2. The following data on war damage to Electric Utilities, including State Railroads, resulting from enemy action by demolition, has been assembled from information compiled by Public Works and Utilities S/O., A.C.

The figures do not include those facilities which were slightly damaged and restored to service within a relatively short period of time. They do not include those plants which sustained superficial damage to buildings and structures where no damage occurred to the machinery and equipment.

(a) Generating capacity

Plants less than 5,000 KW in size	-	63,000 KW
Plants 5,000 to 10,000 KW in size	-	206,000 KW
Plants 11,000 to 30,000 KW in size	-	393,000 KW
Plants more than 30,000 KW in size	-	777,000 KW

The 1942 total generating plant capacity, which is considered the maximum or prewar capacity, was 6,412,000 KW; 5,431,000 KW of which was hydro electric and 981,000 KW thermal plants. The total damage to hydro stations was 1,047,000 KW and the total damage to thermal stations was 392,000 KW. The damage to Hydro Stations, was largely to machinery, equipment and buildings. The damage to hydraulic works such as dams and penstocks was relatively insignificant.

~~SECRET~~(b) Substation Capacity

Accurate information is not available at this time on the prewar capacity of substations. For estimating purposes it is considered to be about 25% greater than the total prewar generating capacity or 8,450,000 KVA. The amount damaged, based on the information available, is estimated to be 3,100,000 KVA or 36.7%. Approximately 930,000 KVA has been repaired and restored to service which is 30% of that damaged.

(c) Transmission Lines

The following tabulation reflects the prewar and damaged transmission lines in lengths classified according to voltages.

Those lines which sustained only superficial damage and were quickly repaired have not been included.

The enemy did not carry out a planned demolition program on the low voltage (below 30,000 volts) distribution systems. Consequently the damage, suffered by these facilities, resulted from combat operations and was relatively small.

The above indicates that 63% of the transmission lines, 30,000 volts and above, were damaged.

About 75% of the damaged lines have been repaired and are now operating.

3. The above information is based on the best data available and is believed to reasonably represent the electrical situation in Italy before the war and at the present time.

4. In 1941 Italy estimated that it would increase the electric energy output by approximately one billion KWH per year, and would extend over a period of about ten years. This is equivalent to about 275,000 KW of generating capacity which was to be derived mostly from new hydro sources. The war has delayed this program beginning with 1943.

Work on new projects has been resumed, however, but priority of equipment and material is being given to the rehabilitation of damaged electric facilities.

5. The Italian Electric Power Companies are capable of continuing their rehabilitation and new construction program on a more extensive basis when arrangements are made that will permit the private companies to purchase the electrical equipment and materials that are not available in Italy.

1. Reference to 2.16/ES of 14 July 45 asking for comments on TAM 626.

- 22 (a) It is believed that classification of civilian visitors into two categories should be maintained until restriction on food, accomodations and transportation are less critical. The limitations on class A may be modified periodically when and as conditions improve.
- (b) Even though responsibility for providing food, accomodations and transportation is placed on the Italian Government, much of that will revert directly or indirectly upon the military particularly in the case of visitors from Allied Nations. Until repatriation and rehabilitation have passed their peak and extensive troop movements are accomplished visitors are less desirable unless on actual missions of real importance.

SUBJECT: Entry of civilians into Italy

TO : Headquarters, Allied Commission, APO 394

1. Reference is made to MAT 729 of 2 June, of which you have information copies, setting out the conditions on which this Headquarters at that time was prepared to extend entry into Italy.

2. Attached is a copy of TAM 626 of 9 July received from CGS. You will note from this cable that CGS consider the recommendations in MAT 729 to be unduly restrictive in view of the termination of the European war, and recommend that entry be opened up generally. In this connection you will also note that they do not consider it desirable for the military to assume responsibility for providing food, accommodation or transportation for private visitors and believe the Italian Government could assume the responsibility if necessary.

