2. (a) The meeting was opened by the Director. Subsequently Colonel A.J. Stoff took the chair.

(b) Colonel Slatte stated that in view of the A.P.H.Q. directive on handing over responsibility wherever possible to the Italian Government, this is a very opportune time for this Conference. He added that the Chiefs of Staff had instructed that as much territory as possible be handed back to the Italian Government, and that a number of Liaison Officers would remain/

would remain in an advisory capacity. This had not proved satisfactory as far as transportation was concerned. A plan for the gradual withdrawal of officers was worked out and submitted to A.E.H.Q. Under this plan Transportation officers would have been withdrawn from Italian Government territory by 1st July. However, in view of recent experiences, A.E.H.Q. stated that so long as there was a shortage of transport to meet the diagnosis and arrest prevention program, and so long as the Supreme Allied Commander remains responsible for this, transportation officers must be retained in Italian Government territory, and must have some executive authority. The present position is that no transportation officers can be withdrawn without the agreement of A.P.H.Q. However, Colonel Slossfield, A.E.H.Q., has said that they will give all assistance in their power to replace officers due for demobilization, if these cannot be replaced from A.C. resources.

Information

3. Responsibilities of Transportation Officers were defined by Colonel Slossfield as follows -

(a) Possibilities of transportation officers were much less than those of existing Italian railroads and little or nothing could be done to eliminate wastage. They must make every effort to eliminate wastage of transportation available. This is best achieved by coordination of port working, warehousing and rail, road and sea movement. In certain areas wastage of shipping is constantly occurring. If any of the transportation officers that they are assigned in the field consider that they are unable, or have insufficient staff, to cope with their duties as defined above, they should immediately notify Transportation Sub-commissioner at Large.

(b) Shipping. Except in certain ports where large capacity is required for redeployment, the capacity for shipping will remain constant; it is essential, therefore, that there should be no unnecessary movement. Coal ships are maximum possible officers' orientation of ships is obtained.

(c) Rail. Tonnage allocations are increasing but the world's shortage of coal may result in Italy receiving no more than 70% of her total supplies. It is essential, therefore, that there should be no unnecessary movement will delay activation of textile industries.

3. (a) Responsibilities of Transportation Officers
defined by Colonel Stover's policies -

They are responsible for all A.C./civilian
movement in their areas. They must make as
much use as possible of existing facilities,
they must make every effort to eliminate wasteage
of transportation available. This is best
achieved by coordination of port working, ware-
houses and rail, road and sea movement. In
certain areas, use of shipping is constantly
occurring. If any of the transportation
officers in the field consider that they are
unable, or have insufficient stores, to cope with
their duties as defined above, they should
notify Transportation Sub-commission immediately.

(b) Shipping. Except in certain ports where large
capacity is required for trade, the capacity for
the movement of civilian goods will increase; at the same
time shipping will remain in short supply, so it is essen-
tial that the maximum possible efficient operation of
ships is obtained.

(c) Rail. Tonnage allocations are increasing but the
problem of coal may result in Italy receiving no
more than 70% of her total demands. It is essential, there-
fore, that there should be no unnecessary movement. Coal
is an absolute minimum. Delays movement of A.I. must be
averted.

(d) Road. Trucks available for civilian use are in-
creasing but it is unlikely that any increase in POL alloca-
tions will be made. The high demand for tanks in the
Pacific render it impossible to bring up tanks more POL than
available for movement of civil traffic, but shortage of
shipping/

shipping, POL and coal will necessitate the most careful screening of traffic programmed to move.

(f) In answer to the questions about the ability of
Italians to carry on without military assistance the following replies were given -

