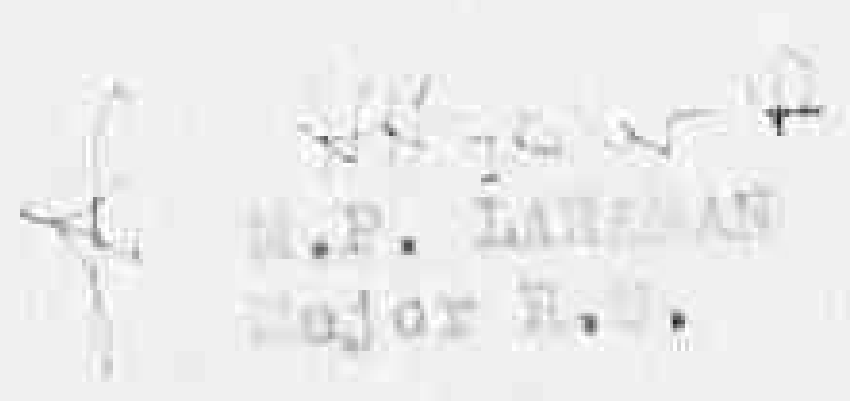

Ref your 515/259/TN.3 of 7 July received here on 12th July.

1. There is no objection to Alcom ROME being included as an information addressee on all naval signals originating from the Shipping Diversion Room, in so far as such signals affect vessels scheduled for discharge at AC/Italian ports. This practice will be into effect forthwith but it does not provide a complete solution of your problem because the Shipping Diversion Room does not make the intent to sail signal in respect of inter-port sailings in ITALY and C-in-C and does not consider it practicable to instruct all Naval sailing authorities to include Alcom ROME in the addressee of a Vesce sailing signal.

2. The statement that ports are not advised of expected times of arrival is not understood. For all inter-port sailings the appropriate Italian Naval Authorities are advised, through Italian communications, by the Naval Sailing Authority, the date of departure of each vessel and the estimated time of arrival at the port of discharge or loading - a normal routine function.

3. Since you are unable to provide a representative in the Shipping Diversion Room it is agreed that the C-4 (NOV & TH) representative will be responsible for keeping you advised of all ship movements which affect A.C./Italian controlled ports. It is suggested that the most practicable method of advising such movements is by telephone conversation, at regular fixed times, between your office and the Shipping Diversion Room (Freedom 440 or 905). SUBJECT: Security - Civitavecchia

TO : Movements Division
(Att. Col. W. J. Siefert)

1. Police supervision in Civitavecchia port area has improved. However, it is far from what is expected.

2. During visit to the port yesterday, the Port Captain was requested to issue instructions to the guards on board ships to forbid admission to all Americans, British and Italians who do not possess a pass issued by the Port Captain's office. In order for Mr. Ghilardi and I to enforce this request, we provided ourselves with the corresponding passes before boarding ships in the harbor. The Commander of the Carabinieri brought up the question that there are a number of American and British military personnel who, from time to time, visit the ships and who may not be provided with the proper passes and may not respect the authority of the guards to prevent their admittance to the ships.

3. I believe that this matter should be covered by a circular through the proper channels in order to cooperate with the guards and to facilitate the discharge of their duties.

4. Likewise, it was brought to our attention that officers and members of the crew of American and British ships bring people from the shore as visitors and it appears that in many cases, the visitors carry packages with them when leaving ships. This matter was discussed with the local WSA agent and his attention was called to the fact that the Master of each steamer should be duly warned against these irregularities and informed that it was his entire responsibility and should make all efforts to prevent it. However, perhaps it would be advisable for the proper AC authority to officially take this matter up with WSA and MWT in writing.

5. Your comments on the foregoing would be appreciated.

SUBJECT: Handling of Civilian Imported Supplies.

1. Reference your buckslip dated 14th May, enclosing G-5. A.F.R.Q. letter No: 65/130 dated 12 May, on the above mentioned subject.

2. In view of the reduction in Transportation Personnel in Italian Government territory, it is regretted that we cannot continue to take arrival or even spot check tallies of Imported Civilian Supplies simultaneously with those made by the Italian Agencies. It is not the intention of A.C. Personnel to verify tallies made by the Italian Agencies as these are Italian Government Organisations and as such, tallies made by these Organisations must be accepted.

3. Paragraph 3 of A.F.R.Q. letter has been discussed with the Finance Sub-Commission who desire that any reply should be held over until the return of the Chief Accountant and his Deputy, who are both expected about the 21st of May. The Deputy Chief Accountant is on his way back from Washington where he discussed questions of Financial Policy which may probably affect the points raised in A.F.R.Q. letter.