3. We believe that the reply contained in TAM 626 is sound policy in every way, and will serve to promote the general objectives of TAM 487. It is in line with policies which this Section has consistently advocated in past, but which, for various reasons, have not proved generally acceptable.

4. On a related subject the Swiss have recently protested against present restrictions imposed on travel to and from Italy by Swiss Nationals. As an interim policy, and in order to expedite the settlement of the MEDLOC arrangements with the Swiss Government, it is probable that this Headquarters will shortly authorise a special concession whereby Swiss Nationals may travel to and from Switzerland for personal reasons only. TAM 626 will, it is thought, enable the general question of relaxation of entry to be dealt with satisfactorily.

5. You are requested to comment urgently on TAM 626 and particularly on paragraph 2. It is probable that you will consider it advisable to recommend that accommodation for the use of commercial visitors should be made available to the Italian Government at key points throughout Italy; bearing in mind the handback of territory which you now envisage. It is requested that you include this point in your general comments.

THIS IS TAU 626, DATED 09 JULY 1945.

1. IT IS THOUGHT THAT THE RECOMMENDATIONS SET FORTH IN MAT 729 ARE CONSIDERED UNDULY RESTRICTIVE CONCERNING THE ENTRY OF CIVILIANS INTO ITALY SINCE THE TERMINATION OF THE EUROPEAN WAR.
2. IT IS BELIEVED THAT THE ITALIAN GOVERNMENT COULD, IF NECESSARY, ASSUME THE RESPONSIBILITY OF PROVIDING FOOD, ACCOMMODATION AND TRANSPORTATION FOR PRIVATE VISITORS. IT IS NOT BELIEVED DESIRABLE THAT YOU ASSUME THE RESPONSIBILITY. WITH THE REDUCED LOAD OF MILITARY NECESSITIES TAKEN FROM THE ITALIAN GOVERNMENT IT IS THOUGHT THAT SUFFICIENT FACILITIES WILL BE AVAILABLE FOR THIS PURPOSE.
3. IT IS AGREED ON THE POLICY THAT TRAVEL WILL BE RESTRICTED IN GENERAL TO THE AREAS HANDED BACK TO ITALIAN GOVERNMENT CONTROL, HOWEVER, THIS WILL BE SUBJECT TO YOUR DETERMINATION. TRAVEL TO OTHER THAN AREAS HANDED BACK TO THE ITALIAN GOVERNMENT SHOULD BE PERMITTED ONLY TO THE EXTENT THAT YOU DEEM PRACTICABLE. IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT RESTRICTIONS ON THE ENTRY AND TRAVEL OF PRIVATE CITIZENS, ALIED AND NEUTRAL, BE LIMITED TO THOSE LISTED IN PAR. 3, MAT 729. NO CATEGORY OR QUOTA SYSTEM SHOULD BE ESTABLISHED.
4. IF THIS RECOMMENDED POLICY IS ACCEPTABLE THE PUBLIC WILL BE NOTIFIED THAT THE MILITARY WILL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR PROVIDING ACCOMMODATIONS FOR PRIVATE CITIZENS, INCLUDING FOOD OR TRANSPORTATION. THIS WILL ASSURE THAT INDIVIDUALS WILL PROCEED TO ITALY AT THEIR OWN RISK AND SHOULD NOT COUNT ON ASSISTANCE OF THIS TYPE FROM YOU, AND THAT THEIR RETURN TO THE UNITED STATES WILL BE DELAYED INDEFINITELY. ALL PERSONS WHO RECEIVE PASSPORTS WILL BE INFORMED OF THIS IN WRITING BEFORE HE PROCEEDS TO ITALY.
5. AS HAS BEEN THE POLICY HERETOFORE GOVERNMENT PERSONNEL OF THE UNITED STATES, UNITED KINGDOM AND DOMINICAN GOVERNMENT ENTERING ITALY WILL RECEIVE WHATEVER ASSISTANCE REQUESTED OF YOU AND THAT YOU ARE ABLE TO GIVE THEM.

