whole was rather better than they had anticipated.

c) Agricultural Industry - Wage negotiations.

Negotiations between Associazione Produttori Agricoli and Federterre dei Lavoratori delle terre have been in progress during the month, with a view to new agreements governing wage rates and other conditions of employment of agricultural workers - for the agricultural year commencing 11th November 45. In the Milan province these negotiations presented considerable difficulty and a claim by the workers representatives for the payment of a contingency

initially higher rates as were paid to industrial workers led to a temporary breakdown. The joint discussions were however resumed following the intervention of the Prefect and eventually an agreement was reached on all points in dispute. In most other provinces agreements have also been reached.

d) Social insurance.

The delay in regularizing the position in Northern Italy as regards social insurance contributions and benefits has been a source of unrest amongst the workers who are pressing for the restoration of the unified contribution system and certain other provisions of the decree of the "Duce" n.376. This question was recently considered by the Lombardia Regional Joint Advisory Committee who after consulting representatives of Prudenza Sociale and other insurance institutes prepared a report on the whole position. The Committee's report has been forwarded to Labour Sub-Commission (Allied Commission HQ.) for appropriate action.

.5. Finance Division.

a) Salaries and bonuses.

Further increases of salaries, salaries for Government Officials in lieu of holidays, Xmas bonus for statal and per. statal employees as well as emergency indemnity for postal employees, payment of overtime at Ric. vittorio Veneto and gratificu 1944-were all matters which this Office dealt with with the various agencies concerned.

b) Saccharine.

The transportation from Turin to a trustworthy warehouse in Milan of 26 qls. of saccharine, was authorised in December. The Ufficio Tecnico IFF supervised the distribution of same in accordance with the regulations set out by this HQ. and on payment of the sugar tax.

Similar provisions were under consideration for "dulcina" another chemical product for sweetening purposes - but could not be carried out in time. Further consideration to this matter would be useful. In Piemonte Region provisions were issued in time for control of the production.

c) State and Communal financing.

The Administrative accounting office ceased granting funds on behalf of AMG as of 31 December 1945. In order to secure

the good functioning of this service in the transition period, the Regia Tesoreria Provinciale has been authorized to accept the credit orders issued by that Office until 20 January 1946. Beginning from 1 January 1946, the State and Communal Agencies requiring funds will have to apply directly to the respective central administrations. Only in cases of exceptional urgency, the funds can be authorized in Milan by the administrative accounting office in accordance with the provisions of Decree 21 August 1945 N.524.

6. Transportation Division.

a) Rail

Rails have been worked during the period under review under the ISR and the working of same has been most exemplary. Increased tonnages have been moved especially from the ports of Genoa and Savona. The handing over to the ISR and subsequent working of Rails by ISR happened with great smoothness.

b) Road.

The control of trucking has been in the hands of Italian organizations and the working of same has been most satisfactory.

c) Busses

The authorization of bus services is now a matter for the appropriate Italian organization. A standard rate for travel by bus was established on the 3rd of December and this standard rate is applied throughout the whole of Northern Italy.

d) Water.

Movement of goods by Inland Waterways is increasing and general progress is being made; and expected extension of tonnages moved will prove a real relief to the over worked railways. N.B. It is a matter of deep concern that no progress whatsoever has been made for the clearing of a passage through the mine field to the mouth of the Po, which if effected would open up the Po river. If such a passage were cleared very considerable tonnages could be moved along the Po.

e) Air.

Progress is being made and it is expected that before long a small movement of goods will be effected by this means.

7. Industry and Commerce Division,

A. Chemicals Industry :

a) Nitrogenous fertilizers;

All the production has been obtained from electrolytic hydrogen.

b) Superphosphate.

No phosphate rock having arrived so far, only bone superphosphate has been produced.

c) Sulphuric Acid.

Satisfactory situation of the pyrites stockpile and supply.

d) Copper sulphate.

The production from the 3000 tons of imported blister copper has been started in four plants.

e) Calcium carbide.

