2. The Warehousing set-up consists of individual teams of Supply personnel, each operating independently within the limits of its own installation. No one officer is in command of the group of Warehouses, and consequently there is no coordination of accounting effort. Each Warehouse is attempting to maintain its own accounting records and each operates a system favoured by the particular officer in charge, none of these being in line with the standard system that I have agreed with the Chief accountant shall be universally adopted.

4. I have discussed this matter fully with the A/Chief Accountant, Finance Sub-Commission, and he is in entire agreement with my proposals. He further desires me to record the fact that he endorses my view of the urgent necessity for immediate action in the matter of setting up the Livorno accounting section.

5. It has been my policy to keep my military personnel down to a minimum, and my present staff is only sufficient to cope with our normal work at this H.Q. It is, therefore, necessary for me to request the early assignment of 1 Officer with accounting qualifications and 2 E/O's with some civilian accounting background in order to enable me to cope with the Livorno situation, and your assistance in this direction will be greatly appreciated.

SUBJECT: Destination of Hemp Shipped by Schooner last April.

To : Transportation Sub-Commission (Att/ Schooner Section)

1. Attached herewith are two receipts of shipments of hemp which was destined for Palermo, Sicilia Region. One bears the date of April 12, 1944 and the signature of Iaglione Salvatore, Captain of the Schooner Mariuccella. The other, dated 22 April 1944 bears the signature of the carrier but the name of the schooner is not shown.

2. The Hemp Control Board, ACC, in seeking payment for the merchandise, has learned from Sicilia Region that the subject hemp was never received at Palermo.

3. Since the shipments amounted to 66 bales of hemp, 34 bales in the shipment of April 12, 1944 and 32 bales on the 22nd of the same month, it is urgently requested that this Sub-Commission be informed of the destination of the two schooners so as to trace the receivers. Before the schooners left Naples there were some indications that they might stop at Reggio Calabria to unload part of their cargoes. Could it be that the hemp was unloaded there?