6. THE ITALIAN GOVERNMENT SHOULD HANDLE THE QUESTION OF INTERFERENCE IN ITALIAN POLITICS ON THE PART OF EXTRANTS IN AREAS RETURNED TO THE ITALIAN GOVERNMENT, REFERENCE PAR. A OF MAT 729. THE FOREGOING WOULD BE A GOVERNMENTAL RATHER THAN MILITARY QUESTION. APPLICATION OF SUCH A CONDITION PRIOR TO THE GRANTING OF TRAVEL FACILITIES WOULD CAUSE ADVERSE COMMENT.

7. IN THE FORMULATION OF YOUR REPLY IT MAY BE CONSIDERED BY YOU THAT THERE WILL BE NO MILITARY RESPONSIBILITY FOR PROVIDING ACCOMMODATION FOR THESE CIVILIANS IN ITALY; UNTIL THE COMPLETION OF THE BULK OF THE REEMPLOYMENT PROGRAM THERE WILL BE NO WEST BOUND ALLIED TRANSPORTATION TO THEM; AND THAT THE PROPOSED RELAXATION ON CIVILIAN ENTRY INTO ITALY WILL NOT BE CONSTRUED TO JUSTIFY INCREASING THE QUOTA OF TRAVEL SPACE AVAILABLE FOR QUASI-OFFICIAL TRAVEL. REQUEST YOUR VIEWS EARLIEST.

8. UNTIL FURTHER INSTRUCTIONS ARE FORMULATED THE PROCEDURE SET FORTH IN MAT 729 WILL CONTINUE AS AN INTERIM MEASURE.

1. Reference is made to incoming secret cable No. D/3583 of 8 June which is NOT FOR. A copy was sent to all sub-commissions of Economic Section.
2. G-S Section of AFHQ is frequently calling Economic Section with request for comments on the desirability of the entry into Italy of various individuals proposed by cable from AFHQ, THROCK or SHAEF. Request was made by telephone for clarification of the policy which AFHQ desires Economic Section to use in giving comments or recommendations and the following response was made by Major Byles of AFHQ by telephone:

"If the United States or Great Britain transmits those requests and the facts indicate that the arrival in Italy of the individual concerned will assist the rehabilitation of the Italian civil economy, then AC is merely requested to state whether from the economic point of view there is any objection to the proposed travel. The security screening will be done by G-S Section AFHQ and the limitations on numbers allowed to enter will be set and controlled by AFHQ. The AC need feel no responsibility therefor."

Conditions now permit some relaxation of restrictions on entry of civilians into ITALY.

1. The military forces continue to be the only source of suitable accommodation, food and transportation according to US and UK standards. Unless the military is able to provide these facilities there is danger especially with short term visitors that conditions of living imposed may cause adverse impressions against the Armed Forces. The visitors permitted therefore must be within the capabilities of the military forces to care for and of sufficient importance to justify sponsoring by those forces.

2. For purposes of classification civilian visitors will be divided into 3 categories:

A. Those directly connected with the prosecution of the war effort; those whose presence will be of material assistance to the rehabilitation of Italian Civil economy; and those from Allied Government Agencies whose presence by those agencies is considered desirable in ITALY. Category A personnel will visit ITALY only at the invitation of this Headquarters, or when on notification thru governmental channels of their proposed arrival there is no objection by this Headquarters to the visit. Objection would normally be based solely on ability properly to accommodate. Category B. Those persons not in Category A who are proposed and sponsored by proper departments of the US and British

Governments for commercial or other reasons. Quo⁸ under Category Bare established initially to the United States and the British Government at 10-05 each in ITALY at any one time. Because of the variations of numbers present in Category A the proposed visits of Category B personnel will be notified to this Headquarters thru official channels in order that accommodation may be assured.

