

1. Enclosed is translation of instructions issued by Feder-consorzi, Rome to the various discharge warehouses setting forth a uniform procedure for reporting the danger of spoilage and actual spoilage of foodstuffs.

Interregionali.Monthly reports on condemned foodstuffs at Port warehouses.

In observance to the disposition recently issued by the Food & Agric. S/C to this Federazione with a view to conform all port warehouses on the procedure to be followed in the signals that the latter must send to the authorities concerned relating to condemned foodstuffs in warehouses, we deem it advisable to issue the following instructions which must be scrupulously carried out.

When the Port Warehouses are aware of a beginning of spoilage in a mass of foodstuffs or when they think the warehousing is dangerous owing to the nature of the foodstuffs or for other reasons they must signal :

For imported foodstuffs.

- 1) The A.C. Food & Agric. S/C - APC 394.
- 2) The Federalimentari - Roma and for infor.to, the competent Uffici Interregionali.
- 3) The Ministry of Food.
- 4) The Ispettorato regionale Alimentazione competent in that territory.

For UNRRA goods.

- 1) UNRRA - Roma Via S. Nicola Tolentino 7 and for infor., the Delegazione Italiana per i rapporti con l'UNRRA - Via Sallustiano 10.
- 2) The A.C. Food & Agric. S/C - APC 394.
- 3) The Federalimentari - Roma and for infor., the competent Ufficio Interregionale.

The telegram must indicate whether the goods belong to the UNRRA or whether they have been assigned to the Italian Government, and specify the nature of the commodity, the quantity and condition it is in.

The purpose of this telegram is to cause the Organization concerned to take action immediately so as to avoid further spoilage.

The Port Warehouses must then set up a monthly report in which there must be clearly specified :

- a) The quality and quantity of condemned foodstuffs that have been accumulated during the month.
- b) The quality and quantity of condemned foodstuffs on hand at the end of the month (namely by ~~adding~~ ^{to} the quantity referring to the monthly report and the quantities carried over from the previous month) with the reasons of spoilage and a statement whether

the organization concerned was duly informed by telegram from the moment the danger of spoilage appeared.

It is superfluous to indicate the reasons for spoilage when dealing with small quantities of foodstuffs.

Said report must be addressed to :

- 1) To the UNRRA a Roma Via C.Nicolini Tolentino 7 for infor.to: the Delegazione Italiana per i rapporti con l'UNRRA Via Sallustiana 10 Rome.
- 2) To A.C. Food & Agric. S/C-APO 394.
- 3) " " " Transportation & Shipping S/C APO 394.
- 4) Federalimentazione -Rome and for infor.to: the competent Uffici Interregionali.

As you will note, this new procedure will amplify the one in circular No.153 of the Ministry of Food in paragraph 1) ; danger of spoilage or spoilage in Port and National Warehouses (this circular is herewith enclosed)

With a view to render uniform the reports that you will set up in observance to the a.m. dispositions, we hereby include a plan which we believe is fit for the purpose.

It is understood that upon receiving the present circular you will take steps to set up as soon as possible the report in question, sending a copy to the above listed addressees, for the quantities of damaged commodities or those in danger of such accumulated up to the 31st Dec. 1945, and thereafter a monthly report starting from said date.

We beg you to keep strictly to the contents of the present and we strongly recommend the utmost precision in setting up the report, which in the signals you will send out, as the A.C. states, are indispensable elements for the decisions to be taken in regard to the immediate movement of the condemned foodstuffs.

1. On the 8th November warehouse 676, Naples reported that signs of fermentation were apparent in the following UNRRA supplies :

Corn meal 113.562 tons

Puffed oats 107.937 tons

2. On the 27th November at a meeting held at the warehouse, Mr. Lennier, UNRRA Naples representative, examined the above supplies and found that although their condition was not yet bad some of the sacks did show signs of fermentation. Mr. Lennier stated his intention of contacting his home HQ. to get immediate disposition for the above.

3. Under the date of 13th January in answer to our request concerning certain A.C. supplies, the P.M.C. Naples advised us that no disposal instructions had yet been given for the above supplies.

4. Above information is forwarded to you as it is felt you may be interested.