4. Once the information has been received, a reply will be prepared for Brig.Gen. McKinley's signature, as requested in the Routing and Work Sheet attached.

SUBJECT : Handling of Civilians Reported Seized.

IN : Headquarters, Allied Commission, and C.A.B.

1. Reference is made to A.C. Shipping Instruction No. 11, 28 April 1945, issued in English and Italian to the Headquarters, Allied Commission.

2. It is noted that paragraph 2 of this instruction provides that from 1 May 1945 Italian agencies will accept reported civilian supplies at ships' rail at all ports in Italy and that the retaining reports prepared by such agencies will constitute an acknowledgment of receipt of such supplies from A.C. It is not entirely clear from the text of the instruction whether A.C. personnel are intended to verify the tally made by the Italian agencies at the time it is made, but it would appear such is not the intention. This Headquarters is fully aware of the personnel difficulties which have led the A.C. to turn over to the Italian agencies the full responsibility for arrival tallies, and that the Combined Chiefs of Staff were advised of this development in LHM #19 of 24 November, 1944. However, we have had no reply to LHM #19, and it is felt that the Allied Commission should make every effort, within the capabilities of its staff, to continue arrival tallies simultaneously with those made by the Italian agencies. Even exact check tallies could be better than none, pending reply to our request from the C.A.B. In the meantime, this Headquarters, with concurrence of the Allied Commission, has sent a renewed request to the C.A.B. (LHM #20 of 3 May) for permission to bill the Italian Government on the basis of shipments rather than arrivals.

3. Paragraph 1 of Shipping Instruction No. 11 provides that losses in transit and facilities outside Italian control will be a matter for adjustment. At a later date between Allied and Italian Treasuries. It is the view of this Headquarters that no authority exists for this statement. It may quite well be the case that the Allied Governments will hold that when the Italian Government, after having taken title to civilian supplies, finds itself obliged to make use of allied transport, it must do so without recourse for any losses alleged to have occurred during such transport. If the authorized agencies use Italian transport outside their control, losses resulting

therefrom clearly should not be passed to the Allied Governments. It therefore appears to us unfortunate, in an instruction printed in Italian for use by Italian agencies, to have indicated that the Allied Treasuries may be willing to consider any such adjustments. Accordingly, it is considered that paragraph 6 should be deleted from Shipping Instruction No. 11 and you are requested to take action to that end.

We concur with your view that "it may quite well be the case that the Allied Governments will hold that when the Italian Government, after having taken title to Axis iron supplies, finds itself obliged to make use of Allied transport, it must do so without recourse for any losses alleged to have occurred during such transport". However, in the absence of any fire direct hit on this point our Shipping Instruction No 21 has left the question open, by saying that the matter will be one for "adjustment", thereby neither allotting nor implying any specific responsibility to either party.

In any case, the total of any such losses would be ~~an insignificant~~ ^{very} small proportion of the actual receipts and for practical purposes the point would appear to be academic.

SUBJECT: I. S. S.

Your attention is invited to the attached letter which sets forth some of the difficulties confronting our Port Representatives and Agents at the various ports handling commercial cargo for shipment to the U. S. A. As you know these difficulties have been increasing in proportion to the increase of shipments of commercial cargo and I believe it will be absolutely necessary that some system be devised to take care of the problems set forth.

In connection with this same subject while in Naples I received a call from Lt. Conroy our representative in Sicily. Lt. Conroy advised that 50 tons of pyroxylic oil which was to have been shipped on the S. S. Ameriki had arrived in Messina and was on the railroad siding for offloading and transfer to the ship. An argument then developed between I. C. S. and the W. S. A. agent as to which party should move this cargo to the end of ships tackle for loading. The argument went on the good part of the afternoon and was still not settled at the time the ship sailed for its second port of destination as Lt. Conroy stated that he did not feel justified in holding the ship any longer than it had already been held for such loading. I believe you will agree that it is standard shipping practice that the shipper must deliver his cargo to the end of ships tackle for loading and that this is not a part of the agents business nor is it so understood by the agent. It is believed that difficulties such as these could and should be taken care of by a directive to the I. C. S. agents or that agents with more experience should be selected for these jobs. Certainly such misunderstandings are not helpful to either the shipper or the I. C. S. and should be stopped in the interest of both.

In Mr. Herrick's case, this is the responsibility for the ballasting of the ship which he has allocated for the loading of commercial cargo and you can readily understand that he must be certain the cargo which he contracts for must arrive at the ships side in ample time for loading; otherwise it places him in an embarrassing position of having been partly responsible for the ship missing convoy because she has not been ballasted. When the cargo contracted for is not available for shipment at the time specified by the Port Representative, he must either get cargo from the Army or sail an unballasted ship. In the first case it is difficult to get suitable cargo for keeler vessels on such short notice and in the second case it is practically impossible to fill one of these keelers unballasted.