3. Entry of civilians into ITALY under this proposal will be subject to: Security clearance of the individual by this Headquarters, the issuance of proper visas by the Italian Government, possession of competent military travel orders, or whose travel has been certified by the STATE DEPARTMENT in accordance with paragraph 1 C (3) WAR DEPARTMENT Circular number 451 and arrangements for reimbursement of carrying agencies to and from ITALY, with corresponding procedure for British persons.

4. Entrants must agree before departure from the zones of the interior to refrain from any interference in Italian politics. Their travel will be generally restricted to areas handed back to Italian Government control.

5. Those individuals of Category "D" of TAM 507, whose entry may be considered of semi-Permanent Duration, cannot be accepted as a military responsibility for full accommodation. When such individuals are accepted for entrance, it should be understood that the military authorities cannot be responsible for their individual needs and can cooperate with them only to the extent of assisting in securing limited amounts of subsistence. They will be subject to the same arrangements as stated in para 3 and 4 above, and no provision as to travel accommodations in ITALY or for return trip can be given.



"Entry of representatives of government departments and others into Italy, relaxation of restrictions regarding, is subject.

1. Consider that important civilian representatives US and UK government departments and civilians who assist rehabilitation essential industries and general reorganisation industrial activity should be permitted entry to extent military considerations permit, although it is understood that military considerations do NOT permit entry to Italy by of individuals concerned alone in advancing or reestablishing private trading.

2. Subject to screening appropriate government authorities and your consent each application, your recommendation requested on desirability and practicability of permitting entry now into Italy any or all following categories of persons.

a. Allied government department representatives.

- 1) - The second unit at the Galleto Power Station, Terni, belonging to the Terni Electric Company, will shortly be put into operation after repairs.
- 2) - This machine is 35,000 KW capacity and together with three other similar machines was put out of action due to mining by the enemy.
- 3) - With the coming into operation of this second machine the Galleto Station will develop 70,000 KW and will be the most important generating plant in Central Italy. If this station was put out of action a very serious curtailment of supplies to vital factories engaged in the war effort would have to be made.
- 4) - In view of the importance of this plant it is thought that consideration should be given to an armed guard and it is required to know whether, if you are in favour of this, a guard should be provided by the Military Commander from Allied Military sources or arrangements made by Allied Commission for the local Carabinieri to do this duty.
- 5) - In view of the extreme importance of this plant it is our opinion that the guard should be provided by Allied Military.

- 1) - Reference letter AC/14259/PS dated 17 March 1945 and subsequent meeting held on 21 March 1945 to discuss post-raid measures, the recommendations so far as Public Works and Utilities are concerned is as follows :
- 2) - The Ministry of Public Works Field Organization includes the Genio Civile with an Inspector General in charge of each compartment and a Provincial Engineer in each Province. In addition, all larger cities have an Engineering Organization headed by a Communal Engineer. It is proposed that this organization should be used for post-raid measures connected with Public Works and Utilities.
- 3) - It is suggested that the Allied Commission Regional Engineer in conjunction with compartmental and Provincial Engineer make the following arrangements :
 - (a) - List of building contractors - The Genio Civile to compile a list of all building contractors.
 - (b) - Rescue squads - The Genio Civile to arrange for suitable men from the building contractors to be formed into rescue squads for the purpose of rescuing persons trapped in demolished buildings.
 - (c) - Material for rescue squads - Dumps of material viz : ladders, timber, ropes, picks, shovels, hammers, axes, etc. to be arranged at suitable locations.
 - (d) - Transport - In case of large amount of road clearance requiring transport beyond that available to the Genio Civile from civilian sources the Regional Engineer will arrange with the Military for assistance.

- (e) - Electricity - The most serious case would be that of damage to the central supply causing complete breakdown of electricity to the whole of a town. The Regional Engineer would contact the Electrical Division of Allied Commission who would make the necessary arrangements for the supply to be restored.
- (f) - Water - Damage to water mains will be handled by the Genio Civile by using civilian contractors. The Regional Engineer may have to give assistance in the case of transport. As most of the townships depend on electricity for water pumping, damage to the electric supply will also affect this service. The Regional Engineer will instruct the Electrical Company to give the highest priority to water supply.
- (g) - Gas - The Genio Civile will make the necessary arrangements by using civilian contractors to repair damage to gas mains and to see that gas supply is cut off in damaged areas. This is not considered to be a service requiring immediate restoration and repairs would be carried out after giving attention to more essential services.