No production has been possible so far, because, despite the repeated warnings from this office, the coke has been allocated only at the end of November when the electric power was no longer available.

f) Caustic soda.

The production of the electrolytic caustic soda is extremely low, owing to the very reduced flow of the rock salt supply.

g) Hydrochloric acid.

The plants working by the double substitution process have been operating at about 50% of their capacity. A small production has been carried out directly from chlorine and hydrogen.

h) Carbon bisulphide.

Only one hermic plant has been operating with a monthly production of about 250 tons.

i) Synthetic methanol.

The production is carried out in one plant at the rate of about 600 tons per month.

j) Pharmaceuticals.

The production of all pharmaceutical derivatives of phenol has been very low due to the shortage of this raw material. The production of chlorosulphonic acid for sulpho drugs, which has been started towards the 15th of November, is still going on in two plants.

k) Dyes.

There has been a little increase in the production of dyes, due to small deliveries of benzol from the cokeries.

B. Mines and Quarries.

a) The envisaged reorganization of the Comitato Miniere e Cave, as reported in the Inter Office Note of 4 Dec.45 has not been effected during December owing to lack of instructions from Ministry of Industry and Commerce in Rome, and so the Comitato continues to carry out its function as first.

b) Concerning the production of the mines the following observations may be made :

Domestic Coal : Some 40.000 tons were extracted in November (6.000 tons more than in Oct.) and the same figures are expected in December (exact figure are not yet available). It may be supposed that the e/r figures are inferior to the real production, as some 4-5000 tons are sold on the black market without being registered. Lignite Mines Bagnasco (Cuneo Province) and Cossolom (Savona Province) have been visited in December.

Asbestos production has diminished owing to flooding which damaged the mines in Nov. but now the production is normal.

Ore-lines Pistoia: This line is still greatly disorganized: mineral, explosives and lastly even machinery have been continually robbed. Intervention of ANG Piemonte Region has been requested, but the result is still unknown.

Lend-oreis still not extracted because no melting possibilities exist in North Italy. Clerici and FAC plants in Milan have been surveyed in order to examine the possibility to adapt them for lead ore melting, but owing to the transportation difficulties the question is not yet clear. As there is a great demand for metallic lead and the mines can start, ore extraction at once the problem of lead melting is of great importance.

C. Electrotechnical and Mechanical branches - Industry.c.) Mechanic.

With reference to the restriction in the use of electric power, some firms applied in order to obtain a derogation to the fixed rulings.

Three applications were approved.

Many important materials as lead, zinc, copper, iron sheets, oil, cotton, etc. captured from the Germans have been allotted to Pirelli Co.

An inspection was carried out at Vulcanic dynamite Factory and the firm has been recommended for an allotment of artillery shells to be unloaded.

The fishing industry in Southern Italy needs glass globes for fishing lights. On request from Rome, a search was carried out in order to find the factories now able to make these globes. Regular report has been sent to Rome.

b) Electrotechnics.

Approval was given to the partition plan for the 1350 tons of copper to be distributed to electrotechnical industries; 680 tons were given to Pirelli for cables construction.

The distribution plan for the 650 tons of copper wire bars for electric power production is still under examination. This copper will be distributed on national scale.

D. Steel and non ferrous metals.

a) The activity during the month of December has been reduced in a remarkable way and has been limited to inspections to factories and operations of control and adjustments in connection with material to be imported under 1946 plan, etc.

b) The matter of importation of magnesite and magnesite bricks as refractory materials for steel works has been dealt with further, but no practical results have been achieved up to now.

Alterations have been made in the types, quantities and sizes of electric resistors materials and nickel to be imported from USA after several meetings held among the leading manufacturers of Italy upon request of this Commission.

Inspection have been carried out of Industrial works of the Bolzano Trento Region, viz. Montecatini Bolzano, Acciaierie Bolzano, Officine Elettrotecniche Trentine, Officine Galterossi Trento, in connection with coal and electric power available.