- (i) Piombino
- Mr. France expressed the opinion that Italians are NOT yet able to assume full responsibility.
 - Capt. Bent expects to see a considerable improvement following hand over of trucks. Too early to say at this stage when Italian will be ready to carry on unaided.
 - Lt. J. Bowers, referring to rail and road, said Italian take over has been good. Mr. Crooks, referring to port clearing, said that difficulties have been experienced over provision of trucks and he considers it essential for someone to remain for liaison with the Army, so long as it is necessary to obtain trucks from the Army. The Italians are not able to achieve the same results.
- (ii) Naples
- Capt. Boddy said its lining up doing a "good job" but have great difficulty in obtaining wagons, worse it not for this, Rosario could work without a transportation officer. Port working would be quite satisfactory if wagons were available. Capt. Boddy stated he had NO road movement problems. In reply to a question re road lift in that area, Lt. Col. 5. Block tonnages - Colonel Sizoff outlined the new scheme and explained that tonnage allocations are based on prevailing stock availability and not on line capacity. Lt. Col. Baker said that in instruction dealing with the new procedure he had sent out, A.P.H.Q. is keen to ensure the success of the scheme. Transportation officers are required to send to Transportation Sub-Commission a brief report immediately after meetings with C.R.P.I. Comptroller. Details of procedure to be outlined at the further meeting of transportation officers at 1430 hrs, 2nd July 1945. Rail Division are responsible for handling all problems of wagon supply for civilian movement, and if transportation officers do not get wagons to which they are entitled, they should notify the Rail Division at the earliest opportunity.

6. Returns and XB Forms These had proved most useful. It had been requested that prior to the reorganization of the Transportation Sub-commission Least Documentary, approximately a quarter of a million tons of transportation were vegetated each month. The returns which transportation officers render make it possible for Accounts and Statistics Branch to prepare extremely instructive analyses. Transports officers were invited to visit the Branch in order that they might see how their returns are processed. Lt. Col. Gile said his returns came from nearly 800 sources. Returns asked for require information in miles. It is noted if such returns could be rendered in Kilometres. Capt. Goddy suggested that Agent, Lieutenant Col. Thomas Estate Statistics Branch had no objection. Lt. Col. Thomas Estate Statistics Branch would be accepted. That returns in Kilometres would be accepted.

 2500 to 3000 per day through Brenner (Innich to Verona)
 2500 per day through Switzerland (to Como). Both controlled.
- In addition it is estimated that some 2000 per day will infiltrate by other means (uncontrolled). It is considered that 7500 per day is the absolute maximum which can be accepted.
- (d) Onward movement will be mainly by road to Bolzano and Anchors on the east side, and to Lucca and Loghorn on the west side. West July trains will run from Verona. 9000

(f) Capt. Boy asked if refugees could travel to Reggio in through trains. Major Ping stated that the box car situation at Reggio makes it desirable that refugees should continue changing into box cars at Casale.

(g) Mr. Franco asked if arrangements could be made for the use of another ship at Piombino when the "Cartibale" is undergoing repairs. Colonel Sieff said this is not likely as all available shipping is required for redeployment of troops.

S. Movement of Wines

(a) Colonel Sieff outlined the situation, and drew attention to the Wine Accords Instruction issued under ref AC/24/22/Tc.3 dated 26 June 1945. He directed that transportation of officers should be everything possible to ensure that the procedure laid down is followed and that they should support the Italian Government in its effort to prevent illegal movement. The threat of famine in the coming winter makes it imperative that the maximum transport be available for the movement of food.

(b) Lt. Col. Forgyth asked transportation officers to refuse the issue of "authorities" for the movement of wine by road or by any means other than those permitted by the instruction.

14. Movement between A.M.C. and Italian Government territory

(b) When due to shortage of P.O.L., Transportation officers find that priority connections are likely to be interfered with, they must actively transport sub-commission immediately, but notification of shortage of P.O.L. is not required otherwise.

(c) An additional allocation of P.O.L. will be made by A.T.R.C. Patrol Section to meet requirements of A.M.C. now standing.

Transportation Officers more closely supply Transportation Sub-commission with names and addresses of Directors.

(b) Truck Park areas will generally conform to I.S.R. Requirements.

(c) Lt. Col. Giles retains the question of insurance, stating that until the Italian Government takes over he is responsible for the vehicles. To protect insurance he requires that each vehicle be the vehicles. The same will apply in Africa. Lt. Col. Pennington undertook to ascertain the value of vehicles and notify all concerned.

17. Responsibility for warehouses in Italian Government territory

Transportation Sub-commission A.C. should be notified immediately.

(a) Lt. Col. Giles claims from transportation to Army regulations which lead him that civilian addresses are not permissible, nor may mail be addressed to battle. Officers must make arrangements with local units. This may have to be previous letter with withdrawal of units from Italy. In this case, if Capt. Rose, postmaster, has classified mail and signals must be sent through military unit.

(b) With the withdrawal of units, telephone numbers are well known and changes will inevitably undergo changes. It is essential that such changes be notified to Administrative Division - Transportation Officers