As, however, you may desire to assist them in their investigations, I am sending you herewith drawings and other data which may be helpful and which will give some idea as to the type of destruction which the Germans have carried out to the electrical facilities in the country.

2. I also enclose a booklet which may be of interest, giving a description of the Canterno Hydro-Electric plant which was put into operation recently having been a new construction work which was about 60% completed when the Germans left the country.

3. Will you please communicate direct with Mr. Sandberg informing him that future communications should be directed to you in the first instance, and if there is any further assistance which I can give, please let me know.

The following report received from No 25 Detachment, No 1 Special Forces may be of interest:-

HYDRO-ELECTRIC PLANT IN THE CERESOLE VALLEY

- (a) They are fed by Lake CERESOLE with Lake AGNELLO as subsidiary, these lakes naturally are mountain lakes, so that they are filled in summer by the melting ice, and in winter they are exploited. There are three electric stations in the Valley; the first and most important is situated at ROSONE, which draws its power from the reservoir of Lake CERESOLE, which has a capacity of 36 million cubic meters of water. The power installed is 60,000 Kilowatts; power used 45,000 Kilowatts (at present much less than this. A group has been dismantled and is held in reserve).
- (b) The second station is at BARDONNETTO, and it uses the same reservoir lower down; it has a power of 14,000 Kw installed; power utilized 7,000 Kw.
- (c) The third station is at PONT, not yet completed, and for this reason it is only being partially and provisionally used. It has an installed power of 14,000 Kw but the power utilised is only 5,000 Kw.
- (d) The service is reduced in this way because the Directors of the Municipal Electric Company wish it. The energy is brought to TURIN on a few lines which the Partisans have left alone, as the energy destined for war industries is very small, and only a drop. On the other hand it mainly supplies the public utilities (tram, aqueduct, bread ovens, hospitals) and private consumers.

The total plant may be considered as one of the most important in ITALY.







1. Inter-Allied *laissez-passer* will no longer be required for travel by civilians from Allied-occupied Italy to France. This will be replaced by Allied Expeditionary Force Permits and Military Travel Authorizations in accordance with the following paragraphs.

2. Effective this date the following regulations are applicable:

a. Civilians who require Military Travel Authorizations issued by G-2 (CI) Section, this headquarters, to leave Italy under the provisions of letter, this headquarters, file AG 371.2/015 GAC-O, subject: "Military Travel Authorizations", dated 7 November 1944, will also require French entry visas. Applications for Military Travel Authorizations will not be considered without production of a French entry visa.

b. All categories of persons exempted from Military Travel Authorizations under paragraph 2 of the above quoted letter, with the exceptions noted below, will in future require Allied Expeditionary Force Permits issued by G-2 (CI) Section, this headquarters, on behalf of SHAEF, unless already in possession of Allied Force Permits, Joint Chiefs of Staff Permits, or Allied Expeditionary Force Permits. Persons already in possession of the above permits which have not been validated for France should apply to G-2 (CI) Section, this headquarters, for the appropriate validation.

c. Allied service personnel will not require any form of military permit. This category includes British and US civilians employed by any of the Service Ministries in the UK or US who are in possession of AGO cards or British Military, naval or air force identity cards.

d. War correspondents accredited to SHAEF or AFHQ, merchant seamen serving in Allied or Allied-operated ships, and merchant seamen, other than Italians, proceeding to France to join ships under proper authority, will not require any form of military permit for travel to France.

e. Persons who are not documented in accordance with the above will not be permitted to embark for France at sea or airports in Italy.