It will be appreciated if the necessary action is taken at once to stop the practices cited, as they not only create dissention between I.C.E., and the Port Representatives but are liable to result in a loss of ships time for which the War Shipping Representatives are severely criticized.

I believe that in the handling of these commercial shipments we should revert to the rules governing regular commercial practice as soon as possible in order that such cargo may be handled smoothly with all parties being aware of and bearing their proper responsibilities.

Current Position of PULSES from Roumania

1. L'Alto Commissario wrote Economics (letter undated but received 29 March 45) saying:

Payment to be made by F.I.G.A. funds in Roumania. Price about 100,000 lei per ton. Movement to be by a wooden ship from Costanza to Naples or Civitavecchia. Freight \$6,400. Navicert. Can this be obtained together with permit to land at Italian port. Federazione has already sent signal asking name of ship and flag.

2. Memo 3 April 45 from Affari Esteri suggest obtaining permission for cargo to be put on empty Allied ships which usually call at Costanza on the way back.

3. Commerce S/C to Antolini 11 April 45, says: -

6. Interministerial Reconstruction Committee memo undated but about 21 April, states: -

- a. Consignment was bought some time ago, and its export authorized by Roumanian Government.
- b. Therefore, no payment question.
- c. Italy in addition has credits in Roumania as well as funds at Banca Romaneasca.
- d. Only problem is transportation because ships coming back from Costanza cannot be used as they cannot lose time loading, being tied to fixed itineraries, and too big for the purpose. May Italy make use of other Italian or foreign ships from the Allied pool.

1. Reference the minute on your informal meeting slip dated 15th March, 1947, attached, and proposed directive to PERSHORE on the release of berths in the port of Naples to the Italian Government for handling civil supplies.

2. A.C. concurs in principle with the directive.

3. If the scheme is to be effective it would appear necessary to allow to a minimum area within the port for the working of civilian cargoes; this minimum area is one which, in view of existing and known future commitments, would in all probability remain for a reasonable period of time, and would not be liable to reduction in size and number of berths.

4. At present A.C. cannot produce A.F. for docks clearance at Naples, and is unlikely to be able to do so during the next few months unless there is an unforeseen increase in the availability of civilian transport, or unless the availability of civilian transport in the north, when liberated, is larger than at present anticipated. A.C. will also require material assistance in docks gear until the demands submitted in the Category "A" Programme for the prevention of disease and unrest are met.

5. It is agreed that Allied supervisory personnel will be required during the initial period, if ships' turn round is not to be delayed. The rate at which this personnel could be withdrawn will depend on the rate at which the Italian authorities can assume the necessary responsibilities efficiently.

6. Reference para 4. of the proposed directive. It should be clearly borne in mind that AMT, WSA, and PERSHORE (Mod)² are responsible for the efficient loading or discharging of ships from ships' rail, and that the responsibility of the Italian authorities starts or stops at ships' side.

7. Detailed action will not be initiated by A.C. until some

specific advice is received. In the meantime the Campbell Committee - established by a Directive issued by the Chairman of AFBCG, dated 24th February, 1945 - is examining and putting forward for AFBCG's approval a proposal for a suggested Italian organization for operating a "civilian area" within the port of Naples.

1. Transportation Sub-Commission agree in principal to the terms of proposed directive. It is, however, pointed out that certain liabilities of AC cannot be met at present.
2. AC cannot produce M/T for Dock clearance at Naples, if required to do so, reference ultimate sentence, Paragraph 4, of directive.
3. AC cannot produce cargo handling gear or shore facilities to handle ships expeditiously without material allied assistance.
4. Referring to Paragraph 6 of the draft, it is considered that insufficient AC supervisory staff are available to cover satisfactory hand over at present; the rate of return of responsibility to Italian Government must be dictated by AC and not by Portbase.
5. In Paragraph 7 the words loading and discharging infer that AC is responsible for MWT and WSA commitments.
6. Finally, it should be pointed out that AC agrees with the Policy of the directive and is anxious to implement its part but without material assistance from allied sources is not able to accept the proposals.

1. The functions of the Priorities Board is to establish the broad policies under which allocation will be made. The Board is expected to arrive at policies which will properly consider the needs of all sections of AC and Italian Government. Operations, as in the past, are delegated to Allocating Sub-Commissions so there will be no delay in the day to day interpretation and application of the Board's directives. Moreover, each Allocating Sub-Commission with respect to its segment of supply or economic activity is regarded as the chief source of data and counsel on which the Board directives will be based.

