1. Reference Movement Division's letter 766/5/Tn.3, dated 23rd March, and your note, both attached, I append hereto copy of (i) AFHQ's letter Mov 5/433 dated 14th March, (ii) AFHQ's signal F/44000 dated 15th March, and (iii) letter G-4 (Mov & Tn) 5/215/GDM dated 17th March, all of which deal with the allocation of transport capacity for the movement of civilian stores and personnel in which A.C. is interested. These cases refer to wastage of rail, road and shipping capacity allocated to A.C. in fulfillment of bids they have made.

2. There is little doubt that inadequate field representation of the Transportation Sub-Commission, resulting in lack of supervision, is largely responsible for this wastage of capacity. In addition to the cases detailed in the attached correspondence, there has recently been waste of shipping set up for the movement of charcoal and of wine; in both the latter cases cargoes were found not to be available when the ship arrived at the ports nominated. These particular instances of misuse of transport capacity were dealt with verbally with AFHQ.

3. The Acting Vice President of the Economic Section, at the Economic Staff Meeting held on Friday, 23rd March, pointed out that inadequate progress had been made in reaching that standard of economy necessary to maintain a standard of living and flow of supplies, which will meet primary needs and prevent a continued rise in prices. Under present conditions it is well known that there is little hope of any substantial increase in the flow of supplies from extra Italian sources, either because the availability of the supplies themselves is limited, or ocean going shipping space is a bottle neck, or port capacity is insufficient even when supplies and shipping space are available. The Acting Vice President of the Economic Section emphasised that ~~everything~~ ^{anything} possible, within our limits, must be done; one of the main

impediments to increasing local production, or moving local supplies to the points where they are most required, is the limited movement capacity available. Once again, full use cannot be made of this limited movement capacity if there is inadequate supervision in the field. Although we are doing all in our power to allocate the maximum responsibility to the Italian authorities, these Italian authorities are not sufficiently competent to see that the best use is made of available capacity unless they have considerable Allied Commission assistance and supervision.

1. It has become apparent that the whole of the traffic accounted at the FOY Conference is not materialising for conveyance. A constant check of British Military despatches shows that these tonnages are being taken up, but detailed figures are not available for other traffic.

A rough check has been made of AC traffic, however, on the basis of the number of wagons reaching ROMA northbound over lines 89/90. An average load of 12 tons per wagon has been taken, with the following results:-

2. Over the past ten days at least there has been no shortage of wagons in the south and you are requested to investigate the reasons for the very low tonnages moved.

3. Mov Areas were instructed at the last AQNG (M) Conference to do all possible to assist in the supply of wagons for AC traffic. Although no reports of difficulties have reached this HQ, the above results are not at all satisfactory.

4. It is appreciated that certain statistics will eventually become available under the AC scheme for the rendering of returns of traffic loaded by station Master, but these are merely likely to confirm and localise the rough figures quoted above. What is required is action now to QM7 achieve movement of the programmed tonnages as soon as possible.

It is appreciated that certain statistics will eventually become available under the AC scheme for the rendering of returns of traffic loaded by station Masters, but these are merely likely to confirm and localise the rough figures quoted above. What is required is action now to Q.M.G. achieve movement of the programmed tonnages as soon as possible.

1. The attached report from the Fort Commandant BRINDISI indicates an unsatisfactory state of affairs in relation to the clearance of AC cargo from BRINDISI.
2. It would appear the trouble arises:-
 - (a) Through shortage of AC transport.
 - (b) Through shortage of labour at AC depots which results in military transport loaned to the AC being held at AC depots under load. This situation is not acceptable.
3. Will you please arrange for an investigation and indicate to this HQ what action has been taken to remedy the situation.

C O P YClearance of AC. Barley to new Warehouse on 2nd and 3rd MARCH '45.

1. Approx 350 tons of Barley had been held on L.B. "A" for several days awaiting acceptance by A.C.C.
2. On Thursday afternoon (1st) the AC Rep (Signor FORZALI) was informed that 15 vehs were available next day. Turn-round should not have exceeded 1½ hrs giving 10 vehs per hour.
3. He protested that they had only 10 men available to discharge vehicles and did not wish to engage casual labour because of its unreliability.
4. Employment of docks labour at standard rates, L. 145 per day as against AC's L. 80 per day, was suggested. He obtained the consent of Sig. NOBLE (Asst. - Director of the Local C.A.P.) to this and CLU were asked to provide 20 men outside the CAP office at 0700/3. CAP to provide a guide to direct these men in a Docks Clearance vehicles to their work.
5. At about 0900/3, Sig. FORZALI reported that only six of the 20 CLU labour had left in the lorry at 0700. Investigation showed that it is likely that the others in casual talk with regular CAP labour outside the Office had been told they would only receive L. 80 per day.
6. Docks Clearance MT from L.B."A" meanwhile accumulated at the warehouse and during the day (2nd) only 26 vehicles representing 77 tons were off-loaded.
7. A similar labour arrangement was made for Sat 3rd. This labour enbussed in two lots of ten at approx 0730 and 0830 from the CLU office but were apparently turned back from the new warehouse. Only 10 Docks clearance vehicles were provided and these after one load were dismissed owing to the unsatisfactory nature of the whole situation. Total lifted on Sat 3rd was 33 tons.