As an experiment to an effort to rapidly build up a winter stockpile of gas coal in ROSE, it is planned to discharge a Liberty ship collier off the beach at PIUMCINO into MING barges that will be towed to the coal quay in PIUMCINO for discharge into rail railway wagons or stockpiled on the quay until railway wagons or barges are available to transport the coal into ROSE by railway or barge canal.

B. To arrange to sleep and feed such personnel aboard the Liberty, providing mess facilities, overside latrines if necessary, extra life saving rafts and preservers.

C. Cooperate with War Shipping Administration in equipping the ship with double anchors and 60 fathoms of chain or cable.

D. Equip vessel with self operating clam shells to be used by ships gear in discharging all holds.

E. To guard against failure of electric power, to lend 3 generators, diesel, portable, 5 kw, 110 volt dc, with 1000 feet number 142 wire electric cable and 10 flood lights and one coil 1 inch rope and other gear specified by director of

barber Craft. In order to provide diesel fuel for 3 tugs, PENSAS will arrange for 16 X 6, 1 and one half ton truck and one trailer, 1000 gallons.

3. Temporarily assign Lieut W.M.CILLY, ASN-C-514330, to supervise the tug boat and barge operation during the discharge of the vessel and towing loaded barges to ROME, and one enlisted man interpreter.

4. ALLIED COMMISSION is requested to provide:

A. The civilian coal trimmers at ship side and other labor to handle the coal from barges to quay and/or railway cars, to handle lines, provide pilots, and all other necessary labor shoreside and aboard barges, as noted by director of Harbor Craft. It is estimated 65 civilian barge hands and 75 civilian shoreside will be needed at FIUMICINO. 40 tug crewmen will also be required, but Cognac will be called upon to produce those.

SUBJECT: Report of Public Works & Utilities Sub-Commission of ACC.

4.4 G-4 G-5 17/9/44. 1. The attached report of the Public Works & Utilities Sub-Commission of ACC, and the remarks of the Chief Engineer have been noted.

2. With certain exceptions, report is approved for forwarding to the CCS for their consideration, not as a military requirement, but as a basis for future planning of civilian agencies responsible for rehabilitation.

3. The report can be strengthened if the following amendments are made:

a. Show good and sufficient reason why 20,000 additional kw are required for the use of the civil population of Rome, and why the same is not true of other cities of the area; or else omit this requirement.

b. Indicate that although by the end of the period under consideration military requirements should fall off, the need for power for repair and rehabilitation will more than offset.

c. Indicate generally what percentage of output generation capacity increase, in the calculations, is due to increased stream flow in winter months. This will fall off with summer deficiency of rainfall in the next period.

d. Include table covering the Carbide Industry production. This is very important vs supply and demand.

e. Think up a better reason for making rayon, than for ladies underwear. Believe inquiry will show rayon to be essential in the military effort.

f. Indicate whether or not local resources can be moved from source to manufacturing plant, and finished product from plant to points of distribution, using facilities available.

g. Show whether or not local skilled and unskilled labor, as required, is available.

h. Power for grinding wheat is required as much for imported wheat as for local wheat.

i. Give a general idea as to planning for Northern Italy if conditions are found to be similar to those in Central Italy. Bear in mind that it will be difficult to move any "temporary" installations once set up in Central Italy.

j. Remark on inability to tie Southern and Central Italy together for exchange of power, due to damaged transmission system.

k. An area outline map should be annexed.

4. Much of the above can be covered in the remarks of this headquarters, as an annex. The letter to CC/3 should be concise, in itself and indicate the problem, a brief discussion and the recommendations.

5. These requirements can be supported only in small part as military requirements. For example, the requirement most nearly justified as military is the requirement for power to grind flour but even this, considered in terms either of shipping or of money value, would not be justified if we assume that war will end in a month or two. In other words, the equipment would not pay for itself during the next two months of war and the following six months of military responsibility for civil supply. I am willing to support power for the grinding of flour and for other similar purposes that are partly military requirements with wording similar to what I have given above.