2. Under the above concept of the respective functions of the Board and the Allocating Sub-Commissions, the Board would be advised to render decisions with respect to single movements, problems without having first established a basic policy arrived at after due consideration of the total movements problem. The Board must rely on the Sub-Commission to collect, interpret and present data which will present the problem in its entirety. Likewise, the Board should receive recommendations from the Sub-Commission as to the basic policies and considerations which should govern the day to day operating decisions of the Sub-Commission as the allocating agency.

3. It is felt that reference 1, 2 and 3 above deal with individual movements on which the Board should not act under to the policy directions indicated in Para 2. The Sub-Commission should continue to decide such issues, as in the past, until a general Board directive can be issued on the basis of facts and recommendations presented by the Sub-Commission.

4. With respect to reference 4 above, Mr Cleveland routed your 4 March letter to me and the other related letters are copies which have been routed to me for information. Mr Cleveland pointed out that the question of allocating port facilities or cargo lines was closely related to the movement's problem and suggested, therefore, that it should be dealt with by Priorities Board as a part of the movement's problem. The suggestion that a monthly meeting of the major liners and an AGH representative was regarded as excellent provided forecasted required movements could be developed as a basis for AG claims. Another note mentioned applied to the forecasted movements would naturally become one important factor in supporting the AG claim for port facilities. It is suggested that the material you present to the Board include your recommendations on coordinating the allocation of port facilities with the movement's program.

5. It is evident that the Transportation S/G has been delayed in making its first presentation to the Priorities Board by the failure of other Sub-Commissions to observe the censuring and forecasting requirements set forth in Para 2 - a of Procedural Bulletin No. 1. It is suggested that the Board Secretariat and the Transportation S/G collaborate closely between now and April 6 in reviewing the records and forecasts required on that date so that the over-all movement's problem can be presented and discussed in the next regular Board meeting which is scheduled for April 16.

6. As a first step in carrying out the above suggestion, I have sent a letter to each Sub-Commission asking attention to the forecasting requirements and asking for their data on the required date. I am also making a parallel request to the Government through the Institute of Statistics.

2. It is appreciated that various security factors may prevent this HQ being informed promptly of certain matters in connection with the working of ships in ports handed back to Italian authorities. At the same time, you will appreciate that unless facilities are granted, which enable rapid information regarding daily working of ships to be transmitted to this HQ, little can be done to prevent onsets of delay to shipping occurring.

3. Without relevant information on day to day working, this sub-commission is not in a position in conjunction with shipping sub-commission to adjust any of the programs for those ports for which it is responsible. As the regional and provincial HQ are withdrawn from southern area, and as the inspection sub-commission representatives in the field become fewer in Italian government territory, means of communication largely depend on Italian channels. If Italian channels are not allowed to transmit the necessary information, it is difficult to see how any information will reach this HQ from certain areas. For example, how will information regarding the working of port impoundable in southwestern Sicily be transmitted to this HQ.

2. It is appreciated that various security factors may prevent this HQ being informed promptly of certain matters in connection with the working of ships in ports handed back to Italian authorities. At the same time, you will appreciate that unless facilities are granted, which enable rapid transmission regarding daily workings of ships to be transmitted to this HQ, little can be done to prevent wastage of a delay to shipping occurring.

3. Without relevant information on day to day workings, this Sub-Commission is not in a position in conjunction with shipping Sub-Commission to adjust any of the programs for those ports for which it is responsible. As the regional and provincial HQ are withdrawn from Southern areas, and as the transportation Sub-Commission representatives in the field become fewer in Italian Government territory, means of communication largely depend on Italian channels. If Italian channels are not allowed to transmit the necessary information, it is difficult to see how any information will reach this HQ from certain areas. For example, how will information regarding the working of port expeditions in southwestern Sicily be transmitted to this HQ, when HQ personnel have been withdrawn from the whole of the Sicily area? At the same time, it is necessary to have information of what is happening at this port, as it is a main port for export of sulphur.

4. A possible solution to this problem would be for all shipping information to be passed over the Italian Ministry of Marine network of communications. The Ministry are willing to permit this service and have agreed that, subject to the approval of J in C (as) of an Italian cypher, to set up and staff a central shipping information office in Rome which would receive and de-cipher all such ~~information~~ *information* before ports and this HQ.

5. In view of the above, may the matter be brought again to the attention of C-in-C, Mediterranean, as to his willingness to agree to an Italian cypher or could you, yourself, suggest alternative means, which will enable this important information to be made available at this H. within a reasonable time?