CLAI has approved a Board of advisors regarding the production of Electrodes as suggested by this Division.

Close contact has been kept with Rome in connection with the breakdown plans of materials under arrival from USA for which plans have not been worked out in time by Committees.

E. Textiles.

a) Particularly as regards cotton, wool and silk this Office has been busy in examining all questions concerning the transportation, allocation and distribution of the above material, as well as the manufacture of technical articles such as Filters, Fishing Net Yarn, Sewing Twine, Typewriter Ribbons, etc.

Efforts are being made to create a closer cooperation between this Office and the various national organizations dealing with the important question of textile fibres.

So far 25.000 kilos of cotton have arrived and distributed to about 3000 firms together with about 55.000 tons of coal allocated to the Textile Industry during the last 4 months.

F. Ex German materials.

- a) Large quantities of captured enemy material ex Leghorn in the shape of civilian cloth and garments, were distributed.
- b) Clothing and material to the value of 16 million lire was sold to the public.
- c) Clothing was provided for the guards of Milan Prisons.
- d) Overalls to the value of 4 million lire were manufactured and distributed through the Camera del Lavoro.
- e) 2500 Christmas parcels of clothing shoes and thread were distributed to the poor.
- f) As a result of the above activities there has been a marked decline in the prices of cloth, and the tendency continues downward.

1. The following functions which have hitherto been carried out by the Advanced Echelon Transportation Sub-Commission, under the supervision of the Representative of the Chief Commissioner in Milan, will in future be carried out under the supervision of the Economic Commissioner for Northern Italy by the Transportation Staff attached to your office.
 - (a) Coordination of movement and transportation work in the Regions of Piemonte, Liguria, Lombardia and Venezia, and such other areas as may be considered as Northern Italy from time to time.
 - (b) Coordination of movement and transportation work in Northern Italy with the military authorities concerned.
 - (c) ~~Aiding~~ the Italian Govt. officials concerned as to the most effective general distribution and use of all transportation facilities.
 - (d) Supervision of rail movement programmes to ensure that they are carried out in accordance with established priorities, particularly programmes affecting more than one Region.
 - (e) Supervision of the use of ports and warehouses and assistance of the Italian port authorities in the obtaining/obtaining of

Italy as regards Transportation and Shipping Sub-Commission.

TO : Economic Commissioner, Northern Italy.

1. The following functions which have hitherto been carried out by the Advanced Echelon Transportation Sub-Commission, under the supervision of the Representative of the Chief Commissioner in Milan, will in future be carried out under the supervision of the Economic Commissioner for Northern Italy by the Transportation Staff attached to your office.
- (a) Coordination of movement and transportation work in the Regions of Piedmont, Liguria, Lombardia and Venezia, and such other areas as may be considered as Northern Italy from time to time.
- (b) Coordination of movement and transportation work in Northern Italy with the military authorities concerned.
- (c) Advising the Italian Govt. officials concerned as to the most effective general distribution and use of all transportation facilities.
- (d) Supervision of rail movement programmes to ensure that they are carried out in accordance with established priorities, particularly programmes affecting more than one Region.
- (e) Supervision of the use of ports and warehouses and assistance to the Italian port officials in the obtaining/equipment for ports.
- (f) Informing the Economic Section HQ AC of all matters affecting the transportation and shipping position from time to time as necessary to ensure that HQ is always in possession of all relevant information.

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2. There will be a direct channel of communication on technical and routine matters, including technical policy matters, between the Transportation and Shipping Sub-Commission at this HQ and the Transportation Staff attached to your office.

Such matters will include : -

- (a) All routine matters affecting the matters mentioned in para 1 generally.
 - (b) All technical policy matters affecting the same. *by methods*
 - (c) Routine enquiries as to personnel not affecting postings.
3. There will also be a channel of direct communication ~~between~~ ^{and} the Tn. and Shipp. SC and Regiments. Officers and ^{of} Officers at the Ports - e.g. Genoa, Savona, ^{and} Venice. This will be used for routine technical matters only and not matters of policy. Such matters will include those which by their nature are urgent such as reports of ship arrivals, ship diversions, cargo, dispositions, rail wagon supply, special trains for refugees etc. and also routine progress reports.