EQUIPMENT FOR NORTHERN ITALY

Northern Italy, or that portion of Italy still in enemy hands, is known as the Industrial North of Italy. Aside from being the industrial heart of Italy, that region:

- a. Produces about 80% of all hydro-electric power in Italy.
- b. Produces from 40 to 90% of all agricultural products grown in Italy depending upon the type of crop.

Northern Italy, therefore, is of the utmost importance from a military as well as a civilian rehabilitation viewpoint. While the war is still on many of the factories in that region must be rehabilitated to produce things needed by the Army. Other factories must be opened to produce essential civilian needs and reduce import tonnages. In addition, every effort must be made to provide work for the vast army of workers thrown out of work because of the destruction of plants and to reduce to a minimum possible uprisings. It will be cheaper and better to provide work for these people than to have to control them with a large army of occupation.

We must assume that the Germans are going to carry out the same scorched earth policy as they pursued in Central Italy and as they are doing elsewhere. We must also assume that they are going to flood some of the large number of "Bonifiche," or drainage projects in the Po Valley region, as they have done in the Pontine Marshes. We must, therefore, be prepared to provide sufficient electrical generating plants to serve the most essential military and civil needs and we must also provide a considerable number of large capacity portable pumping units to drain flooded areas.

In order to save time, it is essential that prompt and positive action be taken now to provide such equipment and not to wait for the receipt of a formal requisition from us which will be prepared as soon as I return to Italy. I am advised that a "Letter of Intent" is all that is needed at this time so as to permit manufacturers to proceed with plans and plant preparations, all of which will entail some time. It is requested, therefore, that such a "Letter of Intent" be executed by such agency as will eventually order this equipment and that such letter of intent be made out to cover the following equipment:

A - ELECTRICAL GENERATING PLANT

1. Floating Power Plant Unit "A", now in operation at Pensacola and which can be freed by 1 January 1945, capacity 25,000 KW at 50 cycles. This unit to be prepared immediately for the transocean voyage and to be equipped in the same manner as provided in the memorandum prepared by Lt. Col. Lapper for Unit "C" now at Pittsburgh.
2. Small portable Diesel electric generating units of from 300 to 800 KW capacity each at 50 cycles, aggregating a total of 75,000 KW.

B - DIESEL DRIVEN PORTABLE PUMPS

100 complete sets of portable pumps as per plan prepared by the S. Morgan Smith Co., of York, Pa., dated 10/13/44, Drawing Number P-3980, known as Type "B".

The Utility Division of the War Production Board is familiar with our requirements and the units and plans mentioned above, also as to permissible variations.

The quantities given above are tentative and may be modified after a further study in Italy.

It is requested that a copy of such letter of intent be forwarded to me at above indicated address.

Polluting the various stations arranged with the
directors of the various Electricities Companys
(Soc. Adriatica di Elettricità, Edison, Soc.
Trivulzio di Elettricità) the position with regard
to the electricities installations in Lombardy and
Veneto can be outlined thus:

In Lombardy the main stations are situated in
Val d'Osseola, Val Melinga and Val Canonica;
those in the Val d'Osseola for the most part feed
the industrial plant of Milan while the stations
in Val Melinga and Val Canonica produce chiefly
power for the public services (lighting, means of
transport in the town and the water supply).

The plan, in short, to prevent the Germans
destroying production plants consists in entrusting
their protection to the Patriotic organisations which
are at work in the neighbourhood! To this end I
have had talks with the leaders of the different
organisations and they have assured me that they will
do their utmost to hamper the German abattoirs. Lt.
Col. Brambolini, second in command of the Verdi in
the Val Tidone and General Massini, head of the
Green planes operating in Val Canonica have
already given directives on the subject to the bands
under their control. Throughout the Val d'Osseola
the present critical situation of the bands has pre-
vented the possibility of similar measures. As re-
gards the transformer sub-stations, an agreement has
been made with Engineer Perruccio, the administrator
selected by D'Adda to remove and hide the transformers
and switches in such a way as to set the transformer
installations going quickly; he had them in view an
eventual linking-up of the lines feeding the industrial
zone with the transFormer sub-stations supplying the
public service. Besides this some bodies are being
armed who will, at the right time, go to the neighbour-
hood of the main centres to protect them.