1. I have gone carefully into the estimated number of personnel required in the field for adequate supervision of transportation work, which is M.C.'s concern.

2. After the withdrawal of the National Organisations from Italian Government Territory it has been agreed to leave 19 officers in this territory to supervise transportation work; 4 of these officers are for the supervision of the civilian truck pools, which are composed largely of V.D. vehicles.

3. Attached Appendix "A" shows the present ceiling, number assigned, and minimum considered necessary, of Transportation officers to supervise transportation work in those areas where National Organisations still exist, or where National Organisations will be established, once we have removed the ban. Appendix "B" shows the actual personnel by name assigned against each Region.

4. From these Appendices you will see that we have an actual deficit of personnel against ceiling of 12, and an actual deficit against estimated minimum requirements of 50.

5. The basis for calculation has been:-

- (a) A Regional Headquarters' Transportation Section of at least 3 officers, consisting of a Chief of Transportation Officer, a Deputy, and a Motor Maintenance Officer; in addition a Rail or Shipping Officer, in accordance with the geographical location of the Region, and the type of transportation work on which the emphasis lies, or will lie in future Regions. **843**

(b) One Transportation Officer per Province.

(c) One additional Transportation Officer per town of over 5000 inhabitants.

1. I have gone carefully into the estimated number of personnel required in the field for adequate supervision of transportation work, which is A.C.'s concern.
2. After the withdrawal of the Regional Organizations from Italian Government Territory it has been agreed to locate 15 officers in this territory to supervise transportation work. ⁴ Of these officers are for the supervision of the civilian truck pools, which are composed largely of P.D. vehicles.
3. "Attached Appendix" shows the present civilian, number assigned, and military personnel necessary, of Transportation Officers in certain situations to exist, or where Regional Organizations will be established, once having received the Hun. "Appendix" shows the actual personnel by name assigned, name, each position.
4. From these appendices you will see that we have an actual deficit of personnel against calling of 12, and an actual deficit against estimated situation requirements of 30.
5. The basis for calculation has been:-
- (a) A Regional Headquarters' Transportation Section of at least 3 officers, consisting of a Chief Transportation Officer, a Deputy, and a Motor Maintenance Officer; in addition a Rail or Shipping Officer, in accordance with the geographical location of the Region, or Ephesus, Izmir, or will lie in future work on which the Ephesus, Izmir, or will lie in future regions.

- (b) One Transportation Officer per Province.
- (c) One additional Transportation Officer per town or over 500,000 inhabitants.
- (d) Additional allocation "here A.C. transportation requests will be particularly heavy", e.g. Conn: These requests for additional personnel are explained in the remarks column of "Appendix".
6. In this countine, at the meeting of regional commissioners, at which all complained to Lomberda about the lack of transportation personnel, I requested the Lomberda decide from 12 to 10,

and raised the present ceiling from 7 to 9. This is merely a manoeuvre within our present ceiling, and does not provide adequate cover in either portion.

7. Transportation Sub-Commission has recently received complaints from AFHQ regarding the shortage of military A.T., railway wagons, and shipping space allocated for A.C. purposes but not fully utilised. In at least two out of the three major cases brought to our notice it is unlikely that the shortage would have occurred had transportation representation in the field been based on the standards suggested above.

8. The problem has been discussed with the Acting Vice President of the Economic Section, who agrees that the ceiling for Transportation personnel in the field is inadequate to cover sufficiently our minimum needs.

SUBJECT: Transportation Personnel for
North Italy.

TO : Economic Section.

1. Reference discussion on man power for the North, at the
economic staff conference on the 16th March.

2. The attached table, appendix "A", details:-

- (a) The minimum number of officer personnel this sub-commission
considers necessary to carry out effectively transportation
work in the northern regions when this area is liberated.
(b) The present ceiling.
(c) The number of officers assigned.

The basis of calculation has been the establishment at
headquarters of a Chief Transportation Officer, a Deputy
or Executive Officer who will act in the Chief Transportation
Officer's absence - the former if he is to carry out his work
properly should be away from his headquarters 5.1/5th per cent of
the time - a motor maintenance officer, a rail and/or shipping
officer dependent on the geographical situation of the region, one
transportation officer per province and one transportation officer
for each city with a population of over half a million. In
addition allowance has been made for additional transportation
officers for such cities as Genoa where most of the transportation
work will be supervised by AG/AG.

It will be noted in Appendix "A" that of the 821
officers assigned 9 are at present assigned for duty in Italian
Government territory. It is anticipated that should events move
quickly in the North the Italian authorities will not be in a
position to handle transportation problems in the present liberated
area satisfactorily, and a minimum of 5 of these officers will have
to be retained.

5. Appendix "B" shows the break down of the officers requested in column (a) of Appendix "A".

6. This information is being passed to you in case it should be of assistance at the Establishments meeting with the Regional Commissioners on Monday, 19th March. If any further information is desired it is suggested that Lt. Col. Harris, who will be the special Transportation Sub-Commission representative in Northern Italy, be called in. He is fully conversant with the present position and will be responsible for the co-ordination of transportation work in the North.