In the interim period before Phase II comes into operation, I am sending Colonel FISKE, Deputy Executive Commissioner, as my representative to interpret the policy of the Allied Commission to the Commanding Generals of 5th Army and IV Corps, and to assist them in every way possible in connection with the coordination of civil affairs in the Army Area.

He will work in close contact with the Regional Commissioners but the channels of communication will be from the Allied Commission direct to Regional Commissioners and vice versa, with copies to 5th Army and IV Corps.

Until Phase II is established, RCs in North Italy will be in the same position as AMG 5th and 8th Armies; that is to say, they will be under the military command of the Commanding Generals, 5th and 8th Armies and will receive their functional directions from the Allied Commission through the channels of communication set forth in the preceding paragraph.

Revised RA 64380 of 23 April and RA/601a/367 of 23 April.

It is considered that to establish a predetermined lower scale of wages and prices north of the Appenines will occasion a large increase in black market activities which the military and civil will be unable to prevent and which will low wage policy will mitigate against procuring civil labour. Wage policy in signal RA/601a/367 believed to be based upon false premise. Information here is that general wage rate for skilled and unskilled labour during period of Germans was 100 lire per day with in addition for each worker a very high ration scale in mind. It is requested that the orders in both these signals be suspended as being impracticable at present and that normal discretionary powers be given to keep wages as low as possible consistent with operational exigency, and prices as low as possible.

Transportation Sub-Commission Officers - Northern Italy

1. When AC/AMC take over in N.W. Italy, it is proposed to establish an Advanced Echelon of the Transportation Sub-Commission. Its duties will be as follows:

a. To coordinate, on behalf of the Director of the Transportation Sub-Commission, movements and transportation work in the regions of Piemonte, Liguria, Lombardia, and such other provinces as may be considered as "N.W. Italy" from time to time.

b. To coordinate movements and transportation work with the military authorities.

c. To control the general distribution of AC and civilian transport in N.W. Italy.

d. To see that movements programs are carried out in accordance with established priorities, particularly programs affecting more than one region.

2. a. Regional Transportation Officers will arrange all local movement within N.W. Italy as far as possible from their own local resources; they will contact each other as necessary; and they will also work closely with military movement officers.

b. Demands for local movement within the N.W. area that cannot be met as outlined in (a) above and movement to or from places outside N.W. Italy will be referred to the Advanced Echelon of the Transportation Sub-Commission, who will try to meet such demands (1) by adjustment of AC controlled capacity, (2) by further contact with military movement headquarters in N.W. Italy, and (3) by reference to Transportation Sub-Commission, Rome.

GENERAL ECONOMIC POLICY FOR NORTHERN ITALY

1. The territory under discussion was defined as Piemonte, Lombardia, Emilia, Liguria and Venetie regions, the southern boundary being the southern boundaries of Emilia and Liguria compartments.
2. It was decided that present price and wage relationships existing in the above defined area would not be disturbed before review and study by competent authorities was made. This would involve maintaining price-wages in the North substantially lower than those in the South for some period of time. Ravenna and Forli provinces now South of the battle line would have to be rolled back to conform with the Northern price-wage levels. (Except wages of State employees)
3. Prices on imported relief goods (food, medical supplies and clothing) would be fixed at the levels found existing in the territory as of some selected date.
4. Prices on non relief items would be fixed on a landed cost plus mark up basis with mark up limited to the bare cost of distribution. Domestically produced supplies imported from southern Italy to the Northern territory would be priced in accordance with Northern territory levels.
5. Subsidy applied at point of entry would be employed to bring imports either from Southern Italy or abroad down to the existing price levels. In cases where existing price levels are higher than a landed cost plus basis for imports, existing prices would still apply in the case of relief items.
6. It was pointed out that the maintenance of the price policy would depend on very rigid ration and price controls and control of transport. In this connection it was recommended that industrial machinery should be sold on a conditional or licensing basis and re-sale should only be permitted back to the Government.
7. The Directive of 22 June 1944 will be withdrawn with respect to the Northern regions.
8. In the initial period AMG will be sole civilian procurement agency but will license other individuals and agencies as rapidly as suitable ones can be located. Bidding for supplies by AMG or by AMG licensed agencies will not be allowed.