In Veneto the position of the power stations is
extremely critical. The chief stations are situated
in the neighbourhood of Vittorio Veneto, Monticelli,
Talier, S. Giacomo and in consequence they will be 14169
in the line of the German retreat or directly incorporated
into the screening line of the German Alpine defences.
All the precise instructions have already been given
and the best bands to construct these in

those in the Veneto. For the most part they are in the interior of Minervia the stations in Verona and Vicenza produce slightly better for the public services (lighting, means of transport in the town and the water supply).

The plan, in short, is prevent the Germans from destroying production, complete in construction, their destruction to the patriot organizations which are at work in the neighbourhoods. To this end I have had talks with the leaders of the different organizations and they have assured me that they will do their utmost to hinder the German saboteurs. Lt. Col. Bramolini second in command of the bands in the Vel Tulliano and Cesari Bassini, head of the Green Flies' brigades operating in Verona, Comonica have given the German authorities on the return to the bands under their control. Throughout the Vel d'Oscalo the present critical situation of the bands has presented the possibility of similar measures. As regards the transmission, substations, an agreement has been made with Minister Paravicini, the Minister of War and his two transformers and switches in such a way as to set the telephone corner installations point on which the Germans can view an eventual liaison and of the radios receiving the industrial zone with the former authorities, including the public services. Besides this some bodies are being formed which will, at the right time, go to the neighbourhood of the war, escort to protect them.

In Veneto the action on the power stations is extremely critical. The chief stations are situated in the neighbourhood of Vicenza, Montebelluna, Belluno, the latter, located in consequence they will be incorporated in the steaming line of the Central Adriatic railway. Along these trunks have already been given to the District bodies to construct their own structures, while works made very difficult by bombing, and by the lack of some among the patriot bands. A measure has been provided for some last night tone. This consists of flooding them which would prohibit access to German saboteurs which would prevent destruction by demolition. Thus, for the transmission lines the same directed have been given as those issued in Tomi, Italy.

It is unfortunately necessary to point that Veneto will be most severely damaged by electric power.

SUBJECT: Lines of Communication.

TO : Public Works & Utilities Sub-Commission.
Headquarters, A.C.C.

1. As a result of recent advances made by the Eighth Army:-
On 23rd October 1944 it was found the following routes were passable
to military traffic between Florence, Rimini and Riccione:

Route No. 69 from Florence eastwards to junction of Route 70 east of Pontassieve; thence by Route 70 to junction of Route 71 south of Poppi; thence by Route 71 north and east through Bagno to Mercato; thence by Cologne and Rubicon Routes east and northeast through Sogliano and Borghi to the Emilia Highway (Route 9); Route 9 through Sant'Arcangelo to Rimini; and Route 16 to Riccione.

2. The road is good for the most part but on Route 70 there
are three diversions (where the road has been blown), which can be
negotiated only by vehicles equipped with four-wheel drive. In
addition, approximately four kilometers north of Poppi the road fords
a river, which after heavy rains would be impassable to other than
vehicles "high slung".

3. Route 71, apart from one somewhat difficult diversion near
Mercato, is good throughout. Both Route 70 and 71 are mountainous with
steep gradients, but no difficulty apart from that mentioned above
should be experienced by military vehicles. It is not recommended
that civilian vehicles be used on either of these routes. The normal
time from Florence to Riccione would be approximately seven hours.

4. With regard to the ford being impassable during inclement
weather:- Route 71 could be followed south from Mercato to Arezzo;
thence by Route 69 to Florence. This would save at least five hours
over the previous route used, i.e., Arezzo, Perugia, Foligno, Fabri-
ano, Jesi to Route 16 to Riccione and Rimini.
