The low tonnage moved was due to scarcity of wagons. The civilian movement consisted of wine in tank cars and charcoal and furniture within the Division. The wagon situation during the month was the worst since invasion days. Not sufficient empty wagons were returned from the northern Divisions to fill the military loading programme. Grain distribution suffered resulting in complaints from all quarters. Prefects are imploring for an allotment of wagons for charcoal movement. It has been impossible to balance the interchange with Sicily. Severe criticism is falling upon this office as a result and it is the subject of a separate report to H.Q. TN SUB-COMM.

3. CROPS.

The agrumi harvest^{is} large and thousands of tons are bid for but, in the past, no wagons have been available for any except A.C. sponsored traffic. This was effected through Food Sub-Comm efforts.

4. TRACK. All track interruptions due to heavy rains in November and reported in December were repaired by 7 Dec except the Metaponto route at Novasiri. Forty percent of the work to be done was completed by the end of December and it is expected to have trains again running on this section by the end of January.

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5. WAGON REPAIR.

Wagon repairs, as given in I.S.R. reports, appear to be progressing favorably but the lightest of running repairs is included which builds up the result and gives a false impression. It is suggested that the report include the number of wagons reclaimed from disuse due to war action. Lumber is needed and is most difficult to procure except at black market prices.

8. SHIPPING.

- A. During the month of December 1944, 3964 tons of bagged wheat and 5000 tons of coal were discharged from ships in the Port of Reggio. The wheat was lightered from ship to quay and loaded into covered wagons for distribution in the Province of Reggio. Due to shortage of rolling stock the coal (consigned to the I.S.R.) was discharged onto the quay. Five hundred and thirty tons of trunks and roughhewn timber were exported during the month.

SUPPLEMENT

1. There are 95 locomotives (steam and electric) in operation in the division at this date. In addition there are also 76 locomotives not in operation, 27 requiring light repairs and 49 in need of heavy repair. Work of replacement of this equipment is proceeding, limited, however, to the supply of repair materials and repair facilities.

2. The acute wagon shortage in the division has brought about a serious condition in the fruit industry, in that a grain now on the trees cannot be shipped to markets. The situation, as we enter the New Year, is improving and if the present daily rate of the return of empties to the division is maintained it is expected that there will be an increase in civilian freight traffic.

INTERRUPTIONS

3. The west coast route is interrupted at Gioia Tauro by a demolition of the bridge across the River Patrasso. Present estimates are that it will not be repaired before May.

4. The route via Metaponto was washed out at Nova Siri by heavy rains on 29 Nov 44. It is expected that the damage will be repaired and the line in operation by the end of the present month.

5. A stone masonry bridge on the Calabro Lucece railway at Lauria which was demolished has not been repaired as it is of no military importance and cannot be used in short supply. It is understood that this latter of carrying out repairs has been reconsidered due to lignite mining in that area.

PUBLIC SERVICE

6. During the month of December 1944 Coal & Lignite loaded and moved amounted to 26,916 tons. Of this 13,000 tons, 5,000 tons were for cement and lime military needs;

SUMMARY

1. There are 90 locomotives (steam and electric) in operation in the division at this date. LINE OBSTRUCTIONS

3. The west coast route is interrupted at Gioia Tauro by a demolition of the bridge across the Flumene Petrace. Present estimates are that it will not be repaired before May.

4. The route via Metaponto was washed out at Nova Siri by heavy rains on 29 Nov 43. It is expected that the cause will be repaired and the line in operation by the end of the present month.

5. A stone masonry bridge on the Salabro Luccare railway at Laurin which was demolished has not been repaired as it is of no military importance and cement has been in short supply. It is understood that the latter of carrying out repairs has been reconsidered due to lignite mining in that area.

RAILWAY SERVICE

6. During the month of December 1944 freight loaded and moved amounted to 26,916 tons. Of this ~~1,100~~ 50% was utilized for British, American and Italian military needs; 11% for AC sponsored freight; 7% for civilian needs (principally fruit) and 32% for the I.S.R. including hauling materials for the railway line damage.

CONFERENCE AT NAPLES 30 NOV. 44:
Brigadier Dunlop and his staff paid a visit on 23 Nov. to Reggio, when it was arranged by Brig. Dunlop that a conference should be held at Naples, at which Major Blair and Capt. Corby should attend.

The figures quoted above were produced, and it is hoped that, as a result of this conference, an even flow of wagons will be received in this Division, as it seems impossible in existing conditions to satisfactorily cope with essential demands.

INTERRUPTIONS DUE TO BAD WEATHER:

A bad storm on night 28/29 Nov caused considerable damage to tracks at several points (as advised in signals 1/6/2 and 1/6/4 of 29 Nov):

Interruptions in service are as follows:-

LIGURIA SECTION.

Between CAFORA and NOCERA, collapse of bridge.

Between FALENNA and S. EUFELIA, an interruption.

Between S. EUFELIA and S. PIBIUO, portion of bridge piles

washed away.

Near S.PIETRO station, points out of order and electric traction affected;

S. EUPENNA - CATANZARO SECTION:

Between S.EUPENNA and S.BLAISE, a loco derailed and overturned, and section flooded. Estimated there will be 6 days' suspension of traffic here.

IONICA SECTION.

Between TORRE CINCINNATA and TREBLASCE, a landslide of an embankment.

COSENZA - SLAINE SECTION.

Ballast washed away.

BETWEEN TURSI AND NOVA SIRI:


Interruptions at five different points. 150 metres of track washed away.

It is anticipated that most of the above repairs can be effected in a few days (ranging from 3 to 6 days) but the most serious interruption is the last named, which may take a minimum of 40 days to complete. Major Slair is arranging to visit this section on 5 Dec.

It is impossible at the moment to move traffic on west coast, and all trains North by West coast route must make the detour HEUGLO-CATANZARO-SLAIK-PAULIA (over the rack)-BATTIPAGLIA, which is adding considerably to our difficulties.