SUBJECT: Personnel for Northern Italy

1. Subject : Personnel for Northern Italy.

1. May we again call your attention to the fact that allocation of A.M.C. personnel to Northern Italy has not been completed. All Regional Transportation Officers have been briefed in their duties and instructed to contact their Officers so that each may know his job before move-in. Printed matter is now being received from the printers of which approximately 40% has been delivered to the regions.

2. Assignment of Officer personnel seems to be completed in Liguria, Lombardia and Piemonte regions, if recent ceiling figures of 9, 10 and 9 respectively are accepted. Venezia is far behind with only 4 Officers assigned to date and no ceiling set.

3. Our recommended minimum ceiling for one transportation Officer per province and city of half million or over plus headquarters staff of three plus rail and port Officers is based on doing a job in transportation of possibly 75% to 85% efficiency. Any reduction in Officer personnel will reduce the overall efficiency in direct proportion.

4. No enlisted personnel has been allocated to date.

5. No rail Officers have been specifically assigned for regional headquarters duty to date.

6. Port Officers for Venice and Trieste have not been assigned.

7. Rail and truck movement Officers have not been assigned for Transportation Sub-Commission advance Headquarters.

8. Office assistant for myself has not been assigned.

9. Inasmuch as some 70 days have elapsed since starting to plan for Northern Italy and the war news indicates an early move-in, may this matter of personnel be given priority so that a fully instructed team may be sent forward.

Transportation Sub-Commission Officers - Northern Italy

1. When AC/AMG take over in N.W. Italy, it is proposed to establish an Advanced Echelon of the Transportation Sub-Commission. Its duties will be as follows:

a. To coordinate, on behalf of the Director of the Transportation Sub-Commission, movements and transportation work in the regions of Piemonte, Liguria, Lombardia, and such other provinces as may be considered as "N.W. Italy" from time to time.

b. To coordinate movements and transportation work with the military authorities.

c. To control the general distribution of AC and civilian transport in N.W. Italy.

d. To see that movements programs are carried out in accordance with established priorities, particularly programs affecting more than one region.

2. a. Regional Transportation Officers will arrange all local movement within N.W. Italy as far as possible from their own local resources; they will contact each other as necessary; and they will also work closely with military movement officers.

b. Demands for local movement within the N.W. area that cannot be met as outlined in (a) above and movement to or from places outside N.W. Italy will be referred to the Advanced Echelon of the Transportation Sub-Commission, who will try to meet such demands (1) by adjustment of AC controlled capacity, (2) by further contact with military movement headquarters in N.W. Italy, and (3) by reference to Transportation Sub-Commission, Rome.

3. The following officers are nominated for the Advanced Echelon of Transportation Sub-Commission:

Lt. Col. M. Harris (A) (i/c)
Major H. C. Talbot (E)

One other officer with railway operating experience will be nominated later.

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4. The Advanced Echelon of the Transportation Sub-Commission will be located near HQ, 2 District.

5. AC railway engineering work will continue as at present to be dealt with by Transportation Sub-Commission at HQ, and not by Regional Transportation Officers; the following HQ officers are nominated for detachment to Northern Italy:

Railway Civil Engineering - Major P. G. Buckley (B)
Railway Mechanical Engineering - Major E.N.B. Jeffrey (B)

They will keep in touch with Lt. Col. Harris as necessary, but will report direct to their respective branches in the Rail Division of Transportation Sub-Commission, Rome.
